To the Chairman (Alderman S.A. Sadler, J.P.) and Members of the
River Tees Port Health Authority.

GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in submitting the FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT on the work of the River Tees Port Health Authority for the year ended December 31st, 1941.

The Ministry of Health has indicated that having regard to the desirability of reducing the number of records to be kept and to avoid, as far as possible, the disclosure of information relating to the movements of ships, it is desired that some modification of Annual Reports should be made during the period of the Emergency. Furthermore, it is indicated that the Report should not be published. In accordance with these instructions this Report has been modified considerably.
