Medical Officer's Report for 1958.

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Ward and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of Spilsby Rural District for the year 1958.

During the Year there were 319 Deaths from all causes three more than last year. Giving a Death Rate of 13.7 per 1,000 resident population compared with the national rate of 11.7. The greater number of deaths being attributed to Heart Disease. There were 329 Births, 14 less than the previous year, giving a live Birth Rate of 14 per 1,000 population.

The incidences of Infectious Dirases were less than the previous year being 201 cases notified. 162 Measles, 2 Whooping Cough, 14 Pneumonia, 5 Scarlet Fever, 2 paralytic poliomyelitis, 1 Erysipelas, 11 Pulmonary Tuberculosis, 1 Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis, 2 Food Poisoning and 1 Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

The area of the District is 147,530 acres in 69 parishes.

Population.

The Registrar General's estimated mid-year home population is 23.560.

Density.

The density of population was .160 persons per acre.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES.

Legislation has, in the past, but inadequately, endeavoured to ensure:-

- (a) a safe meat supply, prepared under hygienic conditions and subjected to proper inspections;
- (b) humane treatment of animals, and
- (c) adequate welfare facilities for persons employed in a slaughterhouse.

Now Parliament has finished its work on slaughterhouses, the Slaughterhouses Act, 1958 and The Slaughter of Animals Act, 1958, becomes operative.

The new Regulations will end the long period of past uncertainty as to the established pattern of slaughtering.

Some slaughterhouses may disappear; others will have to meet the exacting standard laid down by the Act and Regulations.

It is true to state that many slaughterhouses in the Rural District must remain. It is also true to say that from an angle of convenience of inspections, and an ensurance that all animals are inspected, that a large slaughterhouse at Spilsby would be ideal.

It is inevitable that 100% meat inspection cannot be carried out due to the scattered slaughterhouses, varied times and days of slaughtering.

The Slaughterhouse (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958, which comes into operation on the 1st January, 1959, deals with the (a) construction of slaughterhouses, arrangement of lairage, accommodation, lighting and ventilation, cleanliness and repair, drainage and water supply. Part III deals with equipment and Part IV with hygienic practises, such as admission of animals to a slaughterhouse, hygiene of premises and equipment also personal hygiene of persons and finally slaughtering processes.

Thus eventually we shall have - hygienic conditions, humane treatment of animals and safe working conditions for those engaged in slaughterhouse work.

SEWERAGE WORKS.

Anderby Creek.

Due to non-rapid development at Anderby Creek, consideration was given to the original scheme being reduced whereby it would be possible to construct half the proposed Disposal Works.

Chapel St. Leonards. Second Phase - South Road and Trunch Lane.

Works have not yet started.

Ingoldmells.

Year by year, this seaside coastal resort increases in popularity, as is indicated by the increasing number of persons frequenting the approaches to the sea, the full booking of existing caravans and enquiries as to land being available for additional Camp Sites.

Naturally the scheme envisages considerable expense, and at the present time the Council is deliberating letween the financial aspects and human public health factor.

Hundleby and Spilsby.

The proposed extensions of sewers has not yet started.

Wainfleet All Saints.

Conditions are deplorable. For many, many years this Annual Report has repeated itself in the condemnation of the present insanitary works.

Burgh-le-Marsh.

In the Annual Report for 1892 we read that 'the sewerage disposal grounds can scarcely be considered satisfactory'.

Can it be wondered if to-day, an elapse of 66 years, it is stated that new modern sewerage disposal works are needed in lieu of the present out-dated irrigated beds where more or less,

crude sewerage effluent is continuously discharged onto sewerage sick land.

CARAVAN SITES.

In the early days a Camp Site was initiated for the sole use for the stationing of caravans. To-day we have on the Sites general shops, cafes, private licensed clubs, Bingo premises, amusement slot machines, cycle shops and fish and chip premises.

All this may be for the good so far as entertainment is concerned and convenience is concerned, but there is an inclination in some cases that where these premises are positioned on the Camp Sites, there is not the full devotion of time to the Camp, and consideration to financial gain receives first priority.

The continuous wet season during June, July, August and September, placed a strain on the public service provided by the Council - refuse and night soil collection, also cesspool emptying.

