

In view of the impending operation of the National Health Service Act 1946 in July next, for record purposes, it is considered worth while noting the present medical arrangements in the district.

Private Medical Practice -

There are 6 Medical Practitioners practicing wholly or in part in the district.

Professional Nursing in the home -

Under arrangement made by the Dorset County Nursing Association one. District Nurse is resident in the district.

General Hospital Facilities -

The Yeatman Hospital (60 beds) provides general hospital facilities for Sherborne and adjacent rural areas. The hospital is staffed by local Medical Practitioners. There is no visiting consulting specialist staff. The hospital is provided with a well equipped out-patient department, has a separate childrens' ward, and a maternity unit of 12 beds.

Ambulance Facilities -

One ambulance for general purposes is provided and maintained by the Sherborne & District Ambulance Committee and is stationed at the Yeatman Hospital. The infectious diseases ambulance for the North Dorset district, provided by the North Dorset Joint Hospital Board, is stationed in Sherborne. Where conveyance by car alone is necessary, provision is made by the Voluntary Hospital Car Service which is available through the county area.

Midwifery Service -

The Dorset County Council, through the agency of the County Nursing Association, provide a domiciliary midwifery service in the district. A District Nurse/Midwife is resident in Sherborne.

Maternity cases admission to hospital are admitted under the County Scheme to the Yeatman Hospital, Sherborne.

Nursing Homes -

There are no registered Nursing Homes in the district.

Laboratory Services -

The Dorset County Laboratory (a laboratory in association with the Medical Research Council) provides full laboratory facilities for the district.

Mortuary facilities are provided by the Sherborne Joint Burial Board and at the Yeatman Hospital, Sherborne. The latter mortuary is provided with suitable facilities for the carrying out of post mortem examinations.

Tuberculosis -

The tuberculosis service is provided by the Dorset County Council. The nearest available clinic is the County Clinic at Dorchester.

Venereal Disease -

The Venereal Disease Service is provided by the Dorset County Council. The nearest diagnostic and treatment clinic are held at the Yeovil Hospital.

School Health -

The School Health services are provided by the Dorset County Council. A minor ailment clinic, with a school Nurse in attendance, is held at the County Clinic at Sherborne. The nursing staff available with the Medical Officer, at routine School Medical inspections.

Child Welfare -

Child Welfare provision is made by the Dorset County Council. A health visitor is resident in Sherborne and a Child Welfare Centre is held weekly at the County Clinic.

3. DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE.

Apart from the laying of part of the sewer in North Road, the laying of new sewers to new housing sites and the relaying of surface water drainage in Coombe Road, no major works in connection with drainage or sewerage were carried out during the year.

No further steps have been taken in connection with the Consulting Engineer's report on the Council's sewage works toward the provision of new works.

4. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

8. SMOKE ABATEMENT.

Informal action was taken in connection with two complaints with regard to smoke nuisances during the year.

16.HOUSING.

Although the local authority re-housed 47 families during the year, the general position remains far from satisfactory. Many families are living under unsatisfactory conditions with little hope of improvement in the near future. Owing to the large number of applications for houses amongst persons in the district, the Council decided to delete from the waiting list, for the present time, all applicants living outside the district.

During the year 18 recommendations for the granting of additional points on medical grounds in connection with their application for a Council house, were made by the Medical Officer of Health in respect to the conditions under which 28 applicants were living, following inspections carried out by him.

Until comparatively recently a Medical Officer of Health concerned with unsatisfactory housing conditions in his area was more disposed to consider the effects of bad housing on the physical rather than the mental health of those living under unsatisfactory conditions. At the present time, whilst many persons are still living in damp, insanitary houses detrimental to their physical health, I find myself, more and more, concerned with that equally large group of persons being forced to live in circumstances which can only be calculated to have serious effects on their mental health and happiness.

Many persons in this group are newly married couples who do not enjoy the happy advantage of starting their new life in a home of their own. Many of these are having to live in unsatisfactory furnished rooms at a rent beyond their capacity. Others are forced to share a home with their 'in-laws'. In some instances this arrangement works satisfactorily, but only too often it leads to that friction and mental strife which undermines an otherwise happy relationship with disastrous results to both parents and children alike

Measles was prevalent amongst the general population during the first half of the year. In the latter quarter of the year a further increased number of notifications were received, but these were in respect to scholars in Boarding Schools in the town. 3 cases of infantile paralysis occurred during the year amongst the pupils at the Sherborne Boys and Sherborne Girls Schools.

Protection against Diphtheria.

The number of children who received treatment during the year is as follows:-

This is an improvement on the preceding year when the corresponding. figures were 35 and 5.

The 56 children (under 5 years of age) protected as compared with the number of births in the preceding year (96) suggest that a sufficient number of new babies are being protected to maintain the percentage number of children protected at a fairly satisfactory figure. Nevertheless, there is room for improvement until every child born is protected during its first year of life.

During the year you extended the scope of your scheme to provide for the giving of a 'reinforcing' injection at the time of school entry to children previously protected during their earlier years.

In order to draw the attention of all parents to the need of this 'reinforcing' treatment and in order to emphasise, to parents of children who had not already been protected, the value of treatment being given on school entry, arrangements were made with the Food Executive Officer for a suitable pamphlet to be issued with the new ration book issued to all children reaching five years of age.
