Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my report for the year 1957.

The population continues to steadily increase and is now 6,700.

The birth rate (16.9) is the same as last year and slightly higher than for England and Wales (16.1).

The death rate (12.7) is slightly lower than 1956 (13.2) and rather higher than that for England and Wales (11.5).

The death rate of infants under one year of age is 17.4 and lower than that for England and Wales (23.0). Of the 76 deaths, 6 were from accidents of various kinds.

I have to record again that the chief causes of deaths were from diseases associated with elderly people.

Water mains extensions were carried out during the year to serve council housing estate and private developments.

Sewerage extension was also carried out to serve housing development and work was completed on the second part of the extension to the sewage disposal works.

During the year 42 new houses were completed, 16 by the local authority and 26 by private enterprise, making a total of 594 houses completed in the post war period, of which 376 were constructed by the local authority. General housing conditions have much improved during the post war period.

Implementation of the Food Hygiene Regulations 1958 has proceeded in a satisfactory manner.

Measles was fairly prevalent during the year and of 148 cases of infectious diseases notified 144 were Measles, During the year 6 cases of Tuberculosis were notified, all male and all pulmonary. This is rather higher than usual. There were no tuberculosis deaths.

I am pleased to say that the number of children receiving primary immunisation against diphtheria maintains the increase of the last two or three years.

I wish to express my thanks to Dr. Mair, of the Public Health Laboratory, and the Public Health Department of the County Council for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally, I wish to thank Mr. R. B. Jones, Public Health Inspector and Surveyor, for his invaluable assistance during the year and you, Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

#### SECTION B

#### General Provision of Health Services for the Area

#### HOSPITALS

All hospitals except some private maternity and nursing homes are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board. The County Homes for the aged and infirm people are under the County Council, but when they take ill are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

#### TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS

The Infant Welfare Centre is held at St. Winefride's Parish Hall every second and fourth Wednesday afternoon under the County Council.

The Tuberculosis Clinic is held at John Street, Loughborough, and is under the Hospital Board.

#### AMBULANCE FACILITIES

The County Council is responsible for all ambulance facilities in the County, Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira.

#### NURSING IN THE HOME

All District Nursing and midwifery in the home is carried out under the County Council.

#### HEALTH VISITING

The work is very efficiently carried out under the County Council. A Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Diabetic Clinic at Leicester Royal Infirmary, and visits the patients in their homes.

#### LABORATORY FACILITIES

This work is carried out at the Public Health Laboratory Isolation Hospital, Groby Road, Leicester.
