B. Nature of the District

The district is rural in character, its main industry being agriculture. A large number of outworkers carry on glove making in their homes for factories situated outside the district. A large dairy, with a wide supply area, is situated within the district.

C. Health Services in the District which are not the responsibility of the District Council.

The Hospital Service

The Yeatman Hospital (West Dorset Hospital Group of the Wessex Regional Hospital Board) provides the local hospital requirements, both in-patient and out-patient.

Laboratory Services

The Public Health Laboratory Service has again proved co-operative and efficient.

General Medical Practitioner, Ophthalmic and Pharmaceutical Services

These are administered locally by the Dorset Executive Committee.

County Council Services

The personal preventive health services are the responsibility of the Dorset County Council, which include the care of mothers and young children, maternity, school health, home nursing, mental health, the ambulance service, care and after care of the blind and handicapped and health education. The following responsibilities call for particular comment.

The Domestic Help Service The appointment of a part time paid local organiser for the North Dorset area has increased the efficiency of the service in your district. Some difficulty is experienced in obtaining a sufficient number of home helps in view of the alternate demands on available persons in Sherborne, but the service in your district can now be considered to be reasonably satisfactory.

The Welfare of Aged People Through its well organised scheme (including the co-ordinated services of the health visiting, domestic help, home nursing services and the social welfare officer) the increasing responsibilities in respect to old people are being efficiently carried out. The lack of an adequate number of hospital beds for the chronic and aged sick puts a particular strain on the County Council's services at some times of the year. An efficient scheme is in operation to ensure that, as far as possible, the best use is made of the beds available and the available places in the County Councils homes for old people.

The valuable work which the Dorset Branch of the British Red Cross Society does towards the welfare of old people in the district requires acknowledgment. Acting as agent for the County Council, amongst its other activities, the B.R.C.S. has established foot clinics throughout the County.

In Sherborne three or four treatment sessions are held a month with an average attendance of nine persons for treatment. Forty-five patients were on the register at the end of the year.

Mention should also be made of the scheme under which the County Council makes financial assistance available to the local housing authority for welfare provision in connection with houses built for the particular needs of old people.

Froblem Families In an attempt to prevent the break up of families both from humane considerations and the resultant financial cost, the County Council co-operate closely with the housing authority by rent guarantees and other action, as may appear appropriate.

Prophylactic Inoculations Preventive inoculation against disease is the responsibility of the County Council through the school medical, child welfare and medical practitioner services.

During the year the following treatments were carried out. The figures in parenthesis are those for the preceding years.

Poliomyelitis (six months to thirty nine years)

A poliomyelitis vaccination treatment session was held regularly in Sherborne on the third Friday in the month from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

D. Environmental Health Services

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF

Medical Officer of Health (Part time) - Noel F. Pearson, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H.

He also acts as Medical Officer of Health to four other District Councils in the North Dorset Area and as Assistant County Medical Officer to the Dorset County Council.

The time available which he has to devote to his duties with your Council is rather less than one half day per week.

The Fublic Health Inspector also carries out the duties of Meat Inspector.

WATER SUPPLY

The end of the year saw the completion of the works required to allow for the abandonment of the unsatisfactory Southern parishes supply from the Hillfield source. This has never been a supply, the purity of which could be guaranteed and its elimination is welcomed.

Quantity

Adequate supplies have been maintained throughout the year, the Thornford borehole being the principal source of supply from the Council; sources supplemented from the Leigh supply.

A number of small private supplies remain in use in the district, the quality of which are doubtful as they arise from surface springs.

Water is taken from the Sherborne Urban District to supply parts of Castleton Parish.

All the Councils supplies are chlorinated and regular samples of the public and private supplies are taken for bacteriological examination and (where applicable) free chlorine estimation.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Bradford Abbas and Alweston Contracts were let for completion of the sewerage schemes in these parishes and work was begun, at Bradford Abbas on the 19th July and at Alweston on the 2nd August. The schemes were well advanced at the end of the year and negdiations with property owners regarding closet conversions and house improvements were proceeding. In this way it can be ensured that full advantage is taken of the sewer with as little delay as possible.

Thornford The contractor for this sewerage scheme agreed to start work in January, 1961.

Trent As noted last year the rate of connections to the sewer in this parish is very slow, only four more properties having been connected during the year.

Yetminster Consideration was again given to the possibility of providing a main sewerage scheme in this, the parish with the largest population in the district. The Council's Consultant Engineers were instructed to bring up to date the scheme proposed in 1947 and it is hoped that during the coming year a decision will be taken to proceed.

