



B.Nature of the District.

The district is rural in character, its main industry being agriculture. A large number of outworkers carry on glove making in their homes for factories situated outside the district.

C. Personal Health Services in the District.

The personal health services, including the ambulance service, continued to be provided by the County Council. It has not been possible to develop fully the County Council's Domestic Home Help Service. Otherwise, the services provided have been adequate and no further comment with regard to them is considered necessary.

The Public Health Laboratory Services have proved in all respects most helpful and satisfactory.

D. Environmental Health Services.

1. SANITARY STAFF.

J.E.Fannon, M.R.San.I., M.S.I.A. Sanitary Inspector. Part time on duties of Waterworks Manager until 30.4.55.

Clerical Staff - one clerk (part time).

2. WATER SUPPLY.

During the year a Waterworks Manager was appointed to take charge of the Council's water undertakings and the Sanitary Inspector ceased to carry out these duties.

Rainfall for the year 1955 (as recorded by Mr.C.E.Bean of Barton Gardens, Sherborne) = 28.67 inches.

(a) Quantity. No serious shortages of supply were experienced during the year.

(b) <u>Quality</u>. The bacteriological quality of some of the supplies still prove unsatisfactory, in particular the Southern Parishes Supply. Chlorination of all the Council's supplies is carried out and regular samples submitted for bacteriological examination and for free chlorine estimation. The details are given below.

3. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The absence of adequate sewerage and sewage disposal facilities remains the main stumbling block to improvement of housing conditions in most of the parishes in the district. This lack will become more apparent as main water is made available to increasing numbers of properties in the expansion of the water undertaking.

Twenty-nine septic tank installations have been put in by private owners during the year at considerable expense which in many cases could have been saved had the Council been able to proceed with its sewerage schemes.

A report on the relative urgency and suggested priorities for the various village schemes was made during the year and it is to be hoped that some progress may be permitted at an early date.

Chetnole. A length of ditch alongside the main road has been piped and a major nuisance in this village, to some extent abated thereb

4. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

(a) <u>House Refuse</u>. The monthly collection of house refuse has been maintained throughout the year. Requests for a more frequent collection have been made from time to time by various bodies (Womens Institutes and Parish Councils), but were refused on economic grounds.

The quantity of refuse continues to increase, although the collectors have been instructed to pick up only domestic refuse, and the tip at Thornford is rapidly filling. Efforts to acquire a site for a new tip have so far been unsuccessful and authority was given to increase the scavenging staff from two to three men to permit the employment of one man at the tip, full time, so that more thoroughly controlled tipping may be carried out with a consequent extension of the useful life of the existing site.

(b) <u>Salvage</u>. The sale of salvaged materials during the year brought in £63. 17s. Od. compared with £81. 6s. 9d last year. This figure is disappointing in view of the increased value of scrap, but is due in some measure to the activities of door-to-door collectors who are paying good prices to householders for materials which had previously been put out with the ordinary refuse.

The purchase of a new trailer was authorised during the year and when this is delivered it will be possible to segregate a greater quantity of waste paper, the market for which is improving.

(c) <u>Cesspool Emptying</u>. The contract for this work at the Council Housing Sites was continued and is operating very satisfactorily

5. RIVERS AND STREAMS POLLUTION.

The cleansing of those 'black' ditches for which the Council has, over the years, assumed responsibility was carried out as necessary and, despite the dry season, the nuisances from this source were largely kept in check. The ditch at Blacksmiths Lane, Thornford, was a notable exception. These ditches still remain as the most pressing sanitary problem in the district and will not be cured until proper sewerage systems are provided.

Relations with the Rivers Boards have been satisfactory, the effluent from the Council's sewage disposal works being maintained at an acceptable standard.

6. SHOPS ACTS.

Forty inspections were carried out under the Shops Acts and no defects found.

8. SMOKE ABATEMENT.

No action was called for or taken during the year.

9. SWIMMINT BATHS.

There is one private swimming bath in the district which is used by the public on occasion by special permission. The water is from springs and is chlorinated when in use.

10. MOVEABLE D'ELLINGS AND CAMPING SITES.

No camping sites were licensed, but eight licenses were granted permitting individual caravans to be station on specific sites.

11. VERMINOUS PREMISES.

Three properties were treated for flea infestation and three infestations of cluster fly were dealt with.

In one stubborn case of fleas which did not respond to D.D.T. treatment the use of flaked naphtha proved very successful.

12. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS.

The North Dorset Joint Rodent Committee, of which Sherborne Rural District Council is one of the six constituent authorities, continued to carry out the provisions of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949.

The work of the Committee continued to function smoothly and the Divisional Rodent Officer of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food has reported that both in cost and percentage of inspections made, the work of the group compares very favourably with the figures for similar organisations elsewhere in the Division.

Complaints have been dealt with promptly by the Rodent Officer and his staff and the Council's sewers and refuse tip are baited regularly.

13. RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT 1951.

There are no premises subject to registration under the above-mentioned Act within the district.

14. PET ANIMALS ACT 1951.

No premises in the district are licensed under this Act.

15. SCHOOLS (INCLUDING SCHOOL CANTEENS).

Twenty-four inspections were made of schools in respect of sanitation and meals facilities.

The cooking of meals at Bradford Abbas School was discontinued

and container meals are now provided there as at the other schools in the district.

The sanitary accommodation at Yetminster School was improved during the year and plans are in course of preparation for the provision of water-borne sanitation at Oborne School.

Slum Clearance.

In accordance with Section 1 of the Housing Repairs and Rents Act 1954, the required return was made to the Ministry of the Council's proposals with regard to slum clearance. This return showed, in the opinion of the Council, the estimated number of unfit houses (requiring to be dealt with under Section 11 of the Housing Act 1936 or by clearance) was 142 and that the Council proposed to deal with these houses within the next five years. It is proposed to deal with the majority of these houses by individual action under Section 11 of the Housing Act 1936.

Apart from inspection prior to future representation, no action was taken during the year to implement these proposals.

Overcrowding.

No cases of statutory overcrowding were found during the year. Houses Known to be Let in Lodgings.

No houses are known to be let in lodgings.

Housing Repairs and Rents Act 1954.

No applications were received during the year for certificates of disrepair under the above-mentioned Act.

The absence of such applications suggest that property owners

are not taking advantage of the provisions of the Act to enable them to increase rents.

Improvement Grants (Housing Act 1949 and Housing Repairs and Rents Act 1954).

Thirty-two applications were received during the year for grants under the above-mentioned Act and the same number granted.

Requisitioned Premises etc.

One house was held under requisition at the end of the year. Four houses on which Demolition or Closing Orders had been made were occupied under licence at the end of the year.

Provision of New Houses and Rehousing.

Eight new houses were provided in the district during the year by private enterprise, but no new dwellings were completed by the Local Authority. The number of Council houses in the district remains at 350. Twenty-nine families were housed(on change of accommodation) by the Council during the year.

127 applicants are at present awaiting accommodation in the Sherborne Rural District and, in addition, housing accommodation will be required to rehouse (within the next five years) a proportion of the occupants in unfit properties which will have to be demolished. The Council will, therefore, have to resume the provision of further Council houses if the needs of these applicants are to be met.
