Medical Officer's Report for the Year, 1965

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the Year, 1965.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar General was 22,620 compared with 22,480 in 1964. There were 298 deaths from all causes giving a Death Rate of 13.2 per 1,000 population. There were 8 deaths of infants under 1 year of age. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age, 79%. There were 351 births, 31 more than in the previous Year. 27 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 15.5, lower than the national rate of 18.0. There were 8 stillbirths, 2 due to Prematurity, 2 Congenital Defects, 2 Toxaemia of pregnancy, and 2 Foetal Asphyxia.

Notifications were received in respect of 346 cases of Infectious Diseases, Measles accounting for 329, 5 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 3 Dysentery, 3 Acute Pneumonia, 1 Erysipelas, 3 Pulmonary Tuberculosis, 1 Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honor to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the year, 1935.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar General was 24,600 compared with 23,400 in 1934. There were 298 deaths from all causes giving a death rate of 12.5 per 1,000 population. There were 8 deaths of infants under 1 year of age. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age, 75%. There were 351 births, 51 more than in the previous year. 27 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 12.5, lower than the national rate of 18.0. There were 8 stillbirths, 2 due to Prematurity, 1 Congenital Deafness, 2 Trauma of pregnancy, and 3 Fetal Asphyxia.

Hospitalizations were received in number of 146 cases of Infectious Diseases, 10 cases accounting for 327, 5 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 1 Diphtheria, 1 Measles, 1 Rubella, 1 Polio, 1 Tetanus, 1 Rabies, 1 Non-infectious Tuberculosis, 1 Non-infectious Tuberculosis.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

GENERAL AND MATERNITY

Grace Swan Hospital provides for some medical, surgical and maternity cases. Other medical, surgical and maternity cases are admitted to Louth and Boston Hospitals. Paediatric cases are admitted to Boston, Louth and Lincoln Hospital.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospitals at Boston and Lincoln.

X-RAY FACILITIES

X-Ray facilities are provided by the Grace Swan, Spilsby, Boston and Louth Hospitals.

WELFARE SERVICES

Under the provisions of the National Assistance Act, 1948., it is the responsibility of the Welfare Authority to provide accommodation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This accommodation is provided in the form of Hostels in the district. It was necessary on one occasion to take action under Section 47 of this Act during the year.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

There is a sub-station in Spilsby, this is staffed with 2 men and 1 ambulance.

THE CHILDRENS ACT, 1948

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children come under the care of the Childrens Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and problem families. The Rural district as a Housing Authority can give a lot of help towards the re-housing of problem families, under this Act. There is one Residential Nursery in the district, situated at Burgh-le-Marsh.

GENERAL HEALTH SERVICE

MATERNITY SERVICE - MIDWIFERY

4 Nurse midwives serve the district.

ANTE-NATAL and POST-NATAL.

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal work is undertaken by the general practitioners in the district.

INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held at Friskney on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the Month at Wainfleet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the Month, and Sibsey on Wednesday afternoon every 2 weeks.

A Bus is laid on to bring Mothers and their babies from the surrounding parishes to this Clinic. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and vaccination against Smallpox and Poliomyelitis is done at these Clinics.

WATER SUPPLY

During the Year, apart from reduced pressures experienced at "peak" periods in the Summer in the Coastal areas, an adequate supply has been provided in all other parts of the rural district throughout the Year.

Regular samples of raw water from the sources at Driby, Mumby and Twentylands and treated water in distribution have been taken for chemical and bacteriological analysis, and apart from occasional unsatisfactory samples in distribution from the Twentylands source, due to difficulties with the chlorinator, the water generally throughout the district has been satisfactory.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse Collection Service.

Paper Sack System.

The environmental health service embodying refuse collection and disposal plays an important part in our communal life. It is only right therefore that progress should be made, wherever possible, in the method of collection of refuse, with modern vehicles and final disposal.

Following reports to the Public Health Committee of the advantages which would be achieved by the adoption of a paper sack system, the Council approved a pilot scheme for a period of three months.

The trial scheme proved the system to be an eminently desirable form of refuse collection. The workmen were well content at the change from handling dustbins to paper sacks, and there was a time-saving factor.

Consideration is now being given to the introduction of a paper sack collection (a) throughout the whole district, or (b) in the built-up villages where there is a once weekly refuse collection service.

