B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

- 1. Public Health Officers.—A complete list was given at the front of the Report for 1938. Geoffrey N. Dean, A.R.S.I., M.S.I.A., replaced Mr. Fallows in August, 1939, and was called up for Military Service in April, 1940.

- 8. Hospitals.—There are no changes to report in the statement given in the Report for 1930. The proposed plans for the enlargement and reconstruction of the Solihull and Meriden Joint Isolation Hospital, Catherine-de-Barnes, have, perforce, had to be deferred.
- 13. Ambulance Facilities.—The Ambulances are housed at the Fire Station, Streetsbrook Road, Solihull. Telephone 2222 Solihull. The ambulance turned out to 407 calls during the year.

C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

1. (i) Water Supply.—The mains of the City of Birmingham and City of Coventry Water Departments are available for practically the whole of the populous parts of the Urban District. More than two-thirds of the houses in the District are so supplied. This number is constantly increasing.

There are approximately 837 private wells supplying 1,210 houses.

The number of new houses with regard to which occupation certificates have been granted during the year under the Public Health Act, 1936, with respect to water supplies from private wells, was 11.

(ii) Drainage and Sewerage.—Conditions remain much the same as was indicated in the last Report.

The three Cesspool Emptying Machines are kept very fully employed; there are about 572 Cesspools in the District,

3. (i) Closet Accommodation.—About four-fifths of the Closets are water flushed. It is estimated that there are about 900 Pail Closets in the District, of which 850 are emptied weekly by the Local Authority; in special cases this work is done twice weekly.

During the year 3 pails have been converted into water closets.

(ii) Public Cleansing.—Schemes are in operation throughout the whole of the District.

House refuse is removed from about 17,110 dwelling houses; 16,750 houses have ash-bins.

The system of "Controlled Tipping" is in use, and all the Tips are well kept and a credit to the Council.

- (iv) Shops Act, 1934.—Number of Shops, 676.
- (vi) SMOKE ABATEMENT.—Complaints were received with respect to 2 premises viz., brickworks.

Schools.—The Elementary Schools and private schools of the District have been inspected as occasion arose.

RATS.—Occasional complaints have been received with respect to Rats, and advice and baits have been given where necessary.

Mosquitoes.—No complaints were received during the year.

RAG FLOCK ACT.—No samples were taken. The material is apparently not used in the District.

D. HOUSING.

Full particulars of the usual table have been compiled and are being kept for record purposes.

- 3. Overcrowding.—There were 19 dwelling houses overcrowded at the end of the year, including 4 additional cases which were found during the year. 9 cases were abated during the year.
- 4. Fitness of Houses.—Routine inspection of houses was continued, and there is no doubt that the appointment of an additional Inspector would have enabled us to carry on this work at an increased pace.

Water Supply.—Where the water mains are available, it is the rule for the supply to be taken into the houses. When the only supply is from wells, the pump is almost invariably inside.

During the year the intensive investigation into the condition of water supply in the District has been continued, and the table here given will show the result of such examination :-

- 6. During the year 1 Demolition Order under Sections 11 and 13 of the Housing Act, 1936, was made by the Council; 3 dwellings were demolished either by the Council or the Owners, and 2 were demolished without the making of Orders.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—At the end of the year 1939 there were on the Register, Cowkeepers 90, Cowkeepers who retail the whole or part of their milk 46, Retailers 114, and Milkshops 53.

Licences have been applied for and granted for the sale of Tuberculin Tested Milk and Pasteurised Milk.

Tuberculous Milk.—38 samples of milk were sent to the Birmingham University to be examined for the presence of Tubercle Bacilli; the Bacilli were present in 4 samples. As the samples were "mixed ones," this is a good result.

60 new cases of tuberculosis were notified during the year, 46 being of Fulmonary Tuberculosis and 14 of other forms.

15 cases were admitted to Sanatorium during the year, 22 were discharged after treatment.

13 deaths were due to Pulmonary tuberculosis, 1 to Non-Pulmonary tuberculosis. Of the 60 cases notified during the year, 6 died.
