# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE STANLEY URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the health of the Urban District and work of the Health Department for the year 1973.

This of course will be the last report for the Stanley Urban District Council and owing to re-organisation in the Health and Local Government Services certain parts of the normal report have had to be curtailed as information was not available.

Although there was a small natural decrease in population during the year the Registrar's estimated mid-year population figure, for the first time for 25 years, shows an increase in population in the Urban District.

Our records of health statistics for the area show a number of interesting facts.

- (a) the birth rate is the lowest on record and for the first time is less than the deathrate.
  - (b) the infantile mortality rate is the lowest on record.
  - (c) there have been no deaths from tuberculosis for the first time on record.

In order that comparison can be made of the vital statistics for the first and last years of the Urban District I have included the 1937 figures in Appendix A, page 31, of this report.

There has been a decrease in the number of notifications of infectious diseases due to a reduction of scarlet fever and measles cases.

I should like to express my appreciation of the help and co-operation given by my colleagues—the general practitioners, hospital medical officers, the County Council medical staff and the Public Health Laboratory staff.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all members of the Council for their support and interest in all matters relating to public health and pay tribute to the loyal co-operation which I received from all members of the staff, of the Health Department.

#### DEATHS

(a) Infant and Maternal Deaths

The number of infant deaths during the year was 6 (11 per 1,000 live births), 4 of which occurred in the first week of life. In the previous year there were 14 infant deaths (23 per 1,000 live births). The rate for Durham County was 16 and England and Wales 17.

The number of stillbirths which occurred during the year was 8, giving a stillbirth rate of 15 per 1,000 live and stillbirths. This compares with the rate of 14 for Durham County and 12 for England and Wales.

There were 12 perinatal deaths during the year. The perinatal mortality rate was 22 compared with 23 for Durham County and 21 for England and Wales.

The main causes of death in the district during the year were diseases of the heart and circulatory system, cancer, bronchitis and pneumonia in that order of prevalence. Of the total of 587 resident deaths, 326 died outside the urban district, mainly in neighbouring hospitals.

#### Accidents

During the year there was an increase in the number of accidents causing death, there being 26 as compared with 21 in 1972.

The number of deaths from accidents in the home in this area was 14 as compared with 12 in 1972. Provisional figures for home accident deaths in England and Wales show a reduction of 136 deaths as compared with 1972 the comparative figures being 1973—5507 and 1972—5643. The majority of these deaths were old people (3,501) and the main cause of death was "falls in the home".

#### HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### A. Environmental Circumstances and Local Authority Services.

#### (a) GENERAL

#### Water

The Durham County Water Board provide the public supply from the reservoirs at Smiddy Shaw, Waskerley Park and Hisehope; filtration and chlorination being carried out at Honey Hill, Waskerley.

Regular tests made by the Water Board's chemist on samples of water taken in the District show that the bacteriological and chemical quality of the water was maintained at a high standard.

One sample of water from mains supply and 31 from non-mains supplies were taken by this Department and forwarded for bacteriological examination to the Public Health Laboratory. Fifteen of the non-mains samples were found to be unsatisfactory and users were advised to boil all water used for drinking purposes.

New mains were laid to serve private developments at Greenacres, Catchgate, Burnside, Stanley and Tanfield Lea (near The Bungalows) and Council developments at Stanley Hall Estate, Stanley and Hobson Industrial Estate, Burnopfield. A new main was also laid to serve the Beamish Museum.

#### Drainage and Sewerage

During the year sewage from the district continued to be treated at the various works at East Tanfield, Hustledown, Dipton and Rowlands Gill.

# Refuse Collection and Disposal

There was no change in the refuse and disposal service during the year.

#### Pet Animals Act, 1951

Routine inspections were carried out on the three licensed pet shops in Stanley and Annfield Plain and it was not found necessary to take any action under the Act.

#### Noise Abatement

No complaints regarding noise nuisances were received by this Department during the year.

#### Atmospheric Polution

The measurement of smoke and sulphur in the atmosphere was continued as part of the National Survey. Three sites are in operation and daily readings are taken. (See Appendix E).

Prevention of Damage by Pests

Meetings of the County Workable Area Committee and Durham No. 2 Area Committee, continued to take place during the year.

The half yearly treatment of sewers and sewage disposal works was carried out—the first treatment between 12th and 30th March when 257 manholes were baited and there were 24 complete and 19 partial takes and the second between the 8th and 25th October when 271 manholes were baited and 19 showed complete takes and 22 partial takes.

