SCARLET FEVER.

Ten cases were notified compared with 4 for the previous year. They were admitted to Tunbridge Wells Borough Sanatorium. Six of the cases occurred in Southborough Town and 3 in High Brooms. One family had 2 cases, and another 3 cases. The Schools attended by the patients were visited, and treatments carried out by the Health Nurse. The age groups were as under:-

$$\frac{2-5}{1} \quad \frac{5-10}{4} \quad \frac{10-15}{3} \quad \frac{15-20}{2} = 10.$$

DIPHTHERIA.

Two cases occurred in Southborough Town and 2 in High Brooms. One of the former was a nasal infection case and was treated at home in the first instance. Later upon the micro-organism proving to be virulent by laboratory tests, removal to hospital was carried out. The Medical Officer of Health examined this case at home, and consulted with Dr. Cross-Kerry at her request.

The other three cases were also removed to the Tunbridge Wells Borough Sanatorium. The two High Brooms cases occurred in the same family.

The age periods were:-
