Mr. Mayor, Chairmen, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the South West Kent Joint Health Area for 1972. This year, to assist collation and comparisons of figures, reports for the separate districts are published together in one volume. In this way the figures may be readily added to give a population sufficient to see trends and make reasonable statistical deductions. It is of interest that the new health districts envisaged under reorganisation will be of this size, and indeed locally may well correspond geographically with the present Joint Health Area.

The estimated mid-year population of the Area, given by the Registrar-General, was 199,710, an increase of 1,430 over the mid-1971 figure of 198,280. The figure for England and Wales was 49,028,900.

The total number of registered live births was 2,739, compared with 2,844 in 1971. The crude birth rate was 13.7 per 1,000 population; the rate for England and Wales was 14.7.

Deaths of infants under one year of age totalled 30, giving an infant mortality rate of 10.9 per 1,000 live births. The rate for England & Wales was 17.3. A table on page 14 gives individual figures for each district.

Deaths from all causes numbered 2,358, compared with 2,217 in 1971. The crude death rate per 1,000 population was 11.8; the rate for England & Wales was 12.1.

There were 130 deaths from Cancer of the Lung and Bronchus (97 males and 33 females), compared with 133 in 1971.

Tables giving the number of notifiable infectious disease for each of the constituent authorities are given on pages 16 to 19. Again measles accounted for most of the cases notified.

The Mass Radiography Unit continued fortnightly visits to Tonbridge and Tunbridge Wells, and the number of persons attending for x-ray during the year was 1,624 (1,741) and 2,341 (2,129) respectively. Figures in brackets give the numbers attending in 1971.

Influenza vaccination was once again offered to all Council employees, since this is generally available under the National Health Service only to key personnel and to certain classes of patients at special risk. In the event this was a non-epidemic year.

Tuberculosis has become, with modern treatment, a rare cause of death, either primary or contributory, obscuring the fact not only that it causes more deaths than any other infectious disease, but also that the death rate no longer represents the burden of this disease in the community. Accordingly, an attempt has been made, in consultation with the Chest Physicians, to overhaul our tuberculosis registers, a difficult task in a disease with chronic and longstanding forms, in order that our figures may reflect more accurately the prevalence of this disease.

The pages that follow record in simple terms the births and deaths in our community, and the sanitary circumstances of the districts. It is difficult to relate one to the other within the short space of a year, but instructive to look at it in a broader sense.

Local government grew over the last century or so mainly to administer successive Public Health Acts designed to improve our housing, drainage and paving of our streets, removal of rubbish, provision of pure water, control over food and reduce infectious disease. This was effected against a backcloth of poverty, ignorance and apathy, and provided a steady improvement in our wellbeing, shown most simply in the lengthening span of life of the individual from year to year. This was achieved by environmental sanitation before the advent of penicillin and the great strides in medicine of the last twenty years. Indeed, during these twenty years, for the first time, the rate of improvement has faltered, the graph flattened, and the expectation of life improved little, and this at a time when we spend more and more on our personal health services.

It may be felt in this report that enumerating deaths is a crude way of judging life. Unfortunately death rates are the only reliable index at present available, though it may well be that meaningful figures for sickness will soon be available to help assess and plan our services for health on a more rational basis.

In conclusion, I would wish to record once again my gratitude for the co-operation of my colleagues and friends, and indeed from all the Councils and their staffs, and more expressly to thank the Health Departments and their Chief Officers for all the work embodied in the report.

HEALTH SERVICES

Ambulance Facilities

Domiciliary Midwifery

The County Council arranges for the free attendance of midwives upon patients who are to be confined at home. The name and address of the appropriate midwife for any particular district is usually known to the patient's doctor, but can be obtained from the Area Office of the Kent County Council.

Home Nursing Service

The County Council provides a service free of charge for the attendance on persons whose doctors require them to be nursed in their own homes. The nurse's attendance is normally arranged by the doctor, but the name and address of the appropriate nurse for any particular district is obtainable from the Area Office of the County Council.

Home Help Service

Home help service may be provided in households where it is needed owing to the presence of a person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, aged, handicapped as a result of having suffered from illness or congenital deformity, or a child not over compulsory school age, but only where there is no able-bodied person in the household capable of carrying out the necessary household duties.

Night and Evening Service

Evening service is provided for elderly people who are bedridden or housebound and have no one to assist them to prepare for the night, and includes the provision of a light meal or hot drink, and attention to fires. Night service is provided, for no longer than three weeks unless there are exceptional circumstances, for the care of seriously ill people who are living in their own homes and who need attention during the night. In some cases the service is provided for one to three nights a week to give relief to relatives.

