BOROUGH OF STAMFORD.

ABBREVIATED ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1948.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1948. The population for the Borough has for the first time exceeded 11,000. The vital statistics can again be considered very satisfactory.

There has been a slight decline in the birth rate since 1948 and the death rate has remained practically stationary. On the other hand the infantile mortality rate of 12.0 constitutes a new low record and compares most favourably with the figure of 34.0 (itself a record) for England and Wales.

There have been no deaths from maternal causes, no deaths of children under 2 years of age from diarrhoeal diseases as compared with 3.3 per 1000 live births for the whole country, and no deaths from infectious diseases.

Immunisation against diphtheria has continued very satisfactorily; no cases of diphtheria have occurred.



SECTION B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Laboratory Facilities.

Examinations of pathological specimens in connection with infectious diseases and bacteriological examinations of water supplies are carried out in the Ministry of Health Emergency Public Health Laboratory, Memorial Hospital, Peterborough, at an annual charge of £10.

SECTION C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA.

1. Water.

The water supply of the Borough is provided by the Stamford Water Works, owner, The Marquess of Exeter, K.G., C.M.G.

This is a piped supply derived from the following sources:-

Bone Mill.	(Well)
Whitewater.	(Springs)
Wothorpe.	(Springs)
Northfields, Stamford.	(Bore Hole)
Ryhall Road, Stamford.	(Bore Hole)

The Bone Mill supply can be augmented by springs situated on the Leicester Road, Thornhaugh and Burghley High Park, the latter supply was used very little during the year. Practically no water has been available from the Wothorpe Springs.

Water is derived from the Lincolnshire Limestone and all supplies with the exception of the Northfields and Ryhall Road Bore Holes are situated without the Borough, (South of the river Welland), in the high ground of the Soke of Peterborough.

All supplies have a high total and permanent hardness and are chlorinated at source.

56 samples of raw water were taken for bacteriological examination during 1948 - all supplies have maintained their satisfactory standard of purity except for Whitewater, which has on occasions been slightly below the average.

48 bacteriological examinations of chlorinated water have been carried out - on one occasion only was chlorination found to be below 100% efficiency and this fault was corrected in a very short time. Special precautions have been taken with regard to the Whitewater supply. 10 chemical examinations have been made - all results were very satisfactory.

Apart from chlorination, no other treatment is given to the water.

Proceedings under Public Health Acts.

Owing to building restrictions no action has been possible with regard to slum clearance, unfit houses have been dealt with individually.

From information submitted 18 new Council Houses have been completed during the year.

The approximate number of applicants is 485, of whom some 189 are tenants and 296 lodger families. These figures do not include those families living in insanitary houses who have not yet applied for council houses - the number of such families is estimated at 126.

MILK AND DAIRIES.

One additional dairy has been registered during the year.

Monthly milk sampling tests from all producers and retailers in the Borough have been taken, results were quite satisfactory but a little below those of last year.

32 samples of heat treated milk have been taken for Methylene Blue and Phosphatase Test. 5 failed Methylene Blue Tests, no failures in Phosphatase.

Bulk samples of 2 herds were taken for the biological test for presence of Tubercle Bacilli - both proved negative.

Action was taken under Sec. 14(3) of the Food & Drugs Act 1938 regarding one firm's premises, which were subsequently put in order.

Owing to the difficulty in control of the selling of ice creams and distribution of other food stuffs, application was made for special Byelaws - these will be in force by June 1949.

SECTION F. PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER

DISEASES.

Hospital Accommodation.

Only 9 cases of infectious diseases have required isolation hospital treatment during 1948; owing to staff shortages, Bourne Isolation was not able to admit, all cases were therefore treated at the Peterborough City Isolation Hospital. No difficulty was experienced in obtaining admissions.

Since the commencement of the National Health Service on July 5th, responsibility for providing isolation hospital accommodation rests with the Peterborough Hospital Area (No.12) Management Committee under the East Anglian Regional Hospital Board.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

Since July 5th. Kesteven County Council have assumed complete responsibility and control of diphtheria immunisation, the Barn Hill Immunisation Clinic has continued as heretofore and attendances have been satisfactory.

In addition, immunisations are performed by the children's own doctors under the National Health Act.

The Borough Council is re-imbursed for all immunisations performed by the Medical Officer of Health at Barn Hill Clinic.

For the third year in succession no cases of diphtheria have occurred.

I would again like to thank the Stamford Red Cross Detachment for another year of valuable help in staffing the Barn Hill Immunisation Clinic.

The response to diphtheria immunisation in the Borough is I consider very satisfactory.

Pediculosis - Infestation by body and head lice.

Steps taken to combat infestation are the reporting of cases to the Medical Officer of Health by General Practitioners, School Medical Services and Health Visitors and Factory Surgeon; by visiting the homes of children found to be infested, and by arranging for simultaneous treatment under supervision at home or at the clinic.

Treatment for head lice is given by the parents in their homes under supervision of the School Nurse.

Flea infestation of houses is treated by Benzine Hexachloride - results have been quite satisfactory.

Bed Bugs.

2 houses have been disinfested for bed bugs.

Health Education.

Lectures have been given under the Ministry of Health's Scheme on the Spread of Diseases by Contaminated Foods. Leaflets and posters on health matters are displayed and distributed at the School and Infant Welfare clinics and are accepted with great interest by the parents. Similar arrangements are made at the Public Library.

A local Food Trades Committee has been formed with the object of laying down an agreed standard of hygiene in the preparation and handling of food in establishments and distribution.
