

To The Chairman and Members, Sherborne Rural District Council

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report for the year 1961.

The report is prepared and will be circulated in accordance with the requirements of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959.

The report shows that the health of the district has remained satisfactory and that there has been no undue incidence of serious notifiable disease. There was an increased incidence of measles, however, as there was in 1960. It is not usual to find an increased incidence in consecutive years.

Allowing for the smallness of numbers under consideration, the vital statistics compare favourably with those for the Country as a whole.

It is interesting to note, but the fact may have no statistical significance, that the death rate in the district has again been low, as was the case last year.

I am indebted to Mr. J. Fannon, your Public Health Inspector, for his co-operation and assistance in preparing this report, and to my clerk Miss J. Shirley for her efficient services.

I would also like to acknowledge the happy co-operation and assistance I always obtain from your Clerk, Mr. I. Sartin and the other members of your staff.

Finally, may I think you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your courtesy and consideration throughout the year.

B. Nature of the District

The district is rural in character, its main industry being agriculture. A large number of outworkers carry on glove making in their homes for factories situated outside the district. A large dairy, with a wide supply area, is situated within the district.

C. <u>Health Services in the District which are not the respons-</u> ibility of the District Council

The Hospital Service

The Yeatman Hospital (West Dorset Hospital Group of the Wessex Regional Hospital Board) provides the local hospital requirements, both in-patient and out-patient.

Laboratory Services

The Public Health Laboratory Service has again proved co-operative and efficient.

> General Medical Practitioner, Opthalmic and Pharmaceutical Services.

These are administered locally by the Dorset Executive Committee.

County Council Services

The personal preventive health services are the responsibility of the County Council

They comprise, the care of mothers and young children, maternity, school health, home nursing, mental health, the ambulance service, the care and after care of the tuberculous, blind and handicapped, health education, the domestic help service and the welfare of the aged.

Voluntary Services

Acknowledgment must be made to the excellent voluntary work carried out in the district by the British Red Cross Society.

Prevention of Disease

<u>Prophylactic Inoculations</u> Preventive inoculation against disease is the responsibility of the County Council through the school medical, child welfare and medical practitioner services.

During the year the following treatments were carried out. The figures in parenthesis are those for the preceding years.

Policmyelitis (Six months to thirty nine years)

A policmyelitis vaccination treatment session was held regularly in Sherborne on the third Friday in the month from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

D. Environmental Health Services

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF

Medical Officer of Health (Part time) - Noel F. Pearson, N.R.C.S.,L.R.C.P.,D.P.H.

He also acts as Medical Officer of Health to four other District Councils in the North Dorset area and as Assistant County Medical Officer to the Dorset County Council.

The time available which he has to devote to his duties with your Council is rather less than one half day per week.

Public Health Inspector (Part time) - J.E. Fannon, M.R.S.H., M.A.P.H.I.

The Public Health Inspector also carries out the duties of Meat Inspector, Refuse Disposal and Maintenance of the Council's sewage schemes.

Clerical Assistance - One Clerk (Part time)

WATER SUPPLY

The year saw the unlamented abandonment of the Hillfield springs source of supply.

Negotiation continued during the year toward the formation of a Water Board with the adjacent local Authorities.

Quantity

Adequate supplies have been maintained throughout the year, the Thornford borehole being the principal source of supply from the Councils sources supplemented from the Leigh supply.

A number of small private supplies remain in use in the district, the quality of which are doubtful as they arise from surface springs.

Water is taken from the Sherborne Urban District to supply parts of Castleton Parish. All the Councils supplies are chlorinated and regular samples of the public and private supplies are taken for bacteriological examination and (where applicable) free chlorine estimation.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

<u>Alweston</u> During the year the main sewerage scheme was completed.

Bradford Abbas The sewerage scheme for this parish was nearing completion at the end of the year. The provision of this scheme has resulted in large scale housing development in the parish.

<u>Yetminster</u> It is hoped and anticipated that during 1962 a scheme for the drainage of this parish will be commenced.

Oborne The drainage of this parish presents a serious problem. When the twelve Council houses were built here it was fully anticipated that a drainage scheme (in conjunction with the Sherborne Urban District Council) would be provided at an early date and very temporary drainage arrangements were made for these houses.