Family Care Service

This service is provided for the short-term care of children in their own homes during the absence of the mother by reason of admission to hospital for illness or confinement, or in other special circumstances. Help is given only to families where care of at least two children is involved and the period of service is limited to three months.

Family Welfare Service

This service is provided, with the parents' consent, in households where the habits, behaviour and standards of living of the family are much below those generally accepted in the society in which they live. The three main objectives of the service are to raise the standard of living of the families, to improve the welfare of the children, and to keep the families together and prevent their break-up. Intensive training for a period of three months is given and this is succeeded by a follow-on service for nine months. In families where there is medical evidence of mental subnormality the continuance of the service after the initial period of three months may be approved for not more than twelve hours a week until the youngest child reaches compulsory school age.

During the year 52 yards of 3" and 487 yards of 4" mains were laid by The Mid Kent Water Company, and the company now supply water to 1,864 houses in the District.

Agreement has been reached with the Water Company for the laying of a main along the A.21 in Kilndown Parish and the work is now about to be commenced.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

The reconstruction of the Sewage Works at Cranbrook was completed during the year and they were formally opened in September. The works are designed to deal with a population of 6,500 and provision is made to construct additional treatment units in the future to deal with increasing flows.

Work has been commenced and good progress made in sewerage Curtisden Green, Goudhurst, the flow to be pumped to the new sewage works at Horsmonden constructed to receive and treat sewage for parts of Tonbridge, Maidstone and Cranbrook Rural Districts.

3. Refuse Collection and Disposal

Collections have continued as last year using the tip at Flishinghurst, Cranbrook. A total of 206 special collections have been made, the Skevibin service has been continued so that householders can dispose of their own bulky rubbish.

One man with a van is now being employed as road sweeper in the villages where the Parish Councils have no arrangements of their own.

1. Water Supply

The district is supplied by six authorities as follows:- Metropolitan, East Surrey, Mid Kent, Mid Sussex, Sevenoaks and Tonbridge Water Companies, and Tunbridge Wells Borough Council, all main waters being of a hard nature.

The fluoride content locally remains at approximately 0.1 ppm.

All main supplies are sampled regularly and in addition samples are submitted from private supplies in the area.

During the latter part of the year water mains were extended to Coopers Lane, Fordcombe and individual house connections are awaited.

Two further extensions are planned, namely at French Street/Horns Hill area of Westerham and Moat Lane, Cowden. Preparatory work was in progress at the end of the year in both cases, which in total will make main water available to 34 more dwellings at present on spring, borehole and rainwater supplies.

A very large proportion of the district is fed by main water, and supplies to the remaining houses from private sources are as follows:

Spring supply	101 (10 of these are provided with main supply as an alternative)
Borehole supply	80 (1 of these is supplied via standpipe)
Well supply	11
Rain water supply	18

In the 1971 report, reference was made to 16 houses still supplied by standpipes off the main. A scheme has been approved for the provision of water to 9 of these and work is due to commence shortly. Twenty-one houses previously supplied by spring and rain water were connected to the mains during the year and in certain cases, where samples proved unsatisfactory on bacteriological examination, the chlorination plants provided were overhauled and subsequently found to provide supplies of good quality.

Complaints were received regarding discolouration of main water derived from the East Surrey Water Company reservoir at Bough Beech. This problem was caused by the action of organic matter present in the water on the existing pipe systems, and was more acute near the ends of mains and at other dead ends in the supply pipes. Flushing of mains brought about a considerable improvement.

The Sevenoaks and Tonbridge Water Company

During the year 20 yards of 3" and 417 yards of 6" new mains were laid within the Company's Statutory Area.

The Mid Kent Water Company

A total of 368 yards of 3" and 1,618 yards of 4" mains were laid during the year in Kemsing and Shoreham. The Company now supply water to 1,336 properties in Kemsing and 57 properties in part of Shoreham.

The East Surrey Water Company

During 1972 routine main extensions have been laid in the area as necessary. In addition a 6" main has been laid in the Mark Beech area between Horseshoe Green and Cowden Cross to reinforce that part of the system.

The Metropolitan Water Board

No new sources of supply were instituted and there were no changes to the general scheme of supply in the area, which was derived from Lullingstone, Sundridge and Westerham wells.

All new and repaired mains are disinfected with chlorine: after a pre-determined period of contact, the pipes are flushed out and refilled; samples of water are then collected from these treated mains; and the mains are returned to service only after the analytical results are found to be satisfactory.

