Of the 22 deaths through Pulmonary Tuberculosis, 29 were previously notified cases. Two Non-Pulmonary cases were not previously notified.

No action has been taken under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925.

No action has been taken under the Public Health Act, 1925, Section 62.

Preventive Measures.

At the Sisters' Hospital there is a Washington-Lyon Steam Disinfector where bedding and clothes may be disinfected. This is always done in cases of Scarlet Fever, Small-pox, etc., and frequently done after such illnesses as Consumption and Cancer. This work is done by the porter at the Hospital.

Formaldehyde is the disinfectant almost universally used in this District. This work is done by the Sanitary Inspectors.

Arrangements are made by this Council with the Herts County Council Laboratory, the Clinical Research Association, and the Counties Public Health Laboratories for examinations to be made at the expense of this Council.

I have received during the year 177 reports from them as follows:-

One hundred and sixty-one on Swabs, examined for Klebs Loeffler Bacilli for Diphtheria, 8 of which were positive.

Seven for Haemolytic Streptococci, of which 2 were positive.

Nine on Sputa examined for Tubercle Bacilli, of which 2 were positive.

Diphtheria anti-toxin is, in all suitable cases, supplied at the expense of this Council.

Vaccination.

The following figures are given for the twelve months ending June 30th, 1937, and have been supplied to me by Mr. Seabrook, the Vaccination Officer:—

During this period there were 573 children born in the City, 16 of whom died in infancy without being vaccinated.

Of the remaining 557 only 156 have been vaccinated, that is, 28 per cent.

Forty-three have gone away from the District before being vaccinated and in 8 cases vaccination has been postponed.

350 Conscientious Objection Certificates were granted.

No primary vaccinations or re-vaccinations have been performed under the Small Pox (Prevention) Regulations, 1917.

Hospitals, Nursing arrangements and other Institutions available for the District.

(1) St. Albans and Mid Herts Hospital and Dispensary Church Crescent, St. Albans. *Matron*: Miss D. Mason.

Supported by Endowments, Voluntary Contributions, Fees from or in respect of Patients.

A General Hospital for Accidents, Medical and Surgical Cases. Contains an Operating Theatre and X-Ray Plants.

Accommodation about 50 beds.

Staff: Eight Hon. Medical Officers besides Hon. Consulting Surgeons, Hon. Dental Surgeon, Hon. Radioligist, Hon. Psychiatrist, and a Resident House Surgeon.

Infectious Diseases Hospital.

Matron: Miss Banner, St. Albans Joint Hospital, St. Albans.

Medical Superintendent: Dr. R. R. K. Paton (non-resident).

St. Albans Joint Hospital, Union Lane, St. Albans, which consists of:—

- 1. Administration Block.
- Scarlet Fever Block (accommodation 12 beds), over which are 2 Wards of 2 beds each reserved for Cerebro-spinal Fever.
- 3. Diphtheria Block (accommodation 11 beds).

There is a Washing-Lyon Disinfector.

A Motor Ambulance is kept at the Hospital.

Porter: Mr. C. R. Dye.

The Public Assistance Institution and Infirmary Oster House, St. Albans. Property of the Hertfordshire County Council, Management Committee: St. Albans Guardians Committee.

Area served: City of St. Alban, Urban District of Harpenden, Rural District of St. Albans, comprising Parishes of St. Stephen, St. Michael, St. Peter Rural, Redbourn, Sandridge, Wheathampstead and Harpenden Rural.

Hospital accommodation 192 beds, including a modern Maternity Unit of 14 beds and Sick Children's Block of 25 beds. There is also a T.B. Verandah of 4 beds, and there are three small side wards in the Infirmary available for isolation.

There is a modern Operating Theatre and Dispensary.

Medical Officer (non-resident): Dr. J. W. Hope
Simpson, M.D., B.Ch., M.R.C.S., M.R.C.P.

Assistant Medical Officer (non-resident): Dr. H. P. Jameson, M.D., M.R.C.P.

The County Council also retain a Staff of Consultant Specialists who periodically visit the Infirmary.

Master: Mr. E. S. Green.

Matron and Superintendent Nurse: Mrs. L. J. Green, with a Staff of twelve trained Nurses, twenty-one assistant Nurses, three Male Nurses, and six trainee Nurses.

Other accommodation for aged persons, etc.: 120 beds.

(4) The St. Albans District Nursing Association, Bricket House, St. Albans. Superintendent: Miss E. S. King.

