TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF

PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I wish to present my 24th Annual Report on the health of the Borough. This includes statistics on those services in the town administered by Cheshire County Council under Part III of the National Health Service Act, 1946. On April 1st, 1971 certain services provided by Cheshire County Council through its health department were transferred to the new social services department and Divisional Health Committees were disbanded. Reports to these latter committees have, therefore, ceased but local statistics have been maintained.

The census figure of 22,770 shows an increase of 823 over the previous years estimate of 21,947. For the second year in succession the number of births increased by 31 giving a corrected rate of 21 per 1000 population. In addition the number of deaths fell by 56 to 268. The number of infant deaths was 8 compared with 7 in 1970. There was a marked fall in the number of the main infectious diseases notified to me. Only 162 cases were reported of which half (80) were measles, but it is disquieting to note the increased incidence of infective jaundice.

Although this report covers the work in 1971 it is difficult not to be influenced by events at the time of writing. The White Paper on National Health Service reorganisation has now been published and preparatory work on local government reorganisation is well advanced. A pattern is slowly emerging which will I hope allay many personal fears among your staff and at the same time lay down the foundations for an improved administration from which both patient and staff will benefit.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Committee for their help and advice and the members of the staff for their loyal support cheerfully given.

PHYSICAL FEATURES OF THE DISTRICT

The Borough of Stalybridge is roughly triangular in shape, bordered on the south side by the Municipal Borough of Dukinfield and on the north west by the Municipal Borough of Ashton-under-Lyne and on the north and east by Mossley and Mottram respectively.

The River Tame, which at this point is the boundary of Lancashire and Cheshire, divides the town; the northern half lies in Lancashire, whilst the southern half lies in Cheshire. For administrative purposes the Borough is considered to be in Cheshire.

The Borough surrounded by hills on all sides except the west is situated on the westerly slopes of the Pennine Chain, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles east of Manchester and, although the main portion of the town is built round the River Tame at approximately 400 feet above sea level, the ground on the eastern side rises to a height of 1,000 feet.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

Although this part of the County was originally developed as a textile area there has been a changing pattern over the years. It is true textiles still employ the greatest number of people, but other industries have crept into the town and created their own problems, particularly to tenants of adjoining properties.

BIRTH RATE

There was an increase in the births in the Borough in 1971 when 432 were recorded. This figure is made up of 216 males and 216 females, and gives a corrected livebirth rate of 21.0 per thousand population. The number of illegitimate births remained the same at 36 representing 8.33% of all births.

DEATH RATE

The number of deaths in the Borough decreased by 56 to 268. Of these 130 were males and 138 females giving a crude death rate of 11.7 per thousand population.

The corrected death rate for Stalybridge, that is the death rate adjusted for the particular variations in age and sex distribution in Stalybridge compared with the country as a whole, was 12.4. Chest conditions resulted in 49 deaths of which 12 were carcinoma of the lung (8 men, 4 women) and 10 were from bronchitis and emphysema. There were 24 deaths from pneumonia. Heart disease claimed 78 victims of which the greatest number was from coronary thrombosis, 61 patients died from this condition.

There was one suicide in the borough during 1971, and accidents accounted for 5 deaths (4 motor vehicle and 1 by other accidents).

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

There were 8 infant deaths during the year a reduction on the 1970 figure. This represents a rate of 18.0, 17.0 in 1970.

STILLBIRTHS

There were 3 stillbirths notified in 1971 giving a rate of 7 per thousand related births (7 in 1970).

NEO-NATAL DEATH RATE

The neo-natal death rate, which represents the number of deaths of infants under 4 weeks of age per thousand live-births, was 14 compared with 12 in 1970.

PERI-NATAL DEATH RATE

This rate is based on the mortality in the period surrounding the birth and includes both neo-natal deaths and stillbirths. It increased this year from 17 to 21.

MATERNAL MORTALITY

There were no maternal deaths during the year.

