

HEALTH REPORT FOR 1943

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Health Report for the year 1943, this being the twenty-first Report submitted by me as your Medical Officer of Health.

The Report, which is again curtailed, contains only such essential features as it is necessary to record.

The population of the District as estimated by the Registrar-General at mid-year 1943 is 13,040, as compared with 13,370 last year.

There was a slight decrease in the Birth Rate, this being equal to 15.0 per thousand of population, as compared with 17.3 last year.

An increase also took place in the Death Rate, this being 12.8 per thousand of population, as against 9.8 last year.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the District was 51 per thousand births, as compared with 47 last year.

The year was a satisfactory one from the point of view of incidence of Infectious Disease, the number of notification certificates received being 150, as against 115 last year. This increase is mainly due to a larger number of cases of Measles being notified:

VITAL STATISTICS.

Births.—During the year 196 Births were registered as belonging to the District, of which number 101 were males and 95 were females. The Birth Rate for the year was equal to 15.0 per thousand of population, as compared with 17.3 last year.

Deaths.—The number of Deaths registered during the year was 167 (79 males and 88 females). This gives a Death Rate of 12.8 per thousand of population, as against 9.8 last year.

Infantile Mortality.—During the year 10 deaths were registered as occurring in infants under one year of age. All of these were legitimate. The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was equal to 51 per thousand registered births, as compared with 47 last year.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

1943.

I have the honour of presenting to you a summary of the work carried out by the Public Health Department during the year 1943.

General Inspections.

The routine inspections of the District have been maintained as circumstances have allowed, and special attention has been paid at all times to registered premises under the Milk and Dairies Order, and food preparing places.

A number of properties in the town are still in the occupation of His Majesty's Forces, and, on the whole, these are being maintained in a very satisfactory condition. Where defects have occurred I have contacted the D.C.R.E., whose office is in the town, and all matters have been promptly dealt with and several improvements have been carried out.

All the defects detected during the year have been dealt with by informal action and it has not been necessary to serve any Statutory Notices. There are many houses in the town in the occupation of more than one family, and only in three cases has the question of bugs arisen. These were promptly dealt with by spraying, fumigation and steam disinfection, and the trouble quickly eliminated.

During the year 39 fumigations were carried out by the Public Health Department following infectious disease or at the request of residents, and in addition 50 batches of bedding, etc., were removed to the Council's Isolation Hospital, Oak Lane, for steam disinfection.

Milk Supplies.

The milk supply of the District has, in spite of war-time difficulties, been maintained in a very satisfactory condition, and the reports on many of the samples taken have actually been better than those of pre-war. The bulk of the supply continues to be delivered to consumers in bottles, and samples have been taken approximately monthly. There is one modern Pasteurising Plant in the area, and one farm at which Accredited milk is produced. A total of 187 visits were paid to premises registered under the Milk and Dairies Order during the year, and six minor defects discovered were dealt with.

Twenty-five samples of milk were taken in the area and submitted to the County Laboratories, Maidstone, for examination. These consisted of:—

In addition, 12 samples of the milk supply to the Council's Isolation Hospital were taken for chemical examinations during the year, and the County Analyst reports that these were satisfactory.

Under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 8 Dealers' Licences were issued for the sale of Designated Milk, and in addition one Pasteurisers' Licence was also issued.

Drainage.

There have been no extensions to the main sewerage system of the District or to the surface water sewers during the year. Eighty-six defects relating to the cleansing of drains were dealt with during the year.

Water Supplies.

No complaints were received during the year in connection with the domestic water supply of the town. Twelve samples from the domestic supply were taken; these were submitted for bacteriological examination and the reports were all satisfactory.

In addition to the above, copies of 12 reports were received from the Sevenoaks Waterworks Company upon samples taken and submitted to their own Analyst.

No complaints were received during the year concerning the water supply of the Public Swimming Baths, owned by the Council, in Eardley Road, Sevenoaks. During the season 3 samples were taken of this water and submitted for examination, and the reports were all satisfactory.

Infestation Order, 1943.

As directed by the Council, a survey of the premises in the Urban area was completed during the year for the purpose of detecting the presence of rats and mice. The result of the survey revealed that—

- (1) there is no infestation to be classed under the heading of "Reservoir" or "Major Primary type";
- (2) in many cases small infestations were found, but these appear to be intermittent in character with no real permanence.

A detailed report was submitted to your Council and this has been forwarded to the Ministry of Food, and steps are being taken to implement the direction served upon your Council pursuant of Article 5 of the Order.

Slaughterhouses, Meat and Food Inspections.

I have continued to give special attention to all the food preparing places in the area, and the two slaughterhouses taken over by the Ministry of Food for the slaughtering of animals have been regularly used. These have been conducted satisfactorily; minor improvements have been carried out, and close co-operation exists between my Department and the manager of the slaughterhouses appointed by the Ministry of Food. A total of 522 visits were paid to these slaughterhouses during the year, and the animals slaughtered in them were allocated to the Sevenoaks Urban and Rural areas, together with other districts as required by the Ministry of Food.

During the year 9 tons 8 cwts. 34 lbs. of meat was condemned at the Government slaughterhouses; this is properly recorded and dealt with under the salvage scheme of the Ministry of Food. In addition, 6 cwts. 62 lbs. 14 oz. of other foodstuffs was also surrendered as unfit for human consumption from the various food places in the town and allocated to salvage.

General.

A.R.P. work and the work under the Coal Distribution Order, 1943, under which I act as Local Fuel Overseer for the Council, have again claimed much time. The work under the latter Order continues to increase, and in conclusion I would like to record my best thanks to the staff in my Department, who have worked extremely hard during the year.
