To the Chairman and Members of the Southborough Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for your District for 1967. This is the first occasion that a separate report has been published for each of the seven constituent authorities in the South West Kent Joint Health Area.

Group statistics for the seven Districts are given on pages 7 to 10 for comparison purposes. Details of the County Services available in the District are included in the Report and it is hoped that these will prove of value.

The first part of the Report deals with Staff, Statistics, Health Services and Infectious Disease, and the second part deals with Sanitary Circumstances of the District, Housing, and Inspection and Supervision of Food. A separate report by the Public Health Inspector is not given but the record of the work is incorporated and I am very grateful to Mr. Wheeler for his valued contribution towards the compilation of this Report.

The POPULATION for the District, as estimated by the Registrar-General for mid 1967, was 9,830, a decrease of 20 over the mid 1966 figure.

The population figure for the Joint Health Area for mid 1967 was 189,000, an increase of 1,890 over the mid 1966 figure.

The CRUDE BIRTH RATE (number of births per 1,000 population) for the District in 1967 was 12.7, compared with 13.91 in the previous year. The ADJUSTED BIRTH RATE for the District was 14.5, compared with 15.85 in the previous year. The Birth Rate for England and Wales in 1967 was 17.2.

The CRUDE DEATH RATE (number of deaths per 1,000 population) for the District in 1967 was 11.6, compared with 13.91 in the previous year. The ADJUSTED DEATH RATE for the District was 9.4, compared with 11.54 in the previous year. The Death Rate for England and Wales in 1967 was 11.2.

The INFANT MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under one year of age) per 1,000 live births for the District in 1967 was 8.0 compared with 7.3 for the District in the previous year. The Infant Mortality Rate for England and Wales was 18.3. A table showing the causes of deaths of infants in the Urban District is given on page 11.

The NEO-NATAL MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under four weeks) per 1,000 live births for the District in 1967 was 8.0, compared with 7.3 in the previous year. The neo-natal mortality rate for England and Wales was 12.5.

The EARLY NEO-NATAL MORTALITY RATE (number of deaths of infants under one week) per 1,000 live births for the District in 1967 was 8.0. compared with 7.3 in the previous year.

The PERI-NATAL MORTALITY RATE (stillbirths and deaths under one week combined) per 1,000 live and stillbirths for the District in 1967 was 16.0, compared with 7.3 in the previous year. The Peri-Natal Mortality Rate for England and Wales was 25.4.

No MATERNAL DEATH occurred in the District in 1967.

CAUSES OF DEATH. A table supplied by the Registrar-General showing the causes of death is given on pages 9 and 10. The commonest cause of death in the Urban District in 1967 was Coronary Disease - 24 deaths, a decrease of 7 over the figure for the previous year.

Deaths from Malignant Neoplasm of Lung or Bronchus in the District during the year were 3 male and 1 female, and a table showing deaths from this cause for the District during the past 10 years is given on page 11.

One death occurred in the District as a result of a Motor Vehicle Accident, the same as in the previous year. One death occurred under the classification "All Other Accidents", compared with 3 in the previous year.

Infectious Disease

The number of cases of infectious disease notified in the District is given on pages 12 and 13.

I am pleased to report that no cases of Diphtheria or Acute Poliomyelitis were notified during 1967. In spite of the continued absence of these diseases, I would once again appeal to all parents to accept the facilities offered for immunisation.

Measles was prevalent during the year; a total of 141 cases were notified, the greatest number being in the months of February and April. One death occurred.

Tuberculosis

During 1967 no new cases of Tuberculosis were notified and no deaths occurred. In 1966 the figures were - new cases 1 Pulmonary; deaths 1 Pulmonary.

A table showing the number of deaths and death rates from Tuberculosis during the past 10 years is given on page 15.

Immunisation and Vaccination

On pages 15 and 16 of the Report, figures kindly supplied by the County Medical Officer are given showing the number of persons vaccinated against Poliomyelitis and Smallpox, and also the number of persons immunised against Diphtheria with Whooping Cough and Tetanus.

Home Safety

Valuable work continued to be carried out during the year by the Home Safety Committee.

In conclusion, I should like to thank the Members, Chief Officers and Officials of the Council for their interest and support, and the Staff of the Health Department for their loyalty and conscientious work during the year. I should also like to thank the Medical Practitioners and Voluntary Workers for their co-operation during 1967.

Domiciliary Midwifery

Night and Evening Service

Evening service is provided for elderly people who are bedridden or housebound and have no one to assist them to prepare for the night and includes the provision of a light meal or hot drink and attention to fires. Night service is provided, for no longer than three weeks unless there are exceptional circumstances, for the care of seriously ill people who are living in their own homes and who need attention during the night. In some cases the service is provided for one to three nights a week to give relief to relatives.

Family Care Service

After consultation with the Children's Department, this service is provided for the short-term care of children in their own homes during the absence of the mother by reason of admission to hospital for illness or confinement or in other special circumstances. Help is given only to families where care of at least two children is involved and the period of service is limited to three months.

Family Welfare Service

This service is provided, with the parent's consent, in household where the habits, behaviour and standards of living of the family are much below those generally accepted in the society in which they live. The three main objectives of the service are to raise the standard of living of the families, to improve the welfare of the children, and to keep the families together and prevent their break-up. Intensive training for a period of three months is given and this is succeeded by a follow-on service for nine months. In families where there is medical evidence of mental subnormality the continuance of the service after the initial period of three months may be approved for not more than twelve hours a week until the youngest child reaches compulsory school age.

A report has been received from the Tunbridge Wells Water Undertaking indicating that the water is not plumbo solvent.

Various sewerage works are in course of construction including the relaying of foul sewers in Prospect Road, and a storm water relief sewer at Holden Corner. Extensions to existing sewers have been laid to serve new property in Pennington Road. A sewage pumping station is also in course of erection at Pennington Road to receive drainage from an area which is at present served by cesspools.
