Medical Officer's Report for the Year 1971

I have the honour to present my Report on the health and environment of the district for the Year, 1971.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar General was 22,340.

There were 270 births, 25 of which were illegitimate, giving a birth rate of 12.1 per 1,000 population, national rate was 16.0. The illegitimate birth rate as a percentage of all live births was 9, less than the previous year, 11. The national rate was 8. There were 337 deaths from all causes, giving a death rate of 15.1 per 1,000 population, higher than the national rate of 11.6. There were no deaths in infants of under 1 year, the national infant mortality rate was 18. The greater number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years, 81.1%. Ischaemic Heart Disease and Cerebrovascular Disease again being the greatest killer, whilst malignant neoplasm of the lung bronchus caused 13 deaths, 2 more than the previous year. There were 46 cases of infectious disease notified, 27 measles, 10 whooping cough, 5 scarlet fever, 3 infective jaundice and 1 pulmonary tuberculosis.

During the year the water supply to the district was satisfactory in quantity and quality, bacteriologically and chemically, the supply comes from the bores at Driby, (Sandstone bore) (Chalk bore) and Fordington. The population supplied was 22, 340 and the number of houses who had a main supply direct to the house was 8,425 and the number with standpipes was 40. The figures in respect of individual parishes who have a direct supply to the house, and supplied by means of standpipe are not available. The fluoride content of the supply Driby fluoride p.p.m. 0.09 Mumby (Sandstone Bore) fluoride p.p.m. 0.75 (Chalk Bore) 0.11 p.p.m. and Fordington 0.38 p.p.m.

I have the honour to present my Report on the health and environment of the District for the Year, 1971.

The estimated mid-year population as supplied by the Registrar General was 22,560.

There were 270 deaths, 25 of which were illegitimate, giving a birth rate of 12.1 per 1,000 population, national rate was 10.0. The illegitimate birth rate as a percentage of all live births was 8.1, less than the previous year, 11. The national rate was 8. There were 337 deaths from all causes, giving a death rate of 15.1 per 1,000 population, below the national rate of 16.5. There were no deaths in infants of under 1 year, the national infant mortality rate was 18. The greatest number of deaths occurred in persons over 65 years, 81.8. Tuberculosis, heart disease and cerebrovascular disease again being the greatest killers, whilst malignant neoplasms of the lung produced almost 15 deaths, 5 more than the previous year. There were 46 cases of infectious diseases notified, 27 measles, 10 whooping cough, 5 scarlet fever, 3 infectious mononucleosis and 1 primary herpetic.

During the year the water supply to the District was well above in quantity and quality, bacteriologically and chemically, the supply comes from the town of Bury (Lancashire) (Chalk bore) and Widdowson. The population supplied was 22,560 and the number of houses was 8,475 and the number with standpipes was 10. The figures in respect of individual premises who have a direct supply to the house, and supplied by means of standpipes are not available. The figures in respect of the supply being furnished p.p.m. 0.02 heavy (Bamford) 0.02 (Chalk) 0.11 p.p.m. and 0.02 p.p.m. and 0.02 p.p.m.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

GENERAL AND MATERNITY

Grace Swan Hospital provides for some medical, surgical cases. Other medical, surgical and maternity cases are admitted to Louth and Boston Hospital. Paediatric cases are admitted to Boston, Louth and Lincoln Hospitals.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospitals at Boston and Lincoln.

X-RAY FACILITIES

X-Ray facilities are provided by the Grace Swan, Spilsby Boston and Louth Hospitals.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Under the provisions of the National Assistance Act, 1948., it is the responsibility of the Social Services Department to provide accommodation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This accommodation is provided in the form of Hostels in the district.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

There is a sub-station in Spilsby, this is staffed with 2 men and 1 ambulance., and 5 Auxiliaries which will be increased to 10 for standby and weekend duties.

THE CHILDRENS ACT 1948

By the provisions of this Act certain classes of children come under the care of the Social Services Department of the County Council. This department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of normal care of their parents, and problem families. The Rural district as a Housing Authority can give a lot of help towards the re-housing of problem families under this Act. There is one Children's Home in the district situated at Burgh-le-Marsh.

