Hospitals.

1. A Cottage Hospital of 14 beds.
2. A Fever Hospital at Whipton near Exeter. This is supported by local contributions, and provided by the Devon County Council. We have the right to its use if accommodation is available.

Ambulance Facilities.

For infectious cases we have a Trailer which can be attached to the back of a Motor Car.

Causes of Sickness.

There has been little serious illness, and none so far as I know worthy of special notice.

Midwives.

There is a fully trained midwife employed by the Maternity and Infant Welfare Centre towards whose maintenance the Local Authority contributes £5 annually.

Treatment Centres.

There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Centre which, apart from the grant of the Ministry of Health, is dependent upon Private Subscriptions. The centre is managed by a Committee of which your Medical Officer is Chairman.

Laboratory Work.

Bacteriological Outfits are supplied by the County M. O. H. .
We however keep in stock Diphtheria Antitoxin which is available
for poor people without charge.

Slaughter-houses.

10 visits were paid.

They are kept in a cleanly state for the most part.

Dairies, Cowsheds and farms.

31 visits were paid.

Houses.

In consequence of the flooding of houses by the inroads of
the sea, during the autumn I paid nearly 100 visits. Where the
residents were poor help was given in the form of a supply of coal.

I have inspected 206 houses during the year, going into every
room.

As I said a year ago there is a serious shortage of houses
suitable for the working class. There are many which fall much
below a modern standard, and even in these I have noted several
cases of overcrowding with which I have been powerless to deal.

I have urged the Council to build, but the serious injury to
the Esplanade and the consequent large increase of the rates
naturally makes them anxious to avoid further expenses