Supported by Voluntary Subscriptions, Grants from the County Council and other Public Bodies, and profits from the Nursing Home, for which purpose part of the building known as Bricket House is reserved.

This Association, which is affiliated to the Herts County Nursing Association and Queen's Institute of District Nursing, provides for the General and Midwifery Nursing of the Sick Poor in their own homes, throughout the City and immediate neighbourhood.

Staff: Miss King (Superintendent), Miss Comber (Assistant Superintendent), three Midwives, four District Nurses, one Health Visitor and one Nurse for Schools, Clinics, etc.

Last year 230 Maternity Cases were nursed, to which some 4,905 visits were paid, and 1061 General Cases were nursed, to which some 14,169 visits were paid and 1,940 casual visits.

1,610 Ante-Natal visits were also paid.

This Association also undertakes the Health Visiting, School Nursing, &c., for the County Council.

The following is a record of the work of the Health Visitor and Queen's Nurses, besides weekly attendances at the School Dental Clinic, Child Welfare Centre, Tuberculosis Dispensary, and Ante-Natal Clinic.

8,346 Home visits to children.

256 visits to schools.

303 Minor Ailments with 759 visits.

13,304 children inspected for Medical and Dental Defects, and also cleanliness.

555 visits paid to parents.

The County Council Maternity and Child Welfare Centre and School Dental Clinic is held at Wellington Court (also the property of the Association) which is adjacent to Bricket House.

The School Dental Clinic is held every Monday morning, alternate Monday afternoons, every Friday afternoon, and third Friday mornings.

Attendances 1666.

Defects remedied 953.

(5) Herts County Nursing Association, Massage and Orthopædic Centre, Bricket House, St. Albans.

Masseuse in Charge: Miss Warington.

Visiting Orthopædic Surgeon: Mr. S. L. Higgs.

Supported by contributions from the British Red Cross Society, Fees from the Ministry of Pensions for Ex-service Men, and from the County Council for School Children and Infants from the Welfare Centre. Also by nominal fees paid by civilian patients.

(6) Tuberculosis Dispensary, 79, Victoria Street, St. Albans.

An Institution belonging to the County Council.

Assistant County Tuberculosis Officer: Dr. E. C.

Sparrow.

Open every week on Thursday afternoons. First Wednesday afternoon in month for children.

(7) Ambulance. There are two Motor Ambulances in the City, the property of the St. Albans Town Council.

The Ambulances are kept at the Fire Station, St. Albans, and are in charge of the Chief Constable (Telephone 18).

They are available for the use of St. Albans and District at a fixed charge of 1/- per mile. Minimum 5/-

Public Elementary Schools.

There are 14 Public Elementary Schools in the City, of which 4 are Church of England Schools, 1 is a Roman Catholic School and 9 are County Council Schools.

The heating of many of these schools leaves much to be desired.

Free milk was recommended for some 400 children attending these schools.

The co-operation given by the Inspector of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children has been most valuable during the year.

Maternity and Child Welfare Centre (Herts County Council) St. Albans.

This Centre has been held regularly on Wednesday afternoons throughout the year in the premises at Wellington Court The Ante-Natal Clinic is held every Tuesday in each month from 10 to 12 a.m.

The object of the work has been, as heretofore, the improvement and maintenance of the health and general nutrition of the children.

All cases of illness are referred to their own doctor or to a hospital for treatment.

The actual numbers at the Centre in 1937 are as follows:

Fifty-four mothers and 70 children were referred to the Dental Clinic.

General Sanitation.

Water Supply.—The City receives its water supply from the St. Albans Water Company.

The water, though hard, is of a very high degree of purity, and in my opinion an exceedingly wholesome supply.

The hardness is mainly temporary; the total hardness is 30 parts per 100,000 of which 25 is temporary. I know of no method at present by which this water could be efficiently softened except at great expense.

Sewerage.—All the houses in St. Albans are connected with the main sewer, with the exception of the older houses in Fleetville and in the added areas, which are still served by dumb wells. There are also 120 in the added areas which have pail closets, and these are cleared twice weekly.

Bakehouses.

There are no wholesale bakehouses in the City. Under the Factory and Workshops Act, 1901, no underground bakehouse must be used after January 1st, 1904, without the written permission of the Sanitary Authority. There are 2 such underground bakehouses in the City, both of which have received the necessary permission of the Council.

Slaughterhouses.

There are II slaughter houses in the City.

In two cases the slaughter house, though a slaughter house within the definition of the Public Health Act, 1875, is nothing more than a yard, and a few of them, owing to their position, are unsuitable for the purpose of slaughtering, but on account of their being in existence previous to the year 1875, this Corporation has no power to deal with them unless they are a nuisance under the Public Health Act, 1875.