Shown as a percentage of Total Deaths

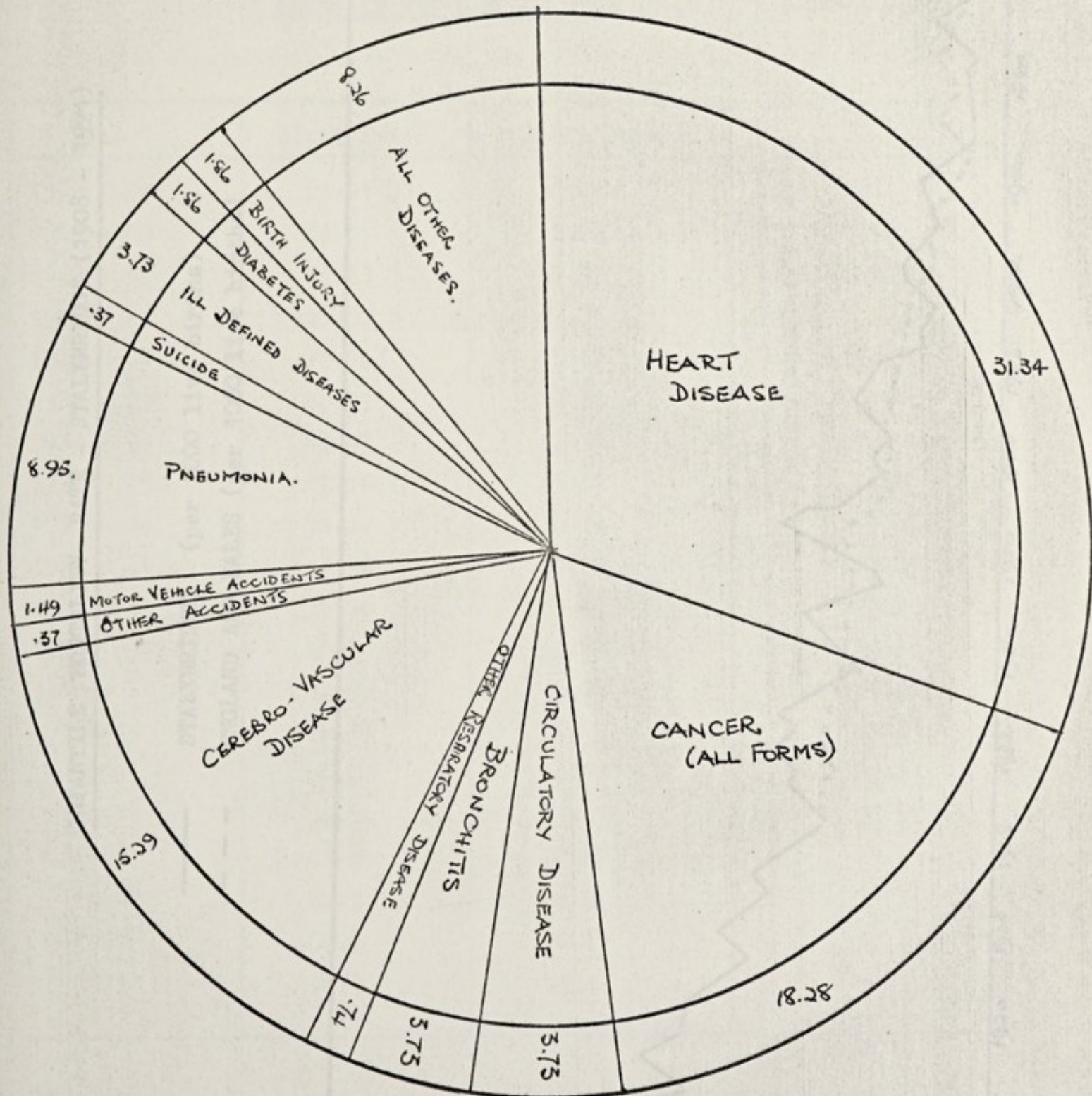