Human and administrative problems are met each year by your Public Health Officers and the Camp Site owners, but these problems are fortunately minimized by the close co-operation and liaison between the owner and your Public Health Officers.

ICE-CREAM.

There are 119 licensed retailers and the commodity is wrapped ice-cream.

All premises are inspected and reported upon, prior to approval of the building for registration.

16 new applications were received during the year and approved.

CONDEMNED FOOD.

The condemned food is destroyed by burial, burning or collection and processing by a Hide and Skin Firm.

In addition to the organs and meat from diseased bovines, sheep and pigs, other foods were destroyed as follows:-

MILK.

In all cases where milk is proved by biological examination showing evidence of infection with Brucella Abortus, calls are made at the farm premises.

In recent years there has been a gradual decrease of retail purveyors of milk, chiefly due to the expense that would be incurred in bringing the milk premises up to modern hygienic standards.

Milk.

The person who for many years in the village kept about two or three milk cows, has now ceased to milk cows and the villages are supplied with designated milks.

The Rural District of Spilsby is now a specified area.

There were no contraventions at the Dairy premises.

HOUSING.

During the year 1958, the Council erected 32 houses. The houses, which include 6 prefabricated bungalows removed from Spilsby to Halton Holegate, consist as follows:-

Considerable progress has been made since the re-inspection of premises under the Rural survey, towards the improvement of premises, placed in Category 3, 4 and 5 with the aid of Improvement Grants.

From 31.7.49. to 31.12.58. a total of 823 houses has been reconditioned.

During the year, Demolition Orders were made operative on 26 houses.

14 Houses were demolished following the service of Demolition Orders, and 7 houses rendered fit by Undertakings.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

A. Dry Refuse.

As anticipated, the new Coastal Diesel refuse vehicle proved its worth. There was a saving in running costs, and candidly the refuse could never have been collected and removed from the premises and increased Camp Sites if the old 10-12 cubic yard side-loading refuse vehicle had been in use.

By the very nature of the land at the Coast-line, the disposal of domestic refuse will always be a problem. Even at the best regulated disposal works, the scheme of disposal of refuse does not always work smoothly; our problems not only consist of the domestic and business premises from approximately 8,000 premises, but also refuse from up to 6,000 inhabited

Refuse Collection.

caravans and in addition an added responsibility for disposal of refuse from Butlin's Holiday Camp, weekly population at the height of the season about 9,000 which always keeps the problem ever to the fore.

Refuse removal is undertaken in all 69 parishes. In the built-up places, namely Spilsby, Hundleby, Wainfleet All Saints, Burgh-le-Marsh, Ingoldmells, Hogsthorpe and Chapel St. Leonards, there is a once weekly refuse collection. In the remaining 62 villages, a service is given once every three weeks.

Disposal sites are not easy to obtain. In our scattered Rural District large journeys involve expense and naturally every attempt is made to utilize land positioned as convenient as possible for collection and disposal.

Refuse tips are at present in use at Spilsby, Burgh-le-Marsh, Hogsthorpe, Ulceby, Langrick, Wainfleet All Saints and Friskney.

B. Wet.

The disposal of pail closet contents and cesspools is a major problem and a headache, particularly during bad and wet weather.

Pail closets are still emptied at Anderby, Chapel St. Leonards, Hogsthorpe, Ingoldmells, Burgh-le-Marsh, Wainflest All Saints and Wainflest St. Mary.

During the summer there is a twice weekly removal of night soil in the villages of Anderby, Chapel St. Leonards and Ingoldmells, particularly being warranted on account of the removal of such organic matter from the Camp Sites.

In addition to the above duties, there is a weekly removal of night soil from various school premises, and regular emptying of the cesspools at the various public conveniences situated along the Coast line.

634 cesspools were emptied.
For the first time, all Council houses with cesspools, received one free service of emptying. This service includes 325 Council houses with 153 cesspools.

X-Ray Facilities.

X-Ray facilities are provided at the Grace Swan Hospital, Spilsby.

Laboratory Facilities.

Laboratory Services are provided by the Boston General Hospital and the Lincoln Branch of the Public Health Laboratory service.

National Assistance Act, 1948.

On three occasions during the year it was found necessary to make application for a Magistrates Order under Section 47 of the above Act to remove persons to part III accommodation.

Home Help Service.

This service is administered in the district by the local Health Authority.
