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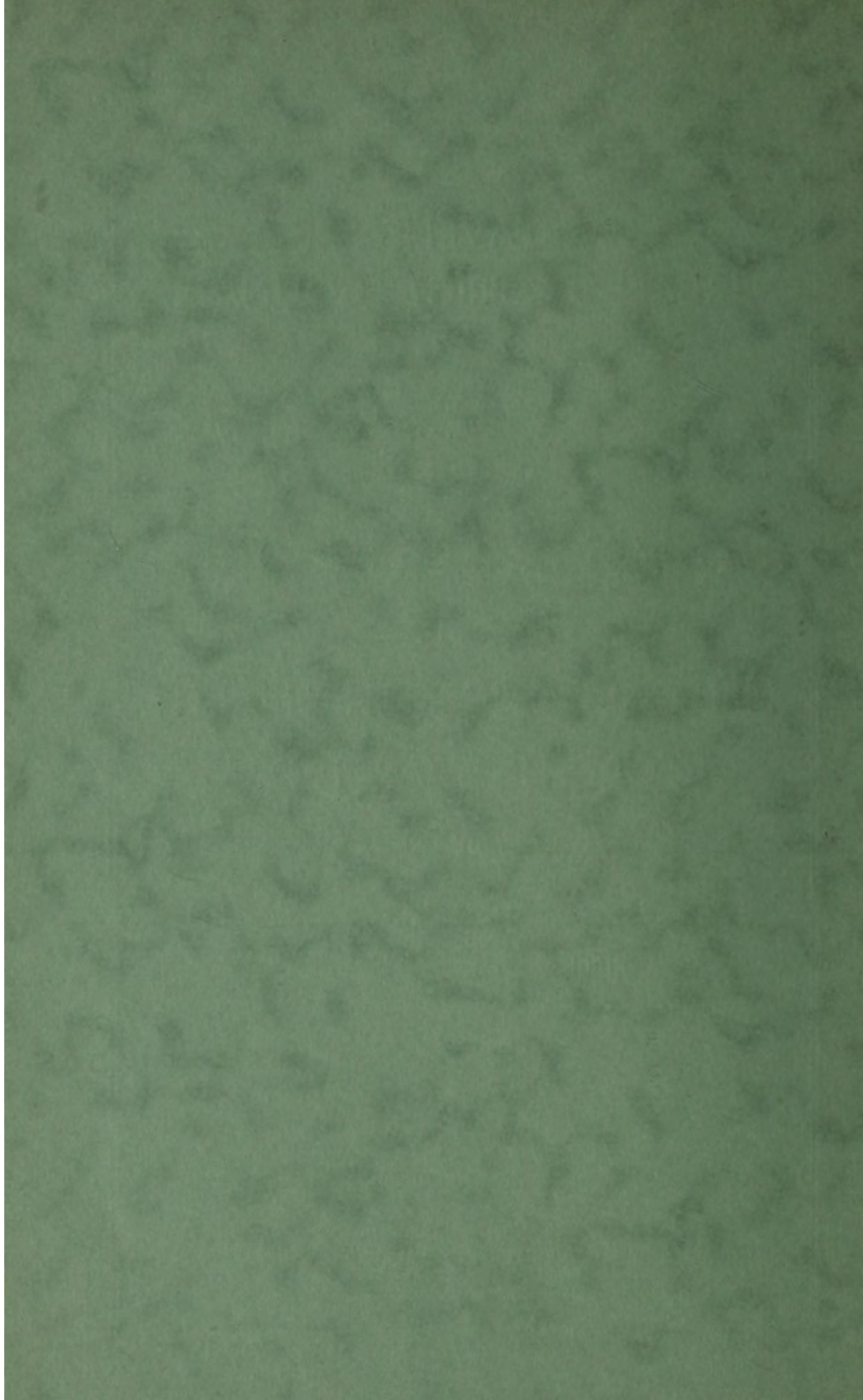

## ANNUAL REPORT.

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Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith present my Annual Report on the Health of the Urban District for the year 1942. As in the other war-time reports, many tables, etc., have to be omitted on instructions of the Ministry of Health.

The vital statistics are worthy of comment as they are the best presented in the short history of the Urban District. The birth rate has risen from 17.48 per 1,000 population in 1941, to 21.62 per 1,000. Along with this, the infantile mortality rate has shown a drop from 44.21 per 1,000 live births in 1941 to the phenominally low figure of 29.98 per 1,000.