GENERAL HEALTH SERVICES

MATERNITY SERVICE - MIDWIFERY

Full-time 2 Nurse Midwives serve the district. 1 State Enrolled Nurse.

NATE-NATAL and POST-NATAL

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal work is undertaken by the general practitioners in the district.

INFANT WELFARE

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held at Friskney on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the Month, at Wainfleet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the Month, Spilsby on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month at the Doctors Surgery, Queen Street, Spilsby and Sibsey on Wednesday afternoon every 2 weeks. A Bus is laid on to bring Mothers and their babies from the surrounding parishes to this Clinic. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, vaccination against Smallpox, Poliomyelitis and Measles is done at these Clinics.

OPHTHALMIC CLINIC

A Clinic is held on the 3rd Thursday of each Month at 9-0 to 12-0 a.m. West End Villas, Spilsby.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

GENERAL HOSPITAL

These General Hospital provides for acute medical, surgical, obstetrical, gynecological and maternity cases are admitted to South Boston Hospital. Psychiatric cases are admitted to Boston, South and South Boston.

PSYCHIATRIC SERVICES

Patients suffering from these diseases are admitted to the Boston, South and South Boston.

LABORATORY

X-ray facilities are provided by the Green Street, South Boston and South Boston.

LABORATORY

Under the provisions of the National Laboratories Act, 1946, is the responsibility of the Social Services Department to provide consultation for aged and infirm persons who are in need of care and attention. This consultation is provided in the form of visits in the patient's home.

LABORATORY

There is a sub-station in South Boston, this is staffed with 2 men and 1 ambulance, and 2 ambulances which will be increased to 10 for emergency service.

CHILDREN ACT 1946

By the provisions of this act certain classes of children are under the care of the Social Services Department of the County Council. In department is responsible for children who are for various reasons deprived of their parents, and provide facilities. ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH ADMINISTRATION OF THE AREA.

Annual Report of the Chief Public Health Inspector for 1971.

Environmental Pollution.

During the past year the two words 'Environmental Pollution' have been on everyone's tongue. Hardly a day goes by without it being mentioned in the press or on radio or television. We are constantly being warned by many learned ecologists that if we do not take adequate steps to protect our environment, then, by the end of this century our Planet will have become so polluted that we may not be able to survive.

There are obviously many serious problems that have to be tackled. At present in this Country more people are aware of this situation and are working to improve the conditions that exist and also are taking the necessary steps to prevent any further deterioration of the environment.

We, in this corner of rural Lincolnshire, are probably among the most fortunate of the inhabitants of the British Isles; that is to say, as far as environmental pollution is concerned.

We do not have the many problems associated with densely populated areas and industrial regions. Nevertheless, we do witness some disturbing aspects of this problem.

One particularly depressing feature is indiscriminate dumping. Throughout our area, we are blessed with numerous disused chalk quarries, brick pits, etc. They vary in size from small wooded depressions to considerably large open expanses. The occupants of these pits vary from rusting car bodies and filthy mattresses, to general domestic rubbish. Some of these dumping grounds have been successfully taken over as authorised Tips and with controlled tipping have later been transformed into Agricultural land.

In addition to the above, general litter on our highways does not appear to diminish. How often, particularly during the summer months, does one follow a car, full of holiday makers returning from the coast, and witness articles from toffee papers to cigarette packets, being ejected by the occupants?

The provision of litter baskets in our laybys and the regular emptying of same, including the tidying of the immediate area, alleviate some of this desecration.

The manner in which animals are permitted to roam at will in public places, also gives rise to concern; particularly the fouling of beaches, parks, pavements and public open spaces.

Dogs, for example, are all too frequently allowed to roam free without apparently any kind of supervision, and we are perhaps fortunate here, that, so far as the beaches on our coastline are concerned, most of these are washed clean at every tide.

Apart from the aesthetic objection, it is not generally realised that a number of diseases are transmissible from animals to human beings.

Finally regarding dogs, when will there be legislation prohibiting these animals access to food shops? It does not matter how clean the food premises are or what facilities to comply with the Food Hygiene Regulations are provided, if customers allow dogs to wander around these establishments.

It is obvious that only by continually bringing to the notice of the public these many and varied aspects of environmental pollution, will there be any improvement.

1. Introduction