Oborne and Poyntington Estimates were produced for the provision of sewerage in these parishes, to take advantage of disposal facilities available at the Urban District's newly enlarged outfall works. These estimates indicated a probable cost of £535 per house in Poyntington and £475 in Oborne and it was decided not to proceed.

This decision was particulary disappointing in respect of Oborne where twelve Council houses have only rudimentary disposal facilities which were put in as a temporary measure when the houses were built in 1946 and 1947.

If main sewerage cannot be provided for the village it is felt that some more satisfactory scheme for the Council houses at least should be given urgent consideration.

Ditches

The continuing nuisances from foul ditches and roadside culverts in Chetnole, Leigh, Purse Caundle, Yetminster and Nether Compton were kept in abeyance so far as possible by flushing and cleansing.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

House Refuse Collection The monthly collection has been maintained,

Disposal During the year the Council purchased a hydraulic shovel fitted to a half-track tractor. With this it is hoped that a more controlled form of tipping may be practised, with a greater measure of consolidation and coverage.

Salvage The value of salvage sold during the year was £128 compared with £112 during the previous year.

Cesspool Emptying The contract for this work at the Council's housing sites has been continued and is operating satisfactorily.

RIVERS AND STREAMS POLLUTION

Polluted ditches in the more populous villages continue to be a major nuisance and will continue to be so until sewerage schemes can be proceeded with.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No action was called for or taken during the year.

SWIMMING BATHS

There is one open air bath at a private establishment where members of the public have occasional access by invitation.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS AND CAMPING SITES

Sixteen moveable dwellings were licensed during the year under the Public Health Act, 1936 and three caravan sites under the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960.

The revised procedure under the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960 came into operation during the year and the Council established standards for temporary and permanent sites.

Difficulty in persuading owners to accept the conditions for permanent sites (hard standings in particular) was caused by the fact that the Planning Authority appeared reluctant to give long-term permission. Owners are naturally unwilling to undertake expensive works to establish a permanent site without some guarantee that their planning permission will continue.

VERMINOUS PREMISES

No action was called for during the year.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY FESTS ACT, 1949

The North Dorset Joint Rodent Committee, of which Sherborne Rural District Council is one of the six constituent authorities, continued to carry out the provisions of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

The work of the Committee continued to function smoothly and expeditiously.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951

There are no premises subject to registration under the above-mentioned Act, within the district.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

No premises in the district are licensed under this Act.

SCHOOLS (INCLUDING SCHOOL CANTEENS)

Twenty four visits and inspections were made at schools in respect of sanitation, meals facilities and water supplies.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACTS, 1948 and 1951 - Section 47

No action was required to be taken during the year under these Acts with regard to the compulsory removal of persons in need of care and attention and living under insanitary conditions.

The existence of aged persons, living under unsatisfactory conditions who really require care and attention and who require institutional care, are known. Some of these people will not voluntarily accept such care and attention, preferring to live in their own home even though by all accepted standards of hygiene, their conditions are most unsatisfactory and danger to their welfare may be quite real.

It is considered that the old persons wishes and desires must be given first consideration in such cases and, unless there appears to be a very real danger to other people as a result, these cases are not reported to you for statutory action to be taken with a view to their compulsory removal to an institution.

Slum Clearance

Very limited action was taken during the year with regard to slum clearance. An appreciable number of houses in the district are recognised as being unfit for habitation but in the absence of new houses being made available for re-housing, limited action only is practicable in enforcing closure or demolition of unfit property.

It is hoped that the provision of the Housing Bill now before Parliament, when enacted, will provide the necessary stimulus for further housing development for slum clearance and general needs.

Overcrowding

No cases of statutory overcrowding were found during the year.

HOUSING (Continued)

Houses Known to be Let In Lodgings

No houses are known to be let in lodgings.

Improvement Grants (Housing Act, 1949 and Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954).

Forty applications (compared with twenty three in 1959) were received during the year for discretionary grants under the above-mentioned Act, ten applications were received in respect to standard grants.

Provision of New Houses and Re-Housing

Twenty one new houses were built in the District by private enterprise, but, once again, none by the Council.

During the year, however, the Council did resolve to huild a number of bungalows specially designed for old people in some of its parishes and these, it is hoped, will be completed during 1961.

Considerable thought and consideration was given to the type of housing provision most appropriate for old people in the District. It was decided that grouped flatlets were neither practical nor appropriate by reason of the nature of the district. Nor, did the Council feel that it could avail itself of the grant for welfare facilities made available by the County Council as it considered that the modified warden service demanded, was inappropriate for such a District as yours.

Ninety eight applicants were on the Council house waiting list at the end of the year, of which seventy four were resident in the district, compared with eighty five and sixty two respectively, at the end of 1959.

Twelve families were re-housed by the Council during the year.
