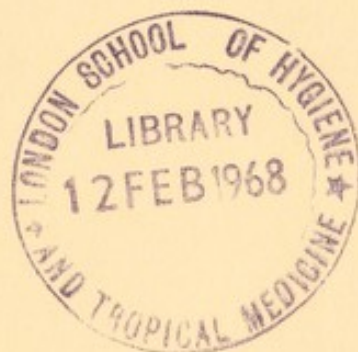

**To the Sevenoaks, Southborough and Tonbridge
Joint Health Committee.**

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1962.

The Report is given in its usual form. In the first part of the Report, sections dealing with STAFF, STATISTICS, HEALTH SERVICES and INFECTIOUS DISEASE are combined to show particulars both for the Joint Health Area and for each District. In the second part of the Report, separate sections are given for each of the five Districts dealing with the SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES of the District, HOUSING and INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD. Separate Reports by the Public Health Inspectors are not given, but the record of their work is incorporated in the Report.

The POPULATION as estimated by the Registrar-General for the Joint Health Area for mid-1962 was 116,520, an increase of 2,350 over the mid-1961 figure. The population figures for each District are given on page 11, together with the estimated population for the previous year; an increase in population occurred in each of the five Districts in the Area.

The CRUDE BIRTH RATE (number of births per 1,000 home population) for the Joint Health Area in 1962 was 17.04 compared with 16.35 for the Area in the previous year. The Birth Rate for England and Wales in 1962 was 18.0, this was 0.6 higher than that for 1961 and the highest since 1947.

The CRUDE DEATH RATE (number of deaths per 1,000 home population) for the Joint Health Area in 1962 was 11.47 compared with 11.9 for England and Wales; the death rate for 1961 in the Joint Health Area was 11.35.

In the Table of Statistics on page 12, in addition to the Crude Birth and Death Rates for the individual Districts, the Adjusted Birth and Death Rates are also shown. These Adjusted Rates are obtained by multiplying the Crude Rates by the Comparability Factors for the individual Districts supplied by the Registrar-General; the Factor makes allowances for the different sex and age distribution of the population in a particular District, and so allows the Rates better to be compared with one another and with the Birth and Death Rates for England and Wales as a whole.

The INFANT MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births) for the Joint Health Area was 17.13. The Infant Mortality Rate for England and Wales was 21.4.

The NEO-NATAL MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under four weeks) per 1,000 live births for the Joint Health Area was 11.06 compared with 15.1 for England and Wales.

The EARLY NEO-NATAL MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under one week) per 1,000 live births for the Joint Health Area was 10.08.

The PERINATAL MORTALITY RATE (stillbirths and deaths under one week combined) per 1,000 live and still births for the Joint Health Area was 22.90.

No MATERNAL DEATHS occurred in 1962.

CAUSES OF DEATH. A table showing the causes of death is given on page 13.

As in previous years Coronary Disease was the commonest cause of Male deaths and Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System of Female deaths.

Sixty-five deaths occurred from Malignant Disease of the Lung or Bronchus compared with 60 deaths from this disease during the previous year.

Deaths from Motor Vehicle Accidents increased from 14 in the previous year to 17 in 1962, whereas deaths from all other Accidents declined from 33 in the previous year to 17 in 1962.

Infections Disease.

The number of cases of notifiable infectious disease is shown for each District on pages 16 to 18.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year.

No deaths occurred from Measles, Whooping Cough or Scarlet Fever and the incidence of infectious disease generally throughout the Area was low during the year.

Acute Poliomyelitis.

During 1962, one case of paralytic poliomyelitis was notified, a woman aged 52 years who was treated in a London Hospital.

On pages 21 to 24 of this Report, figures kindly supplied by the County Medical Officer are given showing the numbers of persons vaccinated against Acute Anterior Poliomyelitis together with the numbers vaccinated against Smallpox and also the numbers of persons immunised against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough.

Tuberculosis.

During 1962, a total of 15 new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified in the Joint Health Area and 7 new cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis; the figures for the previous year were 45 pulmonary cases and 6 non-pulmonary. There were 3 deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis and 2 from non-pulmonary during 1962.

The Milk & Dairies (General) Regulations, 1959; Regulations 18 to 20. (Provisions with regard to infection of milk).

No action was necessary during the year under these Regulations.

The National Assistance Act, 1948: Section 47. (Removal to suitable premises of persons in need of care and attention).

During 1962, it did not prove necessary to apply for any Removal Orders.

Legislation.

A list of the new Acts and Regulations affecting the Public Health Department, which came into operation during the year, are given on page 15.

Home Safety.

During 1962, in each of the five Districts of the Joint Health Area much valuable work was carried out by the Home Safety Committees.

Change of Office Address.

On June 24th, 1963, the office of the Medical Officer of Health was moved from 214, High Street to No. 1, Bradford Street (1st Floor) Tonbridge.

I have once again great pleasure in taking this opportunity of extending my grateful thanks to the Members and Officials of the District Councils, the Medical Practitioners of the Area, the staff of the County Health Department, the voluntary workers in the Area and my own staff for their helpful co-operation during the year.

2. Drainage and Sewerage.

As was stated in last year's report, due to new housing developments, certain of the Sewage Works had become overloaded and an extensive programme is being undertaken by the Council.

I am indebted to Mr. H. W. Clark, the Council's Engineer and Surveyor, for the following note of the progress of the programme carried out during 1962 and up to March, 1963:—

“Construction work has already started and is well under way on the extension to the sewerage system serving Paddock Wood, the provision of a new pumping station and extensions to the Disposal works.

Ministry approval has been received to the sewerage of Whetsted and the discharge of the sewage from this area and Five Oak Green village to Paddock Wood, the scheme is now out to contract.

A preliminary design has been prepared for the village of Speldhurst; the Ministry has held a local enquiry and preparation of details are in hand.

A preliminary design has been prepared for the Hadlow works where farm trade waste will be accepted from the new Kent Farm Institute. The hamlet of Golden Green has been included in the scheme, the sewage will be pumped to the Hadlow works for disposal.

Alternative schemes have been prepared for the village of Hildenborough, (a) to discharge to Tonbridge and (b) to a central works at Hildenborough. Details have already been submitted to the Minister who awaits further information from the Urban District Council.

Preliminary schemes for Pembury and Horsmonden are to be submitted to the Minister.

It was mentioned last year that the sewage from Matfield and Petteridge was to be treated in an extended works at Brenchley. A scheme is in course of preparation for taking the sewage still further by extending the sewer starting at Matfield, picking up Petteridge, Brenchley, and discharging to a pumping station near the Furnace Lane works at Horsmonden. The sewage to be pumped up into the village and carried on down the valley to a new site on the banks of the River Teise somewhere on the Horsmonden/Goudhurst Road. This works will then replace Matfield, Petteridge (Furnace Lane), Horsmonden, and the main works at Horsmonden.

With regard to Groombridge, the final design is almost complete and ready to submit to the Minister. Agreement has been reached with both the Uckfield Rural District Council and Tunbridge Wells Corporation for the discharge of this sewage into their respective sewerage systems.

Bidborough Sewage Works—a draft agreement has been drawn up with the Southborough Urban District Council; when this is finally agreed, the sewage from Bidborough will be discharged to that Council's sewage disposal works.”

Generally speaking, cafe, restaurant and canteen proprietors have continued to be co-operative and a good standard of hygiene is maintained. Minor defects were duly rectified when brought to the notice of the occupiers.

Minor defects were rectified during the year at four of the five bakeries in the District.
