## SPILSBY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

### Medical Officer's Report for the Year, 1968.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district for the Year, 1968.,

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar-General was 22,170 compared with 22,680 in 1967. There were 325 deaths from all causes giving a death rate of 14.7 per 1,000 population. There were 10 deaths in infants under 1 year of age, the greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age, There were 288 births, 22 less than in the previous year. 21 births were illegitimate. The birth rate per 1,000 population was 13 lower than the national rate of 16.9. There were 5 stillbirths. There were 10 deaths in infants under 1 year, 7 due to prematurity, 1 Intracranial haemorrhage, 1 Intestinal obstruction, and 1 severe Encephalocele.

Notifications were received in respect of 120 cases of Infectious Diseases. Measles accounting for 105, 3 Scarlet Fever, 1 Whooping Cough, 1 Dysentery, 2 Acute Pneumonia, 1 Lepto-Spirosis, 1 Paratyphoid Fever, 3 Food Poisoning, 1 Infective Jaundice and 2 Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Advisory action to eliminate the infection has been taken by the Divisional Veterinary Officer. Samples of Milk for analysis and for examination for brucella abortus were taken on arrival of the milk at the main processing dairy in the District, consequently the results are representative of milk produced over a very wide area.



## HOSPITAL SERVICES

### GENERAL AND MATERNITY

Grace Swan Hospital provides for some medical, surgical and maternity cases. Other medical, surgical and maternity cases are admitted to Louth and Boston Hospital. Paediatric cases are admitted to Boston, Louth and Lincoln Hospitals.

### INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospitals at Boston and Lincoln.

### X-RAY FACILITIES

X-Ray facilities are provided by the Grace Swan, Spilsby, Boston, and Louth Hospitals.

### WELFARE SERVICES

Under the provisions of the National Assistance Act, 1948, it is the responsibility of the Welfare Authority to provide accommodation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This accommodation is provided in the form of Hostels in the district.

### AMBULANCE SERVICE

There is a sub-station in Spilsby, this is staffed with 2 men and 1 ambulance.

### THE CHILDRENS ACT 1948

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children come under the care of the Childrens Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and problem families. The Rural district as a Housing Authority can give a lot of help towards the re-housing of problem families, under this Act. There is one Residential Nursery in the district, situated at Burgh-le-Marsh.

## GENERAL HEALTH SERVICE

### MATERNITY SERVICE - MIDWIFERY

4 Nurse midwives serve the district & 1 part-time State Registered enrolled Nurse.

### NATE-NATAL and POST-NATAL

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal work is undertaken by the general practitioners in the district.

### INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held at Friskney on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the Month, at Wainfleet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the Month, Spilsby on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month at the Doctors Surgery, Queen Street, Spilsby, and Sibsey on Wednesday afternoon every 2 weeks. A Bus is laid on to bring Mothers and their babies from the surrounding parishes to this Clinic. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and vaccination against Smallpox and Poliomyelitis is done at these Clinics.

### OPHTHALMIC CLINIC

A Clinic is held on the 3rd Thursday of each Month at 9-0 to 12-0 a.m., at 2, West End Villas, Spilsby.

## WATER

## SUPPLY

During the Year the water supply to the area was satisfactory in quantity, quality, bacteriologically and chemically.

Action taken regarding contamination was as a result of samples taken at Braygate Lane, Toynton All Saints, coming from the Twentylands supply, continued to give unsatisfactory B.Coli Count. This source was discontinued and replaced by a supply from Fordington. Twentylands is now only used in cases of emergency.

The population supplied was 22,170, and the number of houses supplied was 8,910, the number of houses having a direct supply was 8,900 and the number by standpipe was 10.

Unfortunately, the figures in respect of individual parishes who have a direct supply to the house, and supplied by means of standpipe are not available. #### PUBLIC CLEANSING

##### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

1968 saw the implementation of controlled tipping at a central tip situated at Candlesby.

The disposal of refuse is carried out under the conditions laid down by the Ministry for controlled tipping.

An International 500 Crawler Tractor equipped with a 4 in 1 bucket was purchased and a driver employed for full time attendance on the tip.

An agreement was reached with a local Scrap Dealer (Mr. Shaw of Huttoft) to receive old motor vehicles from the residents of the district.

The sack system of collection continues to expand in the built up areas and is proving to be very successful and acceptable by all concerned.

The Refuse Collection vehicle fleet was greatly enhanced by the addition of a new 60 cubic yard Pakamatic vehicle, which is stationed at the Coastal depot. Due to the tip being at Candlesby the provision of this large capacity vehicle has cut down the number of journeys required for the disposal of refuse from the coast.
