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



To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors.

MR. MAYOR, LADY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the health statistics of the Borough of Ryde for the year ending December, 1938.

The report is arranged in accordance with Circular 1728 of the Ministry of Health and is therefore limited to a record of alterations, improvements or developments which have taken place during the year of review, there is therefore no repetition of details which have appeared in previous reports, to which reference can be made for information on such matters.

There are no noteworthy conditions prejudicial to the health of inhabitants of this area, and the Borough is singularly fortunate in respect of the incidence of epidemic illness.

No special action has therefore been considered necessary to arouse the public interest in the prevention of ill-health.

B.—General Provision of Health Services.

During the year under review, certain changes have been provided or are under consideration as follows:—

- (a) Laboratory facilities. In addition to the County Hall Laboratory a new one has been established in connection with the County Hospital.
- (b) Ambulance facilities. The only ambulance available is the one provided by the County Hospital. The question of provision of an ambulance by the Borough is at present under negotiation.
- (c) Nursing in the home. Inauguration of voluntary contributory scheme.

Maternity & Child Welfare Work.

Midwifery Services. These are under the jurisdiction of the County Council as Supervising Authority. There were sixteen mid-wives practising in the area, nine of these nurses working under the respective Nursing Associations.

C.—Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.	
Water.	
The supply of water during the peak of the seaso	n

The supply of water during the peak of the season proved inadequate and it became necessary to restrict the hours of service in order to conserve a margin of safety.

The shortage was due to a preceding period of drought and to a breakdown in pumping plant.

Every effort was made to restore a continuous service, and to take immediate steps to provide adequate means of pumping to ensure avoidance of such a recurrence. The machinery and improvements in the Mill Well, together with a further boring into the lower greensand strata should yield an abundant supply for the town and outlying districts.

Rivers and Streams.

The Eastern Yar river terminates on marshy ground within the vicinity of the St. Helens Area of the Borough. It is somewhat polluted but gives rise to no offence.

Closet Accommodation.

Practically all closets are water flushed and connected to sewers. Others in the more rural parts of the area drain to cesspools.

Sanitary Inspection.

This is ably carried out and details will be found in the Sanitary Inspector's report.

Shops.

Swimming Baths and Pools.

There are none in the area. The open sea at suitable tides affords natural sea bathing amenities.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

See Sanitary Inspector's report.

Schools.

The sanitary arrangements at the schools are generally satisfactory. Considerable improvements are from time to time effected by replacements with modern sanitary fittings.

Overcrowding.-Housing Act, 1936.

As will be seen from housing statistics included in the Sanitary Inspector's report, a small number of houses remain overcrowded. This matter has been reported upon and certain recommendations for mitigation made which are receiving the Council's appropriate consideration.

D.—Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and other Diseases.

Notification of infectious disease in the Borough is effective, and from the tabulation it will be observed that hospitalization of all cases of Diphtheria was arranged.

Serum is available for the treatment of cases of Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, and Puerperal Sepsis, but the incidence of Diphtheria is obviously too small to warrant the provision of routine immunization of the child population.

Cancer.

The total number of registered deaths occurring among Borough residents was 20 males and 30 females.

The County Hospital, situated within the Borough, is available for diagnosis and treatment by a Specialist Surgeon, and suitable cases can be admitted to the National Radium Centre at Southampton Hospital.

Prevention of Blindness.

No action under Section 66 of the Public Health Act, 1925 was necessary in the matter of treatment of persons suffering from any disease or injury of the eyes

Two cases of Opthalmia Neonatorum were notified. There was no impairment of vision following in either case.

Tuberculosis.

At the beginning of the year there were 83 cases on the register. During the year 15 new cases were added to the register, including three transfers from the mainland. In addition, seven cases were transferred from other areas in the Island, and one case which had previously left the Island returned. This made a total of 106 cases in the district during the year. Of these, 12 died, 11 left the district, two recovered, two were "mistaken" diagnosis, and one was lost sight of, leaving 78 on the register at the close of the year. Of these, 52 were pulmonary, and 26 were non-pulmonary.

In addition, two deaths of an unnotified cases occurred. One pulmonary male and one non-pulmonary female.

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the Borough of Ryde.

Mr. Mayor, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting for your consideration, my Report for the year 1938.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Slaughterhouses and Meat Inspection.

The five registered slaughterhouses within the area have been maintained in a cleanly state and in accordance with the byelaws governing them throughout the year. One thousand one hundred and one visits were made thereto.

