



Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my report for the year 1960.

The population continues to steadily increase and is now 6,910.

The birth rate (18.5) is lower than last year and higher than for England and Wales (17.1).

The death rate (12.2) is higher than 1959 (11.5) and higher than that for England and Wales (11.5).

The death rate of infants under one year of age is 22.1 and almost the same as that for England and Wales (21.9). Of the 74 deaths, seven were from accidents and suicide, the same number as for cancer. Together they constitute the second highest cause of death.

I have to record again that the chief causes of death were from diseases associated with elderly people.

During the year 77 new houses were completed, 46 by the local authority and 31 by private enterprise, making a total of 749 houses completed in the post war period, of which 452 were constructed by the local authority. General housing conditions have much improved during the post war period, and many of the older houses have been improved by the addition of W.Cs. and bathrooms, etc.

Implementation of the Food Hygiene Regulations 1958 has proceeded in a satisfactory manner.

During the year only 3 cases of infectious disease were notified: all Measles.

During the year only 2 cases of Tuberculosis were notified, 1 female Pulmonary and 1 male non-pulmonary. There were no deaths from Tuberculosis.

I am pleased to say that the number of children receiving primary immunisation against diphtheria still remains high, but not quite so many as last year.

I wish to express my thanks to Dr. Mair, of the Public Health Laboratory, and the Public Health Department of the County Council for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally I wish to thank Mr. R. B. Jones, Public Health Inspector and Surveyor, for his invaluable assistance during the year and you, Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

SECTION B

General Provision of Health Services for the Area

HOSPITALS

All hospitals except some private maternity and nursing homes are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board. The County Homes for the aged and infirm people are under the County Council, but when they take ill are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS

The Infant Welfare Centre is held at St. Winefride's Parish Hall every second and fourth Wednesday afternoon under the County Council.

The tuberculosis Clinic is held at John Street, Loughborough, and is under the Hospital Board.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES

The County Council is responsible for all ambulance facilities in the County, Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira.

NURSING IN THE HOME

All District Nursing and Midwifery in the home is carried out under the County Council.

HEALTH VISITING

The work is very efficiently carried out under the County Council. A Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Diabetic Clinic at Leicester Royal Infirmary, and visits the patients in their homes on request.

LABORATORY FACILITIES

This work is carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Isolation Hospital, Groby Road, Leicester.

In January 1960, I was called to Hind Leys School, as it was thought there was some Food Poisoning. This, however, turned out to be winter vomiting disease, and all samples of fæces examined bacteriologically were completely negative. Some 20 persons, both teachers and pupils, were interviewed. The symptoms were very mild, and very few people had consulted a doctor. It would appear that this complaint was very prevalent at that time.

At the Church of England School, 100 children (50 boys and 50 girls) were skin tested by Dr. Blake, the Chest Physician, as a case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis had occurred in one of the School Canteen Workers. Six children, three boys and three girls, were tuberculin positive, but were all negative on X-Ray.

There is free co-operation between the local authority and the Chest Physician, and every assistance is given in the ascertainment of contacts, rehousing and employment.

A special clinic for contacts has been working very satisfactorily and general practitioners have availed themselves fully of X-Ray facilities.