The time has come when these temporary arrangements are no longer tolerable, and in the absence of a scheme for the drainage of the whole village, new arrangements and works will have to be provided for the drainage of these twelve houses.

FUBLIC CLEANSING

House Refuse Collection The monthly collection has been maintained,

Towards the end of the year serious consideration was being given by the Council to providing a fortnighly collection throughout the whole district or, at least, in some of the more built up parishes.

The time has come when a fortnighly collection can be expected both on public health and amenity grounds, particularly in built up parishes.

Salvage The value of salvage sold during the year was £35 compared with £128 during the previous year. The reduced income is principally due to the difficulty in disposing of waste paper. FUBLIC CLEANSING (Continued)

<u>Cesspool Emptying</u> The contract for this work at the Council's housing sites has been continued and is operating satisfactorily.

RIVERS AND STREAMS POLLUTION

Polluted ditches in the more populous villages continue to be a major nuisance and will continue to be so until sewerage schemes can be proceeded with.

The Rivers (Prevention of Pollution) Act, 1961 has given wider powers to the Rivers Boards to control not only new discharges but also to improve conditions in respect of existing drainage systems.

When the Act comes into full operation it will be very useful as a means of dealing with polluted ditches and streams and will considerably reinforce the powers already existing under the Fublic Health Acts.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No action was called for or taken during the year.

SWIMMING BATHS

There is one open air bath at a private establishment where members of the public have occasional access by invitation.

Plans for a private swimming bath at a boarding school in this district were approved but it is not anticipated that the public will have any access to this.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS AND CAMPING SITES

Seventeen sites were licensed during the year under the Caravan Sites (Control and Development) Act, 1960. They were all for individual caravans, usually for temporary use and created no problem.

VERMINOUS PREMISES

No action was called for during the year.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The North Dorset Joint Rodent Committee, of which Sherborne Rural District Council is one of the six constituent authorities, continued to carry out the provisions of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

The work of the Committee continued to function smoothly and expeditiously.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT. 1951

There are no premises subject to registration under the above-mentioned Act, within the district.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

No premises in the district are licensed under this Act.

SCHOOLS (INCLUDING SCHOOL CANTEENS)

Twenty two visits and inspections were made at schools in respect of sanitation, meals facilities and water supplies.

During the year a new sanitary block was erected at Bishops Caundle School and connection made to the public sewer. Plans are in hand for similar improvements to Nether Compton School.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACTS, 1948 and 1951 - Section 47

No action was required to be taken during the year under these Acts with regard to the compulsory removal of persons in need of care and attention and living under insanitary conditions.

Slum Clearance

Very limited action was taken during the year with regard to slum clearance. An appreciable number of houses in the district are recognised asbeing unfit for habitation but in the absence of new houses being made available for re-housing, limited action only is practicable in enforcing closure or demolition of unfit property.

Nil

Some of these unfit houses are slowly being rendered fit. It is in respect to such property, largely, that discretionary improvement grants are sought and it is noted that only twenty such grants were sought last year compared with forty in the preceding year.

Overcrowding

No cases of statutory overcrowding were found during the year.

Houses Known to be Let in Lodgings

No houses are known to be let in lodgings.

Improvement Grants (Housing Act, 1949 and Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954).

Twenty applications (compared with forty in 1960) were received during the year for discretionary grants under the above-mentioned Act, twenty two applications were received in respect to standard grants compared with ten during the preceding year.

The provision of standard grants is undoubtedly a most valuable step towards making properties lacking basic amenities more habitable.

HOUSING (Continued)

Provision of New Houses and Re-Housing

Twenty seven new houses were built in the District by private enterprise, but, once again, none by the Council.

During the year, the Council did, however, recommence a building programme, deciding to build eight a year (primarily for old people) for the next five years. This number falls below the number which I should like to see provided and which, in my opinion, is required. Nevertheless it is to be welcomed, if only to demonstrate the Councils appreciation of the housing needs of old people in the district.

Ninety five applicants were on the Council house waiting list at the end of the year, of which eighty were resident in the district, compared with ninety five and seventy four respectively, at the end of 1960.

Fifteen families were re-housed by the Council during the year.
