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

SPILSBY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Medical Officer's Report for the Year, 1967.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the Year, 1967.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar-General was 22,680 compared with 22,660 in 1966. There were 293 deaths from all causes giving a death rate of 12.9 per 1,000 population. There were 5 deaths of infants under 1 year of age. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age. There were 310 births, 6 less than in the previous year. 21 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 13.7, lower than the national rate of 17.2. There were 8 stillbirths. There were 5 deaths in infants under 1 year due to Respiratory failure, Intracranial haemorrhage, Transposition of great vessels, and 2 Broncho Pneumonia.

Notifications were received in respect of 246 cases of Infectious Diseases. Measles accounting for 274, 3 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 1 Dysentery, 5 Acute Pneumonia, 1 Puerperal Pyrexia, and 4 Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Chemical and Bacteriological analyses of raw water samples taken regularly from the sources at Driby, Mumby and Twentylands and treated water taken regularly from points in the distribution system were in general satisfactory but occasional unsatisfactory samples were obtained from the raw water at Twentylands source where shallow ground water easily picks up surface pollution, but these were chlorinated to give satisfactory samples in the distribution mains.

Under the provisions of the Local Authorities Act, 1944, it is the responsibility of the Local Authority to provide water for the supply and distribution to the area of the district. A supply of water is provided in the form of mains in the district.

WATER SUPPLY

There is a water supply in the district, this is supplied with 2 and 1/2 inches.

THE CHILDREN ACT 1948

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children and under the care of the Children's Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and provide facilities. The Rural district as a local authority can give a lot of help towards the provision of proper facilities, under this act. There is one residential nursery in the district, situated at Northleaze.

CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT

MATERNITY SERVICE - NURSING

A Nurse attends every the district, 2 part-time State Registered qualified Nurses.

PRE-NATAL and POST-NATAL

Pre-natal and Post-natal work is undertaken by the general practitioner in the district.

INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held on Friday on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month, at 7.15 p.m. on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month, 7.15 p.m. on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month, at the Nurses' Surgery, Church Street, Spilby, and 7.15 p.m. on Wednesdays at 7.15 p.m. A bus is held on to bring mothers and their babies from the surrounding parishes to this Clinic. Immunisation against diphtheria, Whooping Cough and vaccination against measles and Polio-vaccine is done at these Clinics.

HYGIENIC SERVICE

A Clinic is held on the 1st Thursday of each month at 2.0 to 3.0 p.m. at 7, West End Village, Spilby.

In general an adequate supply of water for all purposes was provided during the year except for reduced pressure at "Peak" demand periods during the summer at points in the coastal area.

Chemical and bacteriological analyses of the water samples taken regularly from the sources at Lufkin, Hardy and Tawakoni and treated water taken regularly from points in the distribution system were in general satisfactory but occasional unsatisfactory samples were obtained from the raw water at Tawakoni source where shallow ground water easily picks up surface pollution, but these were eliminated to give satisfactory samples in the distribution system.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

GENERAL AND MATERNITY

Grace Swan Hospital provides for some medical, surgical and maternity cases. Other medical, surgical and maternity cases are admitted to Louth and Boston Hospital. Paediatric cases are admitted to Boston, Louth and Lincoln Hospitals.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospitals at Boston and Lincoln.

X-RAY FACILITIES

X-Ray facilities are provided by the Grace Swan, Spilsby, Boston, and Louth Hospitals.

WELFARE SERVICES

Under the provisions of the National Assistance Act, 1948, it is the responsibility of the Welfare Authority to provide accommodation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This accommodation is provided in the form of Hostels in the district.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

There is a sub-station in Spilsby, this is staffed with 2 men and 1 ambulance.

THE CHILDREN'S ACT 1948

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children come under the care of the Childrens Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and problem families. The Rural district as a Housing Authority can give a lot of help towards the re-housing of problem families, under this Act. There is one Residential Nursery in the district, situated at Burgh-le-Marsh.

GENERAL HEALTH SERVICE

MATERNITY SERVICE - MIDWIFERY

4 Nurse midwives serve the district & 1 part-time State Registered enrolled Nurse.

ANTE-NATAL and POST-NATAL

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal work is undertaken by the general practitioners in the district.

INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held at Friskney on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the Month, at Wainfleet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the Month, Spilsby on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each Month at the Doctors Surgery, Queen Street, Spilsby, and Sibsey on Wednesday afternoon every 2 weeks.

A Bus is laid on to bring Mothers and their babies from the surrounding parishes to this Clinic. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and vaccination against Smallpox and Poliomyelitis is done at these Clinics.

