

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER 1948.

To the Chairman and Members of the Sidmouth Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Mombers,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the public health of the Urban District for the year ending 31st December 1948.

The report conforms as closely as possible with the requirements laid down in the Ministry of Health circular No. 3/49 dated 17th January 1949.

- (b) (i) Laboratory Macilities: These are provided by the Public Health Laboratory Service, Exeter.
 - (ii) <u>Ambulance Facilities</u>. Up to the coming into force of the National insurance Act on the 5th July 1948 an excellent and adequate ambulance service was provided by the Sidmouth Division of the St. John's Ambulance Brigade, which possesses a motor ambulance.
 - (ii) <u>Nursing in the Home. Clinic and Hospitals</u>. The Queen's Nurse and District Murses attend to cases requiring nursing in their own homes. These nurses also attend the Child Welfare Clinics and provide anto-natal services.

The up-to-date local hospital, the Victoria Cottago Hospital, provides facilities for every type of case requiring hospital treatments. It is affiliated to the Royal Deven and Exeter Hespital. Infectious cases are by arrangement with the City of Exeter admitted to the Whipton Isolation Hospital. On the 5th July 1948 the Victoria Cottage Hospital came under the National Insurance Act.

(iv) <u>Maternity</u>. During recent years pressure on housing accommodation and social changes which are taking place make it increasingly difficult for maternity cases to be confined in their own homes. This applies to all classes of the residential and visiting population. It was of great advantage that until 5th July 1943, the Devon County Council maintained a temporary Maternity Home at The Grove. This temporary homse functioned most efficiently and was greatly appreciated by the townspeeple.

A permanent Maternity Home in Sidmouth will meet a great local need when conditions allow of one being purchased or built. Sidmouth, both as a health resort and as a growing centre of population, has always attracted a high class of modical practitioner, and it would seem anomalous that where such medical skill is available maternity cases should be sent outside the tewn.

SECTION C. Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

- 1. WATER.
 - (i) The water supply of the area has been satisfactory in both quantity and quality, excepting the supply of Salcombe Regis Village for which an entirely new supply has been planned and awaits being put in hand.
 - (ii) Twonty-five samples were submitted for bacteriological examination and three samples for chemical examination. All waters after chlorination were quite satisfactory.
 - (iii) The supply from all springs which yield plumbo solvent water is passed through beds of limestone chippings.

- (iv) The Salcombe R_egis supply referred to in sub-paragraph (i) has, during the past few years, been under frequent examination for contamination, both bacteriologically and chemically and, although the chemical analysis is good, local contamination, as shown by the bacteriological reports together with an inadequate storage and distribution system, has led the Council to obtain the advice of a Consulting Engineer who has drawn up a scheme for pumping water from the Council's mains.
- (v) There are 3192 dwolling houses in the area, of which 3168 are supplied direct from the mains. The remainder (24) are fed by standpipes and these are mainly in the Parish of Sidbury, which has a private supply maintained by the Sidbury Manor Estate.

2. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Over a considerable period it has been found that the storm water relief chamber in Fry's field is inadequate to deal with the stormwater at this outlet.

This stormwater outlet is situated just above the point where the Sid is joined by the Woelbrook stream. This stormwater outlet is from the 12 inch sewer coming down from Sidford. Below this outlet the 12 inch sewer passes on as a 9 inch sewer and crosses under the Sid.

A comprehensive survey of both sewers has been carried out and plans for a new twelve inch sewer to replace the nine inch sewer have been submitted to, and approved, by the Ministry.

Since the twelve inch Sidford sower was constructed, large extensions of building have taken place in the area which it drains.

3. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

Under this heading and the previous heading "Drainage and Sewerage", it is appropriate to report on a search for Typhoid carriers.

The search of the area for the detection of typhoid carriers has been continued throughout the year and on the 9th December 1948 the typhoid organism of the same phage type as the cases which had been occurring over several years was detected.

The Public Health Laboratory Service have rendered most able help in this arduous investigation.