The quality control from the Board's laboratories is carried out by means of daily sampling from sources of supply, from the treatment works or well stations, from the distribution system; and through to the consumer. Any sign of contamination or any other abnormality is immediately investigated.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

The Ide Hill area was provided with main drainage and 44 properties were connected, and a number of others in process of connection, by the end of the year. Eight properties in other parishes were connected to existing sewers and six houses previously utilising bucket closets were converted to waterborne systems.

Mr. F. R. Green, the Engineer & Surveyor, has kindly supplied the undermentioned information:-

Sewage Treatment Cowden Sewage Works

As part of programmed improvements, a new percolating filter has been constructed to provide for increased flows at the works.

Foul Sewerage

The following details relate to the construction of sewers in the District in 1972.

- (a) Total length of defective foul sewers reconstructed 211 lineal metres.
- (b) Total length of new foul ' sewers provided 2437 lineal metres.
- (c) Number of existing properties connected to main sewerage for first time 27.

Surface Water Drainage

Further to the serious flooding that occurred in Westerham in 1968, the Council have enlarged culverts, widened existing streams and reconstructed the watercourse to its confluence with the River Darent - a total length of 655 lineal metres.

General requirements and adequacy of existing facilities

The major population centres are adequately served by main drainage and the proposals for serving outlying areas in 1973 are as follows:-

- (a) Burlings Lane, Knockholt.
- (b) Pilgrims Way and Beechy Leas, Otford.
- (c) Chart Lane, Brasted.

In addition to the above, the programme for 1973 includes for the laying of a relief sewer in Edenbridge to provide additional capacity particularly in storm time.

3. Refuse Collection and Disposal Cleansing Services

The installation of a bin liner paper sack scheme was commenced in September and by the end of the year the position was reached where sacks were being issued in respect of one day's collection on three rounds on weekly frequency, and two days each on two of the rural routes. The scheme is welcomed generally by both the public and the Council's staff. It is planned to extend the scheme to the whole of the district by October, 1973.

A total of 327 abandoned and unwanted cars were disposed of during the year and there was a large accumulation at Ide Hill tip for a considerable period due to a recession in the recovered metal industry.

Tipping of refuse was completed at New House Farm, Hever, and the reclaimed land was being prepared for handing back to the farmer for agricultural use during 1973. Ide Hill tip continues in use and the sheds destroyed by fire in November 1971 were replaced by pre-cast concrete structures.

A total of 5,100 cesspools were emptied involving disposal of 10,030,310 gallons of sewage. Despite the Council's policy of extending the availability of main sewerage, the heavy demand on the cesspool emptying service continues, and a considerable backlog of work accrued during the year.

One new Paxit Major 35/50 yard compression refuse vehicle was purchased replacing an 18 yard non-compression type, and two replacement cesspool machines of 1,500 and 1,000 gallon capacity were brought into use.

Despite staff sickness, it has been possible to increase inspection of food premises, and, in addition to achieving improvements in the premises themselves, much has been done to assist in educating the food handlers in the use of hygienic practices, improved stock storage and rotation. The first of a series of Food Hygiene bulletins was sent to all food premises in the district, and it was encouraging to note that some employers asked for additional copies to hand to their staff.

Notification was received from some 18 British ports of the arrival of 256 sealed and unexamined containers of food arriving at the West Kent Cold Store for delayed inspection under the Imported Food Regulations, an increase of almost 6% on the previous year. The food included mainly meat and vegetables together with consignments of prawns and shrimps, fats, fruit, preserves, orange juice and pizza sauce. Supplies of prawns destined for Dunton Green arriving at the Port of London are sampled at the port of entry and detained at the West Kent Cold Store pending the Analyst's report, but in the case of other ports, this authority samples from the consignments on arrival. In view of some borderline results, the condition of the prawns was drawn to the attention of the importers. No statutory standard is laid down, but should plate counts occur between 100,000 to 1,000,000/gram, then a warning is given to keep the prawns deep frozen and use immediately on thawing. Though this instruction can be given to the Cold Store it is not possible to ensure that consignments receive this treatment when broken down and distributed to retailers.

Three food factories at Dunton Green produce meat cuts, vegetable packs and fish foods for export, and one at Otford produces beef extract for the same purpose.

Eleven mobile shops/canteens operate from within, and many others from outside the district, and a generally satisfactory standard is maintained. The trades include catering, grocery, greengrocery, fish and ice cream.

There was considerable increase in throughput at the packing station compared with 1971, but the rejection rate dropped from 2.4 to 1.52% indicating an improvement in the health of the birds arriving at the station. Condemnations are basically due to chronic respiratory disease, E. Coli and physical damage.

Inspection procedures continued as in the previous year, daily visits being made (twice on Fridays) to examine birds discarded by the spotters, and to check the efficiency of the spotters on the evisceration section. Routine bacteriological checks are made by the Company on the efficiency of hygiene on the processing line, and swabs are submitted by the Public Health Inspectors for examination from the spin chillers to check for the presence of salmonellae.

