#### B. Nature of the District

Sherborne is a trading centre of an agricultural area, as well as being a tourist and educational centre. Principal industries include light engineering, glove making, dairies and silk mills.

#### C. Health Services in the District which are not the responsibility of the District Council.

#### The Hospital Service

The Yeatman Hospital (West Dorset Hospital Group of the Wessex Regional Hospital Board) provides the local hospital requirements, both in-patient and out-patient.

#### Laboratory Services

The Public Health Laboratory Service has again proved co-operative and efficient.

# General Medical Practitioner, Ophthalmic and Pharmaceutical Services

These are administered locally by the Dorset Executive Committee.

#### County Council Services

The personal preventive health services are the responsibility of the Dorset County Council, which include, the care of mothers and young children, maternity, school health, home nursing, mental health, the ambulance service, care and after care of the blind and handicapped and health education. The following responsibilities call for particular comment.

The Domestic Help Service The appointment of a part time paid local organiser for the North Dorset area has increased the efficiency of the service in your district. Some difficulty is experienced in obtaining a sufficient number of home helps in view of the alternate demands on available persons in Sherborne, but the service in your district can now be considered to be reasonably satisfactory.

The Welfare of Aged People Through its well organised scheme (including the co-ordinated services of the Health visiting, domestic help, home nursing services and the social welfare officer) the increasing responsibilities in respect to old people are being efficiently carried out. The lack of an adequte number of hospital beds for the chronic and aged sick puts a particular strain on the County Council's services at some times of the year. An efficient scheme is in operation to ensure that, as far as possible the best use is made of the beds available and the available places in the County Council's homes for old people.

The valuable work which the Dorset Branch of the British Red Cross Society does towards the welfare of old people in the district requires acknowledgment. Acting as agent for the County Council, amongst its other activities, the British Red Cross has established foct clinics throughout the County.

In Sherborne three

or four treatment sessions are held a month with an average attendance of nine persons for treatment. Forty five patients were on the register at the end of the year.

Mention should also be made of the scheme under which the County Council makes financial assistance available to the local housing authority for welfare provisions in connection with houses built for the particular needs of old people.

Problem Families In an attempt to prevent the break up of families both from humane considerations and the resultant financial cost, the County Council co-operate closely with the housing authority by rent guarantees and other action, as may appear appropriate.

Prophylactic Inoculations Preventive inoculation against disease is the responsibility of the County Council through the school medical, child welfare and medical practitioner services.

During the year the following treatments were carried out. The figures in parenthesis are those for the preceding years.

### Poliomyelitis (Six months to thirty nine years)

A poliomyelitis vaccination treatment session was held regularly in Sherborne on the third Friday in the month from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Supplies remained satisfactory and adequate throughout the year.

107 regular monthly samples from the Council's supplies were submitted for bacteriological examination and two samples were submitted for chemical examination. Daily testing of the supplies for residual chlorine was carried out. The fluorine content of the supplies was shown to be between 0.2 and 0.3 parts per million.

A number of private well supplies are used in the district for industrial purposes. From these supplies twenty samples of water were taken and submitted for bacteriological examination during the year.

#### Wessex Water Board

During the year negotiations were still being pursued between your Council and the following local Authorities to form a joint water board - Yoevil and Chard Borough Councils; Crewkerne and Ilminster Urban District Councils and Sherborne, Chard, Langport, Yeovil and Wincanton Rural District Councils.

#### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The alterations and improvements at the sewage disposal works at the cost of £32,109 were almost completed during the year.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING

House Refuse The Council's scheme provides for the collection of house refuse weekly and disposal by controlled tipping.

Salvage Fifty nine tons of paper and two tons of rags were collected during the year.

Cesspool Emptying No provision is required to be made in the district.

#### RIVERS AND STREAMS POLLUTION

No action was called for or taken during the year.

#### SHOPS ACTS

In addition to the Council's direct responsibilities under the Shops Act, 1950, the Council has also had delegated to it the County Council's functions under Section 38(3) (4) and (5) of the Act.

#### SMOKE ABATEMENT

Forty-nine observations and visits to plants were made during the year. The provision of two new oil fired installations and the closing down of one plant, towards the end of the year, proved successful in abating some long standing nuisances.

#### MOVEABLE DWELLINGS AND CAMPING SITES

The number of moveable dwellings licensed during the year under the Public Health Act, 1936 was fifteen.

The coming into operation of the Caravan Sites Control and Development Act, 1960 was most welcome. As a result no application was made for planning permission for continued use of the least satisfactory site in the district. At the end of the year the future of the remaining site was undetermined.

It does appear essential that, if caravans are accepted as suitable long term dwellings, a statutory standard for overcrowding should be laid down in the same manner as is done in respect to dwelling houses.

#### VERMINOUS PREMISES

Disinfestation against vermin was carried out at one house following the death of the tenant prior to the disposal of the effects.

At seven houses clusters of flies (musca autumnalis) were dealt with. A troublesome infestation with silver fish and one with cockroaches were successfully dealt with

#### PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The duties of the District Council under the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949 are carried out in the district by the North Dorset Joint Rodent Committee whose activities cover the five districts in North Dorset and the Beaminster Rural District.

The total treatments undertaken in the district during the year numbered two hundred and fifty eight compared with four hundred and fifty eight during the previous year.

#### SANITATION OF SCHOOLS AND SCHOOL CANTEENS

Redecoration of the central school kitchen and dining room at Simon Road was carried out. The general standard of hygiene remained satisfactory.

The sanitary accommodation at the Council school has been improved but sanitary accommodation at the Abbey School (trough closets) remains unsatisfactory and it is hoped that action will be taken to replace these with more hygienic sanitary facilities.

No action was called for or taken during the year toward the compulsory removal of a person requiring care and attention under the Act.

#### Slum Clearance

Clearance areas represented in 1959 were confirmed during the year and two sites were cleared for new housing development.

No further proposed clearance areas or individual unfit houses were represented to you during the year.

It is anticipated that further representations will be made during 1961. These, will of course, be in respect to houses considered to be unfit for human occupation by the very low standard of fitness laid down in the Housing Act, 1958.

In addition to the remaining houses of this category in your district, there are a considerable number which although not 'unfit' within the meaning of the Housing Act, are by all reasonable standards in the present state of society unfit for family use. A fixed bath and a running hot water supply, a readily accessible W.C. are no longer mere amenities, but, it is suggested, present day necessities.

Eighty six of the before-mentioned 'food premises' were inspected during the year, one hundred and twenty inspections being carried out.

Co-operation was obtained in the enforcement of the Food Hygiene Regulations and no 'exemption certificates' were recommended or granted. Constant supervision of the market stalls is required.

Byelaws in respect of the Handling and Wrapping of Food etc., are operative in the district.

Disposal of Condemned Food All food condemned at food shops is disposed of at the refuse tip and meat from the slaughterhouses at a knackers yard.

#### Slaughterhouses

There are two licensed slaughterhouses in the district. The appointed day by which these two slaughterhouses are required to comply with the structural regulations in accordance with the Slaughterhouse Act, 1958 is April 1st, 1961.

From the following table it will be seen that the total number of animals slaughtered in the two slaughterhouses rose to 13,078 an increase of 2,804 over 1959. The number of carcases for 'export' rose by 3,261 an increase of 50% on the 1959 total.

No cattle were found to be affected with tuberculosis - a record.

Six hundred and fifty seven visits were made to the slaughterhouses by the Meat Inspector.