The Veterinary Inspector has been appointed Meat Inspector under the Public Health Meat Regulations, and visits the slaughter-houses at their appointed time of slaughtering, and when notified of special cases of slaughtering.

There is no public abattoir in the City.

Report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector for the City of St. Alban for the Year 1937.

To the Mayor and Corporation of the City of St. Alban.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my Report on the work carried out during the year 1937.

Sanitary Inspections.

Defects Remedied and Sanitary Improvements Carried Out.

The defects and nuisances remedied or abated were 3467, and 564 preliminary notices were served in connection therewith.

In addition to these notices the abatement of insanitary conditions is effected by an interview with those directly concerned.

Disinfection, etc.

Following the removal of patients to the Isolation Hospital, disinfection of rooms, bedding and clothing is carried out as a matter of routine. The infected bedding and clothing is removed to the St. Albans Joint Hospital for steam disinfection, whilst the rooms are fumigated with formalin.

Similar disinfection, free of charge, is also carried out in connection with Tuberculosis and Cancer.

Fifty-nine cases of notifiable infectious diseases were inquired into and the houses or rooms connected therewith fumigated, and thirty-nine houses in connection with Tuber-culosis and Cancer. In addition, fumigation was also carried out at four schools and public buildings in the City.

Fluid disinfectant, in half-pint tins, is distributed free for home use in connection with infectious diseases.

Disinfection, at a charge, is also carried out in connection with illnesses other than the above.

Disinfestation.

Twenty-five complaints of bed-bug infestation were received during the year.

Landlords and tenants are advised as to the means of eradicating the pest, and an efficient "Insecticide" is provided for spraying walls, floors, etc. In badly affected property superficial woodwork is removed, wall paper stripped, and broken and defective plaster disloged before the spraying is commenced.

No action is taken with regard to furniture, bedding, etc., of tenants taking possession of Council houses.

Public Cleansing.

(a) Cesspools.

A large number of houses in the added areas are served by cesspools, as are also some of the older houses in the "Fleet-ville" area.

Prior to the 1st April, 1937, a charge of 15/- for the first load, and 7/6 for each additional load, was made for the service of emptying. Since that date, however, no charge has been made where no sewer is available.

During the year six hundred and eighty-three cesspools received attention, and an amount of £140 was received for this service.

Sewerage is being proceeded with in the added areas, and work in some of the districts is already complete.

(b) Pail Closets.

About one hundred and twenty houses in the added areas have pail closets, and these are emptied twice weekly.

Corporation Housing Estates.

Sixty-four inspections were made of houses on the Corporation Housing Estates as to general conditions and cleansing.

Reports were sent to the City Surveyor, and repairs and decorations have been carried out where required.

Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919.

During the year eighty-five visits were made to premises in respect of complaints received. These visits were made in conjunction with Mr. J. Dubbin, the County Rat Officer. Advice was given as to the best means of eradicating the pests, and also with a view to prevention, involving repairs of premises affected.

Factories and Workshops.

The inspection of these has been well maintained during the year, and included visits to workshops, domestic workshops, workplaces, outworkers' premises, laundries and bakehouses. Generally speaking, their condition as regards sanitary accommodation, ventilation, cleanliness and other matters of a hygienic matter was satisfactory.

During the year two notifications were received from H.M. Inspector of Factories relating to contraventions of the Factory and Workshop Act, as follows:—

Insufficient sanitary accommodation.

Sanitary convenience opened directly into a workroom.

These were subsequently rectified and H.M. Inspector duly informed.

Outworkers.

One list of outworkers was received from the occupiers of factories and workshops during the year, and five from other authorities.

No cases of infectious disease occurred in the homes of these outworkers.

Shops' Act.

During the year inspections were made of shops with regard to the sanitary accommodation and washing facilities, and with regard to the heating arrangements available.

In a few cases necessary action was taken to bring the shops into conformity with Section 10 of the Shops' Act, 1934.

Common Lodging Houses.

At the end of the year there were four Common Lodging Houses in the City. These were visited periodically and found to be in good condition.

No new houses were registered during the year and the use of one was discontinued.

Offensive Trades.

Three classes of Offensive Trades are carried on in the City, namely, Marine Store Dealer, Edible Fat Refiner, and Frying of Fish.

The trade of fish frying is carried on at ten establishments, that of rag and bone merchant at two establishments, and fat refining at one establishment.

