GENERAL.

The area covered by the Salop Education Authority comprises 861,800 acres, and has an estimated population of 241,000. This includes the area represented by the Borough of Shrewsbury, which is an independent Authority for Elementary Education.

At the end of 1940, there were 272 Elementary Schools, comprising 299 departments and 27,991 children were on the register.

The Staff consisted of the School Medical Officer, the Deputy School Medical Officer, six Assistant School and Child Welfare Medical Officers and four Dental Officers.

Changes occurring during the year were the departure for Military Service of Dr. Moore and Mr. Evans, L.D.S. These vacancies were filled early in 1941 by the appointment, on a temporary basis, of Dr. E. M. McKendrick and Mr. N. I. Smith, L.D.S.

In addition to the Medical Officers and Dental Officers above mentioned, the staff during the year consisted of :--

- 4 Dental Attendants.
- 1 Whole-time School Nurse.
- 13 Health Visitors undertaking school nursing.
- 43 District Nurses undertaking school nursing.
- 2 Nurses working independently.

MEDICAL INSPECTION AND TREATMENT.

Despite the disturbances caused by the war, medical inspection and treatment have continued with no appreciable curtailment. This has been possible owing to the appointment of an additional Assistant School Medical Officer shortly before the war began, an addition which enabled the service to be largely maintained in spite of the sudden increase in the school population caused by evacuation.

There were no changes in the arrangements for medical, dental and cleanliness inspections and no substantial alterations in the arrangements for the various forms of treatment or the provision of solid meals or milk.

The number of officially evacuated children in the County at the commencement of the year had fallen to a fraction of the number which arrived in September, 1939, and it continued to decline until late in 1940 when official evacuation was resumed. Medical Inspection of evacuees was carried out exactly on the same lines as for local children, and the facilities for treatment were made equally available, 284 children being treated, 258 for eye defects, 5 for ear and 20 throat defects; also 1,213 evacuated children received dental treatment.

Cleanliness inspection, carried out on the pre-war standard, revealed that the evacuated children were brought practically to the same standard of cleanliness as local children.

STATISTICAL TABLES.

No distinction is made between children ordinarily attending schools in the area and children who have transferred to the area as a result of evacuation.
