

SECTION F. - PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND

OTHER DISEASES.

Cases of Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Typhoid & Fara-Typhoid and Erysipelas are admitted by contract to Bourne Isolation Hospital at an annual maintenance charge of £180 per ennum for 12 patients per year and an additional charge of £3.3.0. per week for all cases over this number. Accommodation has proved adequate.

Cases of Cerebro spinal Meningitis & Dysentery can only be admitted to Bourne Hospital by special arrangement.

Minor Infectious Disease Hospital - The White House, Stamford.

The ministry of Health minor Infectious Disease Hospital has provided a much needed accommodation for Measles, Rubelle, Chicken-pox, Humps and whooping Cough amongst evacuee children. Children normally resident in the area can be admitted at the weekly charge of 20.3.0. to the Council concerned.


This hospital was opened in the spring, after the winter epidemics, which had, by this time, practically cased.

Accommodation will provide for two types of cases of both sexes being treated simultaneously.

Ambulance facilities are provided by arrangement with the Controller A.R.F. Kesteven, for the use of Civil Defence ambulances; the necessary disinfection being the responsibility of the Borough.

Diphtheria Immunization.

This has proceeded satisfactorily throughout the year, practically all inoculations being performed at the Clinic held in Broad Street once a month. Attendances of school children have been very satisfactory, but the number in the under 5 age group is still very low.