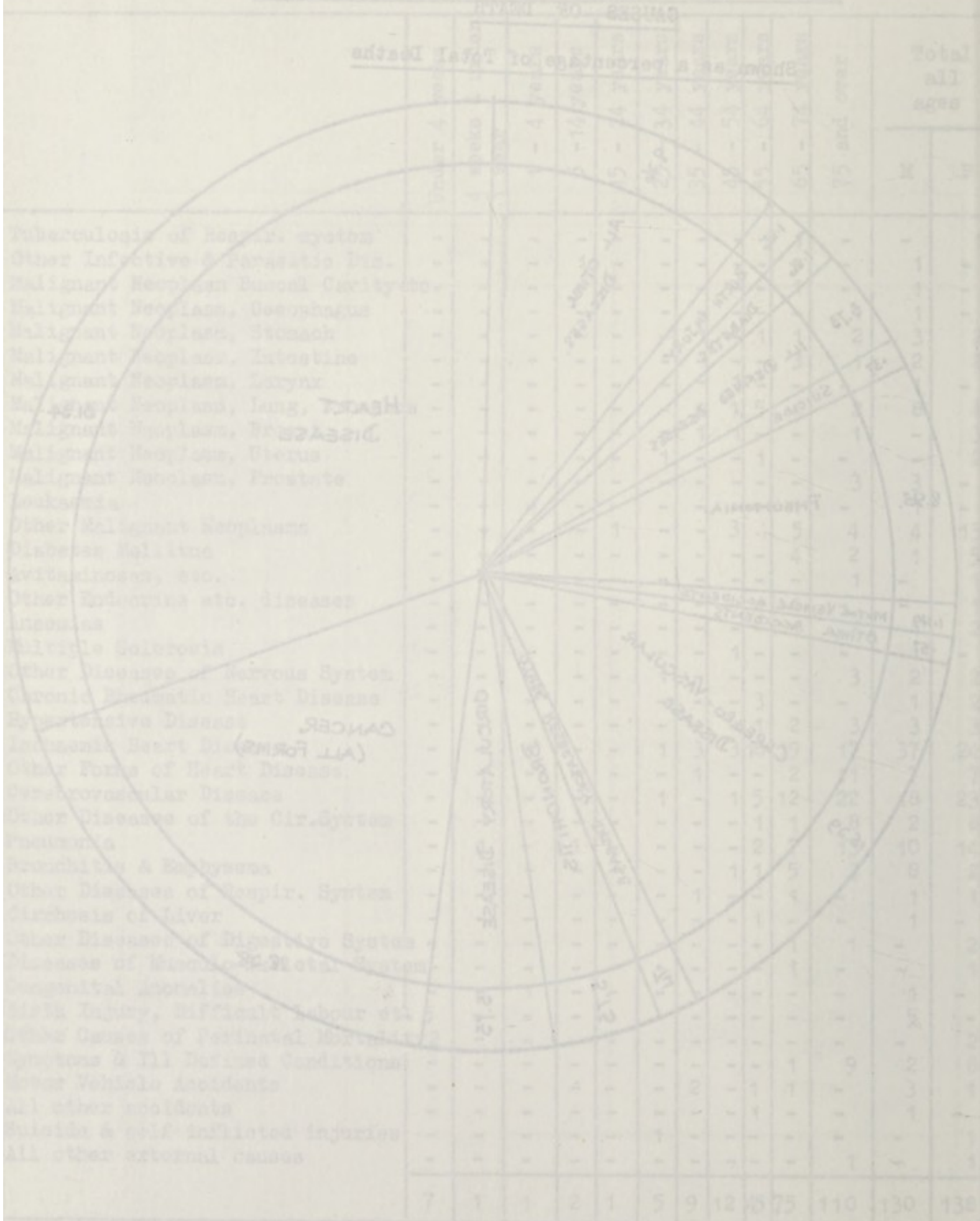

