Annual Report

For the Year 1905.

To the Chairman and Members of the Southowram Urban District Council.

GENTLEMEN,-

I have pleasure in presenting my report for the year 1905.

The health of the district has been good, and the death rate is the lowest recorded for many years.

We have had no Epidemic, and the work of the Sanitary Department, with the exception of the usual difficulties anent Privies and Cesspools, has gone smoothly and happily.

I congratulate the Council upon maintaining so high a Sanitary Standard, without the usual elaborate and costly machinery.

Vital Statistics.

Population.—Calculated at 2977.

Births.—The Births number 81, composed of 40 Males, 41 Females, and being equivalent to an annual rate of 27.2 per thousand, as compared with 26.9 last year and an average for the previous ten years of 24.3 per thousand.

Deaths.—The Deaths number 27 composed of 14 Males and 13 Females, and being equivalent to an annual rate of 9·1 per thousand, as compared with 13·6 last year and an average for the previous ten years of 15·5 per thousand. Of these deaths one was reported to the Coroner, being due to accident. Two deaths by drowning of non-residents were also reported to the Coroner, making a gross total of 29, equivalent to a gross rate of 9·8 per thousand.

The Death Rate from Infectious Disease is higher than usual, being 2.4 per thousand

The General Death Rate is the lowest recorded for many years.

Table IV. shews the diseases to which these deaths were due, while below are the rates due to the principal groups of these diseases.

Eight cases of Infectious Disease, as above, were reported, viz., two cases of Diphtheria, two of Scarlet Fever, and four of Typhoid Fever.

The two cases of Diphtheria, occurring in one house were traced to contact with a similar case while away visiting. In a similar way one case of Typhoid Fever appeared to have been contracted while nursing a relative who suffered from the disease. The source of the remainder was by no means clear.

One case of Typhoid and one case of Scarlet Fever proved fatal.

In addition to the above there were two deaths from Measles, two from Whooping Cough, and one from Diarrhæa. None of these diseases approached within measurable distance of being epidemic.

Sewage and Refuse Disposal.

Privy Middens.—I have again to emphasize the remarks
I made last year upon the difficulty of getting these places emptied.

There are still 15 ashpits that require covering, and 17 privies that have no ashpit accommodation to them.

Cesspools.—These have again had to forcibly proclaim themselves a nuisance before steps were taken to empty them.



Departmental Work.

Offensive Trades.—The Tripe-boiling and Soap-making works have been regularly inspected and their Sanitary arrangements found satisfactory.

Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.—One Factory and two Workshops have been inspected and found to fulfil all legal requirements.

The Bakehouse opened last year has now been closed.
