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#### SANITARY CONDITIONS.

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1. (1) WATER. The water supply to the Borough which is purchased in bulk from the Chesterton & St. Ives Joint Water Board has been satisfactory. 55 samples have been taken during the 12 months out of which 51 were satisfactory and 4 unsatisfactory, the cause of the latter being traced to alterations and extensions to a pipe line which was treated and remedied. The main supply is treated at source by chlorination and dechlorination. The rainfall in the district was once again below the average

but it was not found necessary to pestrict the public supply in any way.

The total consumption for the year was 31,253,000 gallons which is a decrease of 671,000 gallons on the previous year.

- (2) <u>DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE</u>. No alterations and extensions to the system have been made during the year, careful consideration has been given to reports made by Consulting Engineers as to suggested schemes for the provision of a new system of drainage and construction of sewage works, both as a combined scheme with the neighbouring villages in the St. Ives Rural area, and in addition as a separate scheme dealing only with the Borough. Further surveys are being made at the present time and it is hoped that a definite plan will be agreed upon during the next twelve months, the matter now having become one of urgency owing to the fact that new housing schemes are now under way.
- 2. <u>RIVERS & STREAMS</u>. The River Great Ouse which flows through the Borough, and is controlled by gates under the jurisdiction of the Council, has been practically free of flood, only maintenance work has been necessary, all of a minor character. The River Great Ouse Catchment Board remain the controlling authority.
  - (1) <u>CLOSET ACCOMMODATION</u>. No conversion from pail to water closets have been carried out during the year, it is hoped that with the introduction of a new sewage system which should be carried out within the next few years that the majority of the remaining pail closets will be eliminated. The Council contract for the emptying of the night soil pails in the district and no complaints were received during the year of any importance.
    - (2) <u>PUBLIC CLEANSING.</u> The general system of house refuse collection which is carried out by contract remains unaltered, the twice weekly collection appears to be satisfactory which accounts for the very few complaints received, all of which have been of a minor character. The disposal of refuse presents difficulties which did not arise in pre-war days and this matter will have to be seriously considered in the future. Steps arecstill being taken to salvage materials required by the Ministry the most important atvthe moment being waste paper and kitchen waste. At the request of the Ministry of Supply another Book Drive was held and although following closely on the previous drive, satisfactory results were obtained.
- 4. <u>SHOPS & OFFICES</u>. No infringements were found and no complaints received during the year.
  - CAMPING SITES. No applications for the licensing or camping sites in the Borough area were made during the year and no licences have been granted previously.

SMOKE ABATEMENT, From general observations no nuisances have

been observed with regard to smoke from premises and no complaints have been received.

- 7. <u>SWIMMING POOL</u>. No alterations or structual work of any importance was carried out at the swimming baths during the season, the general layout remaining unchanged. The baths were pumped dry and cleansed before the commencement of the season as in previous years and the method of continually changing the water by the flow of the river water through the wide inlet and outlet, the bathsbremain the same. In spite of the unsatisfactory weather during the season the attendance was good.
- 8. <u>ERADICATION OF BED BUGS</u>. No evidence of infestation during routine inspections was found during the year and no complaints were received.

#### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

- (a) <u>MILK SUPPLY</u>. The number of cowsheds and dairies in the district is 7, all of which are maintained in a satisfactory manner. As in previous years practically the whole of the milk retailed in the Borough is produced in the Saint Ives Rural District Area.
- (b) <u>MEAT</u>. The occupation of the Borough Slaughter house remains in the hands of the Ministry of Food, the inspection and examination of the meat has been carried out by Officials appointed and under the jurisdiction of the County Council. No private slaughter houses in the area were in use during the year.
- (c) <u>BAKEHOUSES</u>. The three registered bakehouses in the area have been kept in a satisfactory manner, important improvements have been carried out in the cases of two.
- (d) <u>FACTORIES</u>. Routine inspections of factories have shown they have been maintained in a satisfactory manner, the Factory Inspector drew attention to minor defects in lavatory accomodation which have been rectified.
