Medical Officer's Report for the Year, 1966.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the Year, 1966.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar-General was 22,660 compared with 22,620 in 1965. There were 304 deaths from all causes giving a Death Rate of 13.4 per 1,000 population. There were 7 deaths of infants under 1 year of age. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age 77.3%. There were 316 births, 35 less than in the previous year. 13 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 13.9, lower than the national rate of 17.7. There were 5 still births due to Intracranial haemorrhage, Anencephalus, Asphyxia, Cord Prolapse and Intrauterine Death.

Notifications were received in respect of 246 cases of Infectious Diseases, Measles accounting for 231, 6 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 5 Acute Pneumonia, 1 Erysiples, 1 Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and 1 Meningococcal Infection.

I have the honor to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the Year, 1955.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar-General was 25,680 compared with 23,830 in 1954. There were 104 deaths from all causes giving a death rate of 4.1 per 1,000 population. There were 7 deaths of infants under 1 year of age. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age 77.5%.

There were 316 births, 35 less than in the previous year. 17 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 12.3, lower than the national rate of 17.7. There were 2 still births due to intrauterine asphyxia, anaemia, and asphyxia, Cord Prolapse and Intrauterine Death.

Notifiable diseases were recorded in respect of 248 cases of Infectious Diseases, Malaria amounting to 241, 5 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 2 Acute Rheumatism, 1 Erysipelas, 1 Polio, Tuberculosis, and 1 Meningococcal Infection.

Chemical and Bacteriological analyses of raw water samples taken regularly from the sources at Driby, Mumby and Twentylands and treated water taken regularly from points in the distribution system were in general satisfactory but occasional unsatisfactory samples were obtained from the raw water at Twentylands source where shallow ground water easily picks up surface pollution, but these were chlorinated to give satisfactory samples in the distribution mains.

Appropriate notices were printed and displayed in food shops throughout the district, prohibiting dogs in food shops.

Holiday Camp.

Following a meeting between two representatives of the Ministry of Health, Officers of the Council and senior Representatives of the Holiday Camp, the following recommendations were agreed:-

- (1) a thorough inspection by the Public Health Department at all buildings;
- (2) points arising to be discussed with Ministry officials and later with Messrs. Butlins; and
- (3) Messrs. Butlins to consider appointing a Camp Hygiene Supervisor.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse Collection Service.

Paper Sack System.

Following a satisfactory trial scheme in 1965, with a view to the adoption of a paper sack collection throughout the whole district, or in built-up villages, the Council decided upon a paper sack scheme being introduced at all domestic premises at present receiving a weekly refuse collection service.

I know the workmen are grateful for the introduction of the hygienic standard, because the working conditions can be unpleasantly dirty and sometimes harmful to the eyes due to the fine dust when emptying bins.

Disposal of Refuse.

There is a tremendous volume of refuse, including combustible material collected from the coastal parishes and Butlins Holiday Camp. Burning occasionally has taken place, reducing the large volume which, at present, has to be disposed of in trenches on land not owned by the Council. Council is dependant on the owner of the land to use same for deposit of refuse - a most unsatisfactory arrangement.

The Council realise the present method of the disposal of refuse is unsatisfactory and, rightly so, are determined to ensure proper controlled tipping. Suitably positioned on the coast, namely Chapel Outmarsh, is an area of land ideal for controlled tipping. The Lindsey County Council (County Planning Department) do not look very favourably on the use of this land for tipping, so various pit sites have been inspected at Dalby, Skendleby, Welton Candlesby and Rigsby.

The Ministry of Housing and Local Government have fixed a date, 20th December, 1966, for an Inquiry into the refusal of planning permission for land at Chapel Outmarsh to be used as a refuse tip.

Disposal of Refuse. Cont'd.

If Chapel Outmarsh is not allowed to be used, then a chalk pit at Candlesby is the alternative, and Council will have to accept the additional difficulties and cost of transport.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING.

All cesspools at domestic premises receive a free cleansing service once every two years.

Operated in 1961, to date the card index system totals 2,873 premises.