Controlled Tipping.

I cannot stress too strongly the dire need of land ideally situated at the Chapel Outmarsh, for the reception of the vast amount of refuse from our coastal parishes and to deal with refuse from Butlin's Holiday Camp.

The Council, at present, is dependent on an owner of land willing to grant Council permission to excavate for the deposit of rubbish. This is most unsatisfactory. Care has to be taken that the utmost use is made of the limited length of excavation, with the result that burning of the refuse is inevitable, in order to reduce the volume.

The Council's 35 cubic yard Pakamatic refuse vehicle deals with approximately 1,600 ashbins from domestic premises, along with refuse from camp sites (over 7,000 caravans) and tent sites in the holiday season.

.../Cont'd.

Controlled Tipping - Cont'd.

From Butlin's Holiday Camp the loads of refuse vary. At the commencement there are approximately three to four loads, increasing to approximately 11 loads at the height of the season.

The Rural District, comprising of sixty-nine parishes, provides a weekly refuse collection in seven parishes; three parishes receive a once fortnightly collection and fifty-nine parishes once every three weeks.

In November 1965, the Public Health Committee recommended that in January, 1966, a fortnightly refuse collection service be given in those parishes at present receiving a three weekly service. This resolution was endorsed by Council.

There are refuse tips at Spilsby; Dalby; New Bolingbroke; Bratoft; Ingoldmells and Hogsthorpe.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

The ever increasing number of holiday visitors demands the provision of adequate, well positioned and well designed public conveniences.

Public Conveniences are conveniently positioned along the coast line at Ingoldmells, Chapel St. Leonards, Anderby and Huttoft. Two full-time employees are engaged during the holiday season to ensure cleanliness.

There are also conveniences at Spilsby (underground type) and Wainfleet All Saints with part-time Attendants.

In order to give all possible encouragement to personal cleanliness, the Council authorised the provision of hand-washing facilities at the public conveniences where not provided.

FOOD HYGIENE.

(a) MEAT.

There are five licensed slaughterhouses situate at Hogsthorpe, Stickney, Burgh-le-Marsh, Halton Holegate and Eastville.

During the year 3,236 carcasses and organs were inspected.

The total weight of meat destroyed as diseased and unfit was :-

12 cwt. 2 qrs. 1 st. 12 lbs. 6 ozs.

(b) OTHER FOODS.

At the various food premises, 800 inspections were carried out. Ten contraventions were observed and remedied.

Holiday Camp. - As a result of a joint meeting by the Camp Authority and Officers of the Council, the suggestions made by Council's Officers affecting health matters at the Camp, were agreed upon, namely that the Holiday Camp Authority would arrange, as far as possible, for all members of staff handling food to obtain medical clearance certificates before engagement. In addition, the Camp Authority intended to nominate a Superintendant in every relevant department, who would be responsible to the Camp Medical Officer, for urging hygiene and drawing attention to any lapses.

FOOD HYGIENE.

Unfit Food. - Investigation took place respecting the sale of unfit steak and kidney pies and mouldy loaves.

Regarding the sale of steak and kidney pies, it was decided that contact be made with the Lindsey County Council, being the Authority who normally take proceedings in matters of this nature, with a view to appropriate legal proceedings being taken. Similar resolution was taken by Council respecting the mouldy loaves.

Notice was later received from the County Council that after consideration of the circumstances, warnings had been issued to the retailers and wholesalers.

It is estimated that approximately 1,500,000 gallons of cesspool contents were removed. This estimated figure will give some idea of the problem the Public Health Department faces in the manner of disposal, particularly during wet weather.

To all intents and purposes this difficult problem appeared to be solved by disposal of the cesspool contents at the modern sewerage works, but the Consulting Engineers recommended otherwise.

I well remember the difficult years of the serious drainage problems arising at Ingoldhells, Chapel St. Leonards and Hogathorpe. Each year we Officers of the Public Health Department dreaded the holiday season and the potential danger from the inadequate and unsatisfactory drainage, increased by the high water level.

Modern amenities at the premises and camp sites, due to the construction of modern sewage disposal works at these coastal resorts, now disposes of the discomforts and danger to health which existed too long in this age of progress.
