Medical Officer's Report for the year 1962

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,


I have the pleasure to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the year 1962.

The health of the district was satisfactory, and things went smoothly. The Registrar's estimated mid-year population was 22,180. There were 323, Births, giving a Birth Rate of 14.5 per 1,000 of the population. The national rate was 18. There were 6 Still Births giving a rate of 18 per 1,000 total live and still births, national rate 18.1. There were 335 Deaths from all causes, a death rate of 15.1 per 1,000 population, higher than National Rate of 11.9. 10 of the Deaths occurred in Infants of under one year, an Infant Mortality Rate of 30.9 compared with National Rate of 21.4. 12 of the Deaths were due to accidents as a result of drowning, motor vehicles, crushing by tractor, and gunshot wounds.

During the year 41 Cases of Infectious Diseases were notified, 20 Measles, 2 Whooping Cough, 3 Scarlet Fever, 4 Pneumonia, 1 Paratyphoid, 8 Dysentery, 1 Food Poisoning, 2 Pulmonary Tuberculosis, again it is pleasing to note there were no cases of Poliomyelitis and Diphtheria, credit due to protective vaccination and immunisation.

The number of milk samples is very substantial as the majority of these have been taken for convenience on arrival at the major collecting and pasteurising dairy which is situated in the district. Of the foregoing samples 22 were deficient in solids non-fat. All of these deficiencies were found to be due to natural causes and advice was rendered to the producers accordingly.

One sample of marzipan was found to be deficient in ground almonds. A warning was issued to the vendor and the supply is being kept under observation.

A complaint was received relating to the presence of a nail in a sliced loaf of bread. Legal proceedings were instituted against the manufacturer who was fined £15 together with £10 10s. 0d., costs.

A further complaint occurred concerning the presence of fragments of glass in a one third pint bottle of milk. Having regard to the circumstances of this case a warning was issued to the dairymen concerned.

One hundred and eighteen samples of milk were taken for biological examination of which 16 were from producers/retailers of raw tuberculin tested milk. No samples showed evidence of tuberculosis but 7 samples showed positive evidence of brucella abortus. These were taken from supplies which are normally subject to pasteurisation, apart from that which may be consumed by the producers or their employees, who were notified of the dangers of consuming infected milk.

All of the foregoing samples of milk passed the appropriate tests for the efficiency of heat treatment and keeping quality.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

GENERAL AND MATERNITY

Grace Swan Hospital provides for some medical, surgical and maternity cases. Other medical, surgical and maternity cases are admitted to Louth and Boston Hospitals. Paediatric cases are admitted to Boston, Louth and Lincoln Hospitals.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospitals at Boston and Lincoln.

X-RAY FACILITIES

X-Ray facilities are provided by the Grace Swan, Boston and Louth Hospitals.

WELFARE SERVICES

Under the provisions of the National Assistance Act, 1948., it is the responsibility of the Welfare Authority to provide accommodation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This accommodation is provided in the form of Hostels in the district. It was not necessary to take action under Section 47 of this Act during the year.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

There is no Ambulance Station in the district. The nearest stations are at Skegness and Louth. This service is administered by the Local Health Authority.

THE CHILDRENS ACT, 1948.

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children come under the care of the Childrens Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and problem families. The Rural District as a Housing Authority can give a lot of help towards the re-housing of problem families, under this Act. There is one Residential Nursery in the district, situated at Burgh-le-Marsh.

GENERAL HEALTH SERVICES

MATERNITY SERVICE MIDWIFERY

Five Midwives serve the district, four full-time and one in a relieving capacity.

ANTE-NATAL and POST-NATAL

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal work is undertaken by the general practitioners in the district.

INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held at Friskney on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the Month, and at Wainfleet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the Month. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and

HOME NURSING

There are five Home Nurses who serve the district, their duties are combined with that of Midwife.

HOME HELP SERVICE

This service is organised by the Local Health Authority and help is provided in the home for cases of confinement, short term illness of the housewife, aged and infirm, and mentally and physically handicapped persons. It can be obtained on application to the Area Officer at the Clinic, Skegness.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Scavenging Services.

Each year the dry refuse collection service is extended by the addition of new properties, caravan and tent sites and other premises not previously on the route. The destruction of the vast amount of domestic and trade refuse, particularly in the coastal belt during the holiday season, is always a problem and a worry at times. The trench method and burning solves the problem of fly and rodent infestation, but it cannot be recognized as the ideal 100% method of tipping control. There are controlled refuse tips at Bratoft, Spilsby, Langrick, Ulceby, Old Bolingbroke, Thorpe St. Peter and Stickney.

There is a refuse collection in all sixty ~~nine~~ parishes, comprising of once every three weeks in sixty two parishes and once weekly in the remaining seven parishes.

Night Soil Collection.

The Council has three 800 gallon capacity cesspool vehicles. There is a once weekly night soil collection at Wainfleet All Saints, Wainfleet St. Mary and Burgh-le-Marsh.

Towards the end of the year, night soil collection of pail closets at properties at Anderby and Chapel St. Leonards ceased, as owners had laid drains to the new sewerage system. At present there is a twice weekly night soil collection during the holiday season at Ingoldmells and once weekly in the winter.

The inauguration of a once every two years free cesspool emptying service to all properties has been received with satisfaction by the recipients, and this service is always increasing.

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HOUSING.

During the year seventy-two dwelling houses were reported to the Public Health Committee as unfit for human habitation and not capable of being rendered fit at a reasonable expense.

Demolition Orders were made on thirty-seven houses and seven houses were subject to Closing Orders. Forty houses were demolished.

General housing inspections and Councils full co-operation towards applicants for an Improvement Grant, has served a most useful purpose in accommodating families in 142 homes, in a state of good habitation with modern amenities that will exist for many years.

CAMP SITES.

A composite aerial photograph of the camp sites at Anderby, Chapel St. Leonards and Ingoldmells indicates the large numbers of caravans, approximately 7,000, and the increasing trend of families towards tenting.

These sites also necessitate constant inspections at shops, open food stalls and mobile vans. There are also the problems of refuse collection and drainage matters. With an estimated population of 35,000 at the height of the holiday season, there is never a dull moment, and always an unforeseen problem to be faced.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

There are five private slaughter houses in the District.

The total weight of meat condemned was 9cwts 3qrs 6lbs.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SCHEMES.

Burgh-le-Marsh.