The number of premises found to be infested with rats or mice during the year was 462, which included 33 food shops and food preparation rooms, 24 schools and 280 dwelling houses. (See Appendix D).

#### (iv) Medical Priority

During the year 103 applicants for Council houses requested medical priority. Nine were considered to justify special consideration and 9 families were rehoused.

Eighty-seven families occupying Council houses requested a transfer to more suitable accommodation on medical grounds. Eleven applications were granted and by the end of the year 13 families were transferred to other accommodation.

#### (d) INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

#### (f) General

During the year 373 inspections were made of the various food establishments in the area and 14 informal notices were served on the owners to carry out certain repairs. Eight informal notices were complied with during the year.

The Department continues to supervise and advise on the handling of open and perishable food and other aspects of food hygiene and wholesalers and retailers in the food trade have continued to be very co-operative.

#### (ii) Milk and Dairies (General) Regulations, 1959

There were 78 registered distributors of milk at the end of the year. Twelve samples of pasteurised milk and I sample of raw T.T. milk were taken by this department and forwarded to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examination. All were found to be satisfactory.

The County Council Health Department has forwarded the following results of samples of milk taken by their staff from retailers in this area.

Raw tuberculin-tested—13 samples—2 failed the methyline blue test.

Sterilised—29 samples—all satisfactory

Pasteurised—90 samples—1 sample failed the methyline blue test

1 sample failed the phosphatase test.

In addition, 10 samples taken from hospitals, 67 from dairies and 1 from a school proved to be satisfactory.

#### Scarlet Fever

Acute Meningitis

A female, aged 9 years, who had been removed from this area to the Shotley Bridge General Hospital, was found to be suffering from this disease.

#### Dysentery

There were 3 cases of this disease notified as compared with 2 in the previous year. The 3 cases, all females aged 2 months, 5 years and 37 years, had been removed to Shotley Bridge General Hospital and were found to be suffering from Enteritis F. Coli 0126, Shigella Sonnei and Shigella Flexna respectively.

#### Food Poisoning

There were 5 confirmed cases of this disease. Two were sporadic cases, one being a male aged 16 years, who had just returned from Spain where he and his father had both been hospitalised with diarrhoea and vomiting, and who was found to be suffering from Sal. typhi-murium and the other a male aged 69 years who was diagnosed in hospital as Salmonella subgenus I (Salmonella unnamed).

The remaining 3 cases were concerned in a family outbreak involving a mother (44 years), a son aged 4 months and daughter aged 14 years. All were found to be suffering from Salmonella typhi-murium.

In September there was a small outbreak of gastro-enteritis in a clothing factory in the urban district involving twelve women operatives. Symptoms were headaches, dizziness, nausea, stomach pains and one or two suffered from diarrhoea and vomiting. Not all the women affected exhibited all the symptoms.

Faeces specimens from patients and canteen staff and food and drink samples were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory but all proved to be negative.

#### Poliomyentis

Although it is now 19 years since a case of poliomyelitis was notified in the area it is nevertheless important to continue vaccinating the young children to prevent any occurrence of a poliomyelitis outbreak.

A school scheme for poliomyelitis vaccination was carried out in all the infants schools early in the year. Children whose parents had given consent were given full courses or booster doses of oral vaccine as required. Details of the number of children vaccinated are as follows:

# (b) Tuberculin Services in the Area

(i) The special sessions for contacts of known cases of tuberculosis have been continued at the Chest Clinic at South Moor Hospital and 36 contacts were skin tested. Nineteen were found to be tuberculin negative and 26 were vaccinated with B.C.G.

(ii) The annual B.C.G. vaccination of school children, aged 11 and upwards and whose parents had given consent, was carried out in the senior schools in the area during October and November.

#### 1. Care of the Aged

The number of applications for rehousing in Aged Persons' Bungalows (402) showed a decrease of 11 as compared with 1972 but an increasing number of these requested medical priority in rehousing.

An increasing number of applications were received for meals on wheels and there is at present a waiting list for some areas. The two luncheon clubs at Burnopfield and Tanfield Lea continued to provide a much needed service for those old people unable to prepare a hot meal for themselves.

There were 550 live and stillbirths assigned to this area of which 532 (97%) occurred in hospitals and 18 (3%) at home. There were 8 stillborn births and 4 deaths in the first week of life.

All midwives are trained in the use of, and possess apparatus for entonox analgesia.

(c) Health Visitors' Service

There are 5 Health Visitors operating in this area from their Headquarters at the Child Welfare Clinic, High Street, Stanley (Telephone No. Stanley 3199).

(d) County Ambulance Service