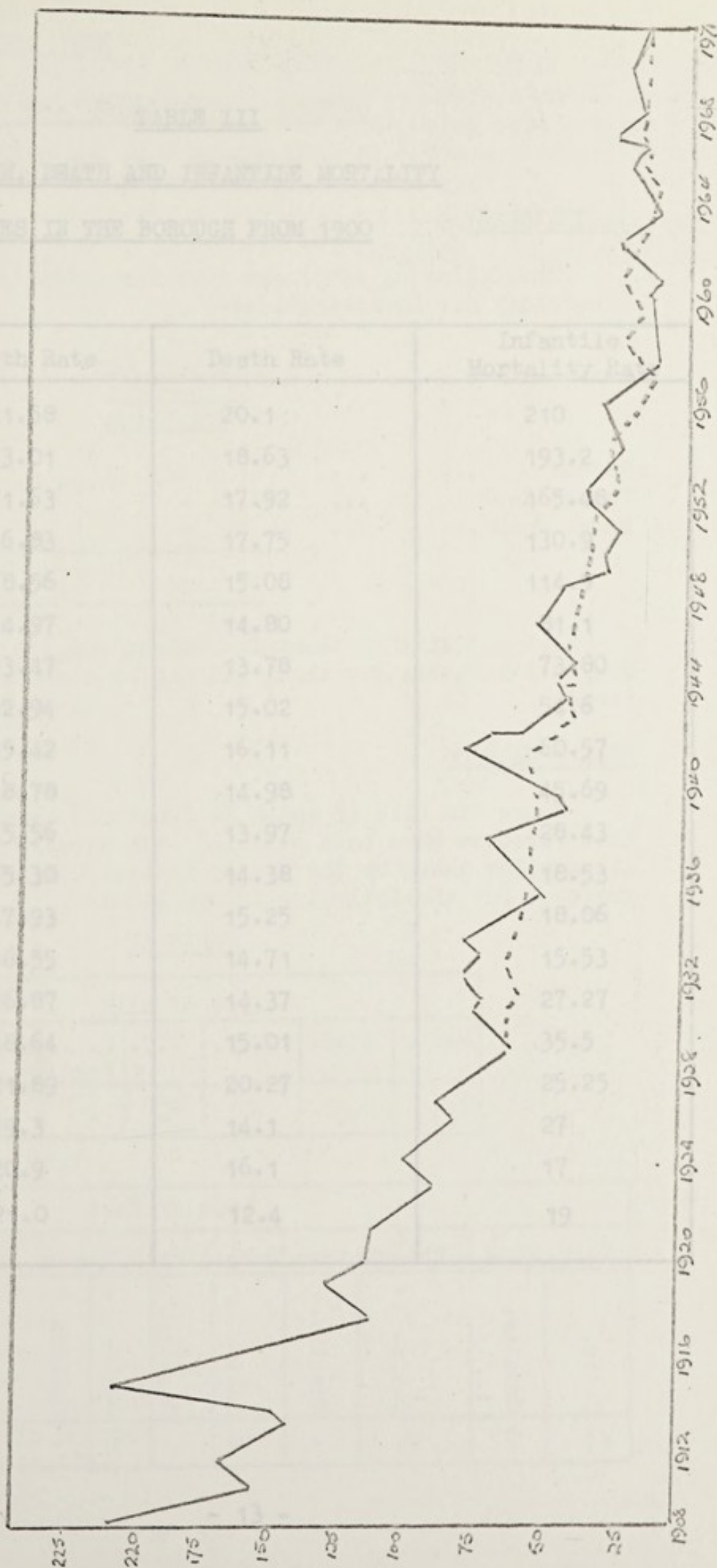
1971 WHITE Males 15-64

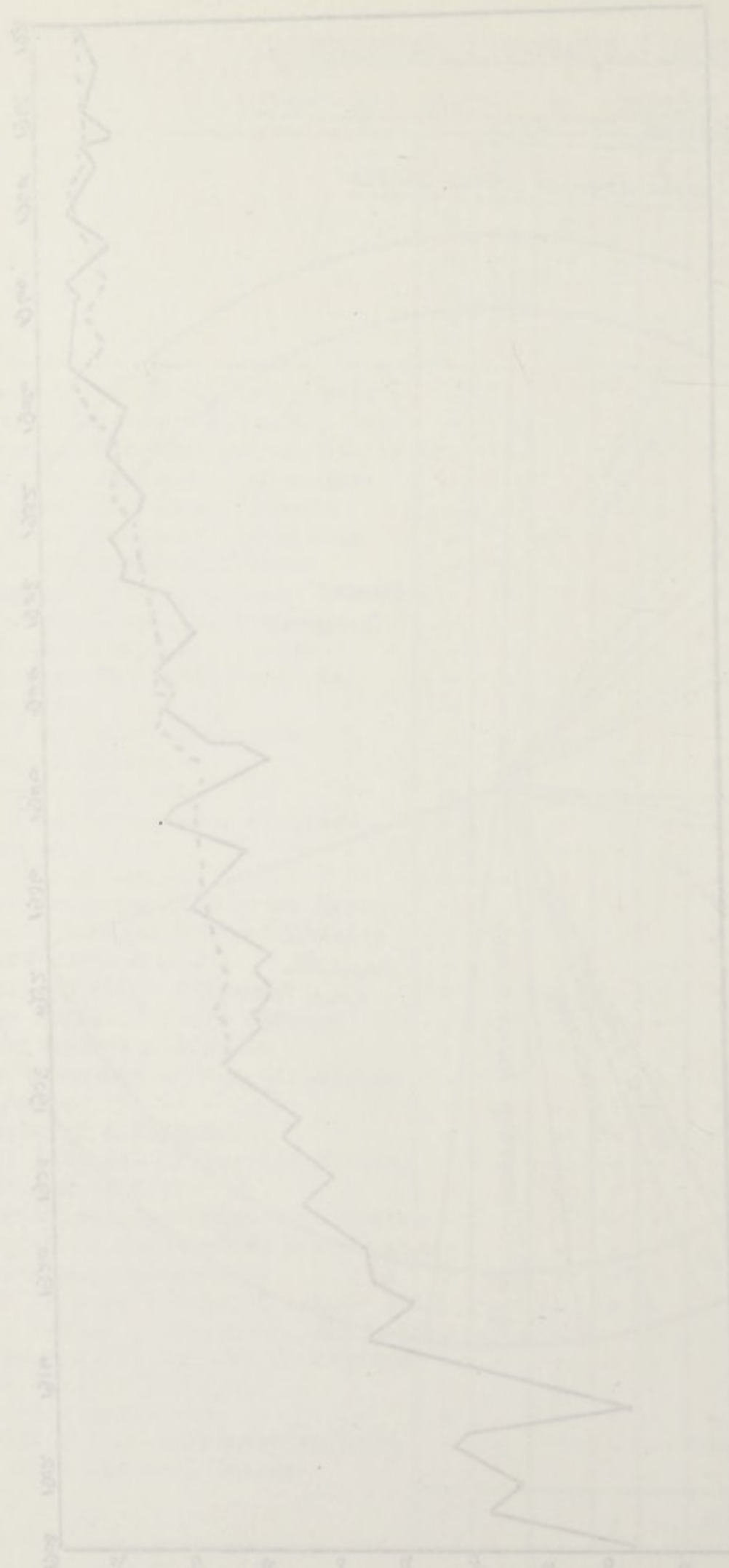
CAUSES OF DEATH IN VARIOUS AGE GROUPS

The following criteria have applied to the Public Swimming Baths for the past few years:-

- (1) Source of Supply - Town's mains
- (2) Both pools are operated on the continuous turn-over system
 - (a) Filtration
 - (b) Aeration
 - (c) Sterilisation by Chlorine Gas

Chemical treatment is constant and frequent tests are taken to ensure that breakpoint chlorination is present giving a free chlorine reading of two parts per million with a potential hydrogen reading of 7.8 parts per million. The resultant bacterial counts under these conditions have been nil.

Periodically both pools are completely emptied and the basins scrubbed.

Incontinence pads continue to be the main demand and prove to be a most useful nursing aid.