Two application to establish fish-frying businesses were refused during the year. One existing business was enlarged and modernised.

Regular inspections of these premises have been made, and in most instances the premises were found to be well maintained. Necessary cleansing was carried out as a result of verbal intimation in three cases.

Cinemas and other Places of Public Entertainment.

By a Ministry of Health Circular issued in 1920, Sanitary Authorities are required to give particular attention to premises holding a licence for music, dancing, etc., special regard being given to sanitary conveniences, dressing rooms, ventilation, and means of escape in case of fire.

There are in the City three Cinemas, and some twelve halls used for dances, concerts, billiards, etc.

A number of visits have been made to these premises, and, generally speaking, they have been well maintained.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Milk Supply.

There are five producers of milk in the City, sixteen dairies nine of which are attached to cowsheds—and thirty-two retailers of milk.

Frequent visits were made to the cowsheds, dairies and milkshops during the year, and these were found to be in a cleanly and satisfactory condition.

Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936.

Five retailers in the City are licensed to sell "Tuberculin Tested" Milk; five to sell "Accredited" Milk and two to sell "Pasteurised" Milk.

Twenty four samples of designated milk were submitted for bacteriological examination to the laboratory at the Hill End Mental Hospital.

Milk and Dairies Order, 1926.

No special cases of difficulty were experienced during the year in securing compliance with the provisions of the above-named Order.

Ice Cream.

Although registration of premises where ice cream is made or sold is not required in the City, visits have been made to these premises.

There has been a large increase in the number of retailers who obtain their supplies from the wholesale manufacturers, two of whom have branch storage depots in the City, but the number of premises where ice cream is made is decreasing.

Restaurant Kitchens, etc.

During the year inspections were made of the kitchens of Hotels, Restaurants, Cafes, etc., and to premises where "cooked foods" are prepared and sold, and these were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

Structural improvements and enlargements have been made at several of these premises during the year.

Meat and other Foods.

Frequent inspections were made of slaughterhouses, shops and stalls where meat is prepared or sold. In most instances the premises were found to be clean and well kept, periodic limewashing and cleansing being carried out as required.

During the year retailers voluntarily surrendered three ro-lb. tins of Imported Lambs' Livers, 6½-lbs. of Imported Ox Kidneys, one 6-lb. tin of Corned Beef, and 4-lb. of Rock Salmon, for which "condemned notes" were issued by the Department.

Inspection of meat at the time of slaughter is carried out by the Council's Veterinary Officer, Mr. G. Elmes.

Market Stalls.

The Saturday Market was visited regularly and inspections made of the meat, fish and other foods exposed for sale.

Merchandise Marks Act, 1926.

Numerous visits were made to shopkeepers, stallholders, etc., in order to ascertain whether imported goods were properly marked with an "indication of origin" as required by the Act. Attention was drawn to the requirements of the Act, and, when necessary, a printed notice to traders (setting out the principal provisions of the Act) was delivered.

No legal proceedings were instituted during the year.

Bakehouses.

There are 34 bakehouses in the City of which 18 are factories. Two new bakehouses were opened during the year and the use of two discontinued.

Generally speaking the bakehouses are kept in a cleanly condition, and it is seldom that any contraventions are found.

Food and Drugs Adulteration, etc.

Total Samples. The number of samples of food and drugs submitted to the Public Analyst for analysis during the year was 102. As will be seen from the table showing results of of analysis these were of a varied nature, and included most articles in common use in the household.

Milk Samples. As usual, the greatest number of samples obtained was of milk, one of the most important articles of food. Of the 53 samples taken four were reported against—two being deficient in fat and two containing added water. Legal proceedings were taken against the vendors of three of the samples, and the vendor of the fourth sample was cautioned—the added water in this case being very slight, viz.: 1.8 per cent.

Sample No. 91. Contained added water to the extent of 10.9 per cent. Vendor fined £5 with £1 1s. od. costs.

Sample No. 95. Contained added water to the extent of 3.2 per cent. Vendor fined £1 with £1 1s. od. costs.

Sample No. 100. Deficient in fat to the extent of 0.26 per cent., being equivalent to a total deficiency of 8.7 per cent. Case dismissed. The vendor successfully pleaded that the milk was in the same condition as supplied by the cow.

Note.—Samples Nos. 95 and 100 were taken from milk in course of delivery to the vendor of sample No. 91.

Preservatives in Food. Seventy-three samples were submitted to the Public Analyst under the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) Regulations, and all were reported as having conformed to the conditions specified therein.
