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

To the Chairman and Members, Sherborne Urban District Council.

Madam & Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report for the year 1950.

The report is prepared and will be circulated in accordance with the requirements of Article 17(5) of the Sanitary Officers (Outside London) Regulations 1935.

The report shows that the health of the district during the year has remained satisfactory, and that there has been no undue incidence of serious infectious disease apart from the 8 cases of poliomyelitis in respect of which a special report was presented to you during the year.

While writing this present report I have before me the report of your Medical Officer of Health for the year 1900. It is interesting to note that the estimated population at that time was 5,500 as compared with your present estimated population of 7,010, and that the birth rate of 50 years ago was double that of the present time, but that the death rate showed little difference.

I am indebted to Mr. Bean, your Sanitary Inspector, for his co-operation and help during the year, and for his assistance in preparing this report, and to my clerk, Miss L. Davidge, for her efficient services.



As reported last year, under the National Health Service Act 1946, the personal health services, the Ambulance Service, and the Laboratory Services, are provided by the Ministry of Health or County Council.

I do not think that it is necessary to draw your attention to any matters concerned with these services, with the exception that I should like to record that although the County Council's Domestic Help Service came into operation on the lst April, it has not been found possible to get this service operating in your district during the year.

2. WATER SUPPLY.

The only new work carried out during the year was the extension of the water mains to two new housing estates.

1889 houses in the Urban District are provided with a supply direct into the houses, 80 houses obtain their water supply by means of standpipes.

8 houses and a displaced persons camp (approximately 750 inhabitants) in the area of the Sherborne Rural District, also have a domestic water supply from your Council.

The supply has remained adequate in quantity throughout the year. The quality from each source has remained satisfactory.

95 bacteriological and 6 chemical examinations were carried out on the supplies during the year. In addition 35% informal free chlorine tests were made. The water is subjected to finitation and chlorination before use. On chemical examination the supplies were found to have a fluorine content of from 0.13 to 0.24 parts per million. A number of private well supplies are used in the district for industrial purposes. A new borehole 200 feet deep and 10" diameter was sunk by the Sherborne Laundry during the year. Constant supervision of these supplies is maintained in connection with which 30 samples of water were taken and submitted for bacteriological examination.

3. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

No major works were carried out during the year. A new sewer in connection with 52 houses erected on a new housing site was laid.

4. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

- (a) House Refuse. The Local Authority's scheme provides for the collection of house refuse weekly and disposal by controlled tipping.
- (b) Salvage. During the year salvage was collected only as part of normal refuse collection, except kitchen waste which continued as a special collection until the 15th April.

8. SMOKE ABATEMENT.

Observations and informal action was taken in connection with two cases of smoke nuisance, which were, as a result, remedied.

9. SWIMMING BATHS.

There is one private swimming bath in the district, available for use by the public during part of the year. When used by the public the bath is under the control of the local authority, when the water is subject to chlorination.

10. CAMPING SITES.

Licences were granted in connection with four caravan sites during the year.

11. VERMINOUS PREMISES.

No action was called for or taken during the year.

12. KATS AND MICE.

The apparent marked decrease locally in the rat population, noted in my report for last year, still continues. The scheme operated by the North Derset Joint Redent Committee has continued to work satisfactorily during the year. It is proposed to continue to use this Joint Committee in connection with giving effect to the relevant sections of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949.

14. SCHOOLS.

Subject to agreement being reached as to charges, the Urban District Council has undertaken to carry out drain tests of school premises in the district under the central of the Derset County Council.

By private enterprise 3 new houses were built, and by conversion 3 additional units of accommodation were provided.

Housing Act 1949.

One application for an Improvement Grant under this Act was received during the year, but in so far as it did not comply with the conditions laid down by the Ministry, it was refused.

During the year 11 recommendations for the granting of additional points on medical grounds in connection with their application for a Council house, were made by the Medical Officer of Health in respect of the conditions under which 11 applicants were living, following inspections carried out by him.

Comments.

It will be seen from the above-mentioned figures that the only action taken by the Council during the year in connection with housing has been the provision of 14 new dwellings.

Action is called for in connection with many dwellings in the district which are sub-standard. It is true that with so limited a 'licensing ceiling' it would not be possible to effect all the improvements which are called for in such property, and that until many more new houses are available, those persons at present living in accommodation fit only for closure and demolition, could not be provided with alternative accommodation. Nevertheless, however, I do feel that the Council should consider what their policy is to be, not only in connection with the provision of new houses, but with regard to what can now only be described as slum property within the district.

Rent Charges.

There appears to be an increasing tendency of applicants for Council houses having to refuse a house when effered to them on account of the higher rents which are now being charged, and an increase in the number of occupants living in the newer Council houses who seek transfer to older and lower rented houses.

If this tendency continues, the whole principal of housing by local authorities will be negatived, for those with large families living in sub-standard houses will be the first to have to refuse a Council house when effered to them, and it is for such families that local authorities were first empowered to provide houses.

It is not difficult to appreciate that a large family who are possibly somewhat unthrifty and who are living under very unsatisfactory conditions cannot accept the offer of a highly rented Council house. Less obvious is the problem of the thrifty black-coated (or semi black-coated) worker in the lower income group who is anxious to maintain as decent a standard as possible for his wife and family, but who finds a high rent takes an undue proportion from his pay packet. If such an applicant accepts a highly rented house, some deprivations must be endured. It is the wife and mother who first goes hungry.

Pearing in mind that the new houses now provided are to last for at least 60 years, I do not feel that the standard of new houses, as laid down by the Ministry of Health, can reasonably be reduced to an appreciable extent.

It is argued by some that the persons in the higher income groups should not be allowed to occupy subsidized houses, at the same time we see that there are those in the lowest income groups who are often unable to afford to live in these houses.

It would appear that consideration of a differential rent scheme might prove necessary to overcome this anomaly.