During the year a second spin chiller was installed to assist the more speedy lowering of the body temperature in the slaughtered bird. Spin chilling is preceded by a final wash utilising superchlorinated water (80 ppm). In-plant chlorination and ice chilling of the spin chiller water is not practised.

Waste from the factory including feathers, offal etc. and blood are conveyed daily to the Midlands for conversion to fertiliser. The sewage, after separation of the major solid content, and treatment of the hot dip liquor, is passed to the main sewer.

At the end of 1972, 99% + of the houses within the District were receiving piped water supply.

Complaints were received concerning iron deposits in local sections of the supply at Langton and Pembury. The Undertakings concerned were able to overcome the difficulty by flushing the appropriate mains.

The Mid Kent Water Company

The Company laid 184 yards of 3", 25 yards of 4", 69 yards of 6" and 1,538 yards of 8" mains during the year, and now supply 6,265 properties in the District.

No other important mains extensions were carried out in the District during 1972.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

Mr. G.L. Plastow, the Engineer & Surveyor, has kindly supplied the undermentioned information:-

Works carried out during 1972

(a) Matfield, Brenchley and Horsmonden Regional Scheme

The new treatment works at Horsmonden was opened in 1972 and this treats sewage from Maidstone and Cranbrook Rural District Councils as well as from the villages of Matfield, Brenchley and Horsmonden. Over ten miles of sewers were laid to connect these villages to the works, together with the construction of five pumping stations and $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles of rising main, 177 properties being provided with main drainage for the first time.

(b) Hadlow

Work on construction of the new sewage treatment works commenced and is due for completion by mid- 1973.

Tenders are due for return early in 1973 for the sewerage of Golden Green and Barnes Street. Preparation of the scheme to drain Ashes Lane will follow.

(c) Blowers Hill, Speldhurst

Work was completed on the sewerage of 25 properties in Blowers Hill, Speldhurst, and the elimination of the obsolete Etherington Hill sewage treatment works.

(d) Paddock Wood

Approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile of 12 inch diameter sewer was laid to serve the Council's housing development at Ringden Meadow, together with approximately 200 yards of 15" and 27" and 300 yards of 30" surface water sewers, to divert stormwater around the development.

(e) Hildenborough Stage III

Tenders have been received for the completion of the Hildenborough Sewerage Scheme whereby sewage will be pumped from the upper and lower areas of Hildenborough to the Tonbridge Urban District Council for treatment. Work will commence early in 1973.

(f) S.W. Matfield

Approval has been received from the Department of the Environment for the construction of three further pumping stations and the sewerage of outlying areas of Brenchley and Horsmonden not included in the original scheme. Tenders are due for return early in 1973.

(g) Work carried out by private developers

The Council have also supervised the construction and have adopted soil and surface water sewers laid by private developers to serve new private estates within the district.

FUTURE PROGRAMME

(a) Paddock Wood and Capel

The Council have instructed the Consulting Engineers to prepare a scheme for enlarging the sewage treatment works at Paddock Wood and to extend the sewerage system in Five Oak Green and Capel.

(b) Eggpie Lane, Hildenborough

The Council have employed Consulting Engineers acting for the Sevenoaks Rural District Council to prepare a scheme to drain properties in Eggpie Lane and to connect the Council's Philpots sewage treatment works to the new trunk sewer being laid by Sevenoaks Rural District Council for Weald to Leigh.

(c) Ashurst (Speldhurst Parish)

A scheme is being prepared to pump sewage from Ashurst to the Blackham sewage treatment works of Uckfield Rural District Council for treatment.

(d) Shirley Hall (Speldhurst Parish)

A scheme is being prepared to pump sewage from the Shirley Hall complex to the main sewer for treatment.

During 1972 the Company laid 308 yards of 3", 138 yards of 4", 867 yards of 6" and 14 yards of 12" new mains. 298 yards of 3" and 365 yards of 4" mains were abandoned.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

Work was completed on the laying of a new foul sewer under the railway.

Design work is proceeding and it is hoped to start work during the next year on the replacement of the foul sewers serving the South West area of the town.

The negotiations for land acquisition for the replacement of the sewers in the Botany Area are almost complete and it is hoped work will commence on this scheme during 1973.

New sewers have been adopted at Tulip Tree Close, Stacey Road and Upper Hayesden Lane. These sewers serve approximately 185 new dwellings.

The arrangements for sewerage and sewage disposal are generally adequate for the area at present but will not be adequate for any additional development outside the Town Map zoning.