Slaughtering takes place at regular hours on certain days of the week and should animals have to be slaughtered at times other than those fixed, due notice of the time and place has to be given.

Mechanically operated instruments are in use. Pigs are electrically stunned at one slaughterhouse and the Cash Pistol is in use at the remainder.

Twelve persons are licenced to slaughter; all are well skilled in their work.

Bakehouses.

There are twenty-six registered bakehouses in the area. The interior walls and ceilings of 25 premises were cleansed and limewashed on request.

Milk Supply.

Milk is produced at 65 dairy farms in the area; 62 persons are registered as producer relailers or wholesalers and 26 as retailers only. 241 visits were made to premises in connection with the administration of the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926. The interior walls and ceilings of 44 premises were limewashed on request.

Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936 and 1938.

The following designations now apply to milk:—
Tuberculin Tested,
Accredited,
Pasteurised.

Tuberculin Tested milk is produced at a local dairy farm licensed by the Minister of Health and two dealers were licensed by this Authority to retail Tuberculin Tested milk from local milkshops.

No application for a licence to sell pasteurised milk was received.

No milk samples were examined for bacterial content or tubercle bacilli.

Food Analysis.

The Isle of Wight County Council is the Authority for the administration of the Food and Drugs Acts in the area and their officials have purchased for analysis—22 samples of milk, 5 of lard, 3 of pork sausages and 2 of beef sausages.

Two samples of milk were certified to contain added water and were deficient in milk fat and one was certified to be deficient in milk fat. Proceedings were taken in these cases and were dismissed by the Justices on the defence that the milk was sold as it came from the cows. One informal sample was also certified to be deficient in milk fat. All the remainder were certified to be of genuine quality.

Ice Cream.

Sixty-six inspections were made of premises where ice cream is made, stored or sold with a view to ensuring the maintenance of clean and hygienic conditions in connection with the production, storage and distribution of this commodity.

Administration of Shops Acts.

The present code of law relating to shops and employment in connection therewith is to be found in seven Acts of Parliament, in Regulations made by the Home Secretary and Orders made by local Authorities "The statutes are:—

- 1. The Shops Act, 1912.
- 2. The Shops Act, 1913.
- 3. The Shops (Hours of Closing) Act, 1928.
- 4. The Shops Act, 1934.
- The Shops Act, 1936.
- The Retail Meat Dealers Shops (Sunday Closing) Act, 1936.
- The Shops (Sunday Trading) Restriction Act, 1936.

These measures deal with (a) evening closing of shops, (b) closing of shops on the early closing day, (c) shop assistants half-holidays and hours of employment, (d) arrangements for the welfare of shop assistants, (e) closing of shops on Sunday, (f) trading otherwise than in shops, and (g) administration and procedure.

The purposes sought to be achieved can be stated briefly. They are (1) to secure reasonable working hours and conditions of labour for shop assistants and (2) to secure for shop keepers opportunity for rest and recreation.

Four hundred and seventy nine visits were made to shops in connection with the administration of the Acts.

Smoke Abatement.

No action was found to be necessary regarding the abatement of nuisance from smoke.

Rats and Mice (Destruction) Acts.

Investigations are made on complaint of rat infestation of premises and advice is given as to the most suitable methods of destruction. Responsibility for extermination is upon the occupier of infested premises.

Rent and Mortgage Interest Restrictions Act, 1923.

No application for a certificate under this Act was received during the year.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

Ten privately owned houses were found to be infested. No infestation was reported in Council houses.

All the infested houses were disinfested by the staff of the department by means of "Cimex" fumigators or Zaldecide Insecticide.

Careful investigation is made and all necessary precautionary measures are taken to ensure that the belongings of tenants of privately owned houses are free from vermin before removal to Council houses, and advice is given as to the measures to be taken to prevent infestation or reinfestation after cleansing.

Camping Sites.

Twenty-two sites were used for camping for periods not exceeding forty-two consecutive days or sixty non-consecutive days and 1,500 is the estimated maximum number of campers resident in the area, at one time, during the summer season.

No licences were issued during the year. Fifty-five inspections of camping sites were made, all of which were found to be well arranged and maintained in a sanitary condition.

Factories Act, 1937.

Inspections were made of twenty-one power factories, 129 non-power factories and seven offices, thirty-five defects were observed and thirty-two of these had been remedied at the end of the year.