OPHTHALMIC CLINIC

A Clinic is held on the 3rd Thursday of each Month at 9-0 to 12-0 a.m. at 2, West End Villas, Spilsby.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION OF THE AREA.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Following the Council's Appeal against the County Council's decision to refuse planning permission for the use of land for the disposal of refuse at Chapel Outmarsh, Chapel St. Leonards, and the Minister's decision supporting his Inspector's report that the land was not suitable for the purpose proposed, Council had to consider future arrangements. The need for land was urgent. Various chalk quarries were inspected. Eventually Candlesby chalk pit was chosen and the Council is obtaining a lease from the owners for the use of same.

The Public Health Committee, during the year, has given very serious attention to the desirability of implementing, as far as possible, the recommendations of the Report of the Working Party on Refuse Collection. Briefly the Public Health Committee's recommendations may be summarised as follows:-

- (1) Obtain lease of disused chalk pit at Candlesby Hill for disposal of all refuse collected in all 69 parishes by fully controlled tipping methods.
- (2) Purchase of a 60 cubic yard Pakamatic vehicle.
- (3) Purchase of an efficient crawler tractor with necessary attachments, and employment of a driver for the crawler tractor for purpose of controlled tipping.

(This Side Loader will be removed on supply of a new 60 cu. yd. Pakamatic Refuse Vehicle).

Present Disposal of Refuse.

- (1) The whole of the district, except 11 parishes in the coastal area, is dealt with at Spilsby tip. Disposal unsatisfactory.
- (2) Refuse from 11 parishes in the coastal belt is, at present, being deposited in trenches excavated as required on land where an owner is willing to allow the Council to tip.

I have reported previously in Annual Reports that I am not satisfied with the present method, and now Candlesby chalk pit has been approved by the Planning Authority, and the owners are willing to lease the chalk pit, one can at last carry out controlled tipping in the true meaning.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING.

All cesspools at domestic premises receive a free cleansing service once every two years.

FOOD HYGIENE.

Food Hygiene (Market Stalls and Delivery Vehicles) Regulations, 1966.

The above Regulations became operative on the 1st. January, 1967, and circulars were sent to all persons concerned stating requirements of the Regulations.

Thirty-six mobile vans were inspected.

Thirty-one vehicles had satisfactory wash hand units fixed and five were without.

It was also necessary to direct attention to the owners of two road side fruit stalls regarding lack of provision of suitable washing facilities.

Food stalls in Spilsby Market Place are visited each Monday during Market Day. .

Notices were served on the owners of three stalls to provide wash hand basins and supply of hot water at a suitably controlled temperature.

Food Hygiene (General) Regulations, 1960.

Notice was served on the owner of butcher's premises to provide a wash hand basin with hot water supply. Notice complied with.

Butlins Holiday Camp, Ingoldmells.

Following discussions between Butlins, Ministry of Health Officials and this Council's Officers, a detailed inspection was undertaken and a comprehensive specification of works recommended to be carried out was sent to Butlins. All major items were completed. In addition a recommendation that a Food Hygiene Supervisor be appointed in order to supervise all aspects of Food Hygiene at the Holiday Camp, was adopted by appointing a retired Chief Public Health Inspector.

Inspections by your Public Health Officers in conjunction with the Food Hygiene Supervisor, indicated marked improvements at the Camp in the standard of hygiene, mainly attributable to the persistent efforts and knowledge in environmental hygiene by the appointment of Mr. Moss, an experienced person in public health technical matters.

Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations, 1958.

A warning letter was sent to a butcher respecting a contravention.

Food Hygiene (British Empire and Commonwealth) Regulations, 1955

The above Regulations came into force on the 1st January, 1957, and inspectors were sent to all persons concerned with the supply of food to the public.

Thirty-six mobile vans were provided.

Thirteen vehicles had satisfactory work done under the new Regulations.

It was also necessary to direct attention to the state of the roads and to the state of the provision of outside washing facilities.

Food stalls in public places were visited and found to be satisfactory.

Hot and cold water on the premises of these stalls to provide with hand and supply of hot water at a suitable controlled temperature.

In addition a recommendation was made that a Food Hygiene Inspector be appointed in order to supervise all aspects of Food Hygiene at the Mobile Camp, was adopted by appointing a retired Chief Public Health Inspector.

Inspection by your Public Health Officer in conjunction with the Food Hygiene Inspector, indicated marked improvement as the Camp in the standards of hygiene, mainly attributable to the persistent efforts and knowledge in experimental hygiene by the appointment of Mr. W. W. as experienced person in public health technical matters.
