

### Closet Accommodation.

During the year 14 pail closets and 5 vault closets have been converted to the water carriage system and 2 cesspools abolished.

### Public Cleansing.

No alteration in the method of collection and disposal of house refuse has been made, but special attention to the salvage of materials required in the National Interest by industry has been made. The product of the sale of these materials amounted to £1,328 for the financial year 1st April, 1940, to 31st March, 1941.

### **Eradication of Bed Bugs.**

Premises known to have been previously infested by bed bugs have been kept under observation and treated as considered necessary. During the year 3 premises have been treated.