The only figure to compare with this was in 1935, when an infantile mortality rate of 27.77 was recorded ; but this figure was based on 9 months statistics only.

The general death rate has risen from 8.58 per 1,000 to 9.62 per 1,000.

The general health of the district is good, and judging from the condition of the children one sees at clinics, the future outlook is good.

### SCABIES ORDER, 1941.

A joint meeting of representatives from Clay Cross, Dronfield and Staveley Urban District Councils, and Chesterfield and Clowne Rural District Councils, held on 21st March, 1942, decided to act jointly in provision of a cleansing station, under the Scabies Order, 1941, and the Chesterfield Rural District Council were requested to undertake the administration of such a station.

An empty shop and house belonging to the Staveley Coal & Iron Co., which had been earmarked, was leased, as the erection of a new building was not possible. Although materials were difficult to obtain, thanks to the willing co-operation of the staff of the Staveley Co. Cottage Dept., and my colleagues on the Staveley Urban District Council, the adaption and decorations were completed by August, and the centre was open to receive patients on the 13th of that month. I take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Levick of the Staveley Co., and Mr. McGaw for their assistance.

Enclosed with this Report is a paper on the routine treatment of scabies carried out at the centre.

#### Scabies Treatment.

It is interesting to note (in view of the method described in the paper) the report I gave to the Committee in January, 1942.

In it, the provision of means of disinfecting clothing and bedding was set out as being necessary. Mellowby's researches subsequent to that date, clearly indicated that such articles played a minor part in the spread of Scabies, and, therefore, it was decided to carry out the technique as described, and there is no doubt from the results that the decision made has been amply justified. The important thing is to get whole households to attend for treatment.

The table below shows the number of cases treated from the 13th August to 31st December, 1942.

## INCIDENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

### Enteric Fever.

Again no cases were notified.

### Diphtheria.

Eight cases were notified as against nineteen the previous year. One of the cases notified this year proved fatal.

### Scarlet Fever

Seventy cases were notified in 1942 as against thirty-one the previous year.

### Cerebro-spinal Fever.

Two cases were notified, both were fatal. Ten cases with four deaths were recorded in the previous year.

### Measles.

Thirty-three cases were notified. There were no fatal cases.

### Whooping Cough.

One case was notified.

### Diphtheria Immunisation.

550 children received a complete course of treatment during the year.



## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

### (1) Nursing in the Home.

No nursing in the home is undertaken by the Urban District Council.

### (2) Midwives.

Are under the supervision of the Derbyshire County Council.

### (3) Laboratory Facilities.

All bacteriological work is done at the Bacteriological Department of the County Council at Derby. Chemical analysis is done by the County Analyst at Derby.

### (4) Hospitals General.

Chesterfield Royal Hospital. Public Assistance Hospital, Chesterfield.

### Ambulance Facilities.

(a) **Infectious Diseases.**—Dronfield, Langwith, Mastin Moor, Morton, Penmore and Spital Hospitals have motor ambulances.

(b) **Non-Infectious Diseases.**—Motor ambulances are maintained by G. Rimmington, Staveley, and Bolsover Urban District Council.

### Clinic and Treatment Centres.

County Clinic, Brimington Road, Chesterfield.—Tuberculosis School Clinics for minor ailments, and a Dental Clinic are carried on in this building. Infant Welfare and Pre-natal Clinics are held at Barrow Hill and Staveley.

The County Council provide treatment for venereal disease at the Royal Hospital, Chesterfield.

### Dairies and Cowsheds.

During the year some complaints have been received as to the keeping quality of the milk. These were investigated at the producers' premises and advice given as to the keeping clean of utensils and the cooling and storage of milk.

35 persons are registered as Producer Retailers, and 15 persons registered as retailers of milk, only 11 of these have their premises outside the Council area.

90 inspections have been made during the year and defects were found, 4 cases of these were abated satisfactorily.

### Meat Inspection.

There are three registered Slaughterhouses in the area, but these are not being used owing to the meat being supplied by the Ministry of Food, through the Chesterfield abattoir.

**Factories and Workshops.**

26 visits have been made to Factories and Workshops in the area. No complaints have been received and no nuisances were noted.

**Bakehouses.**

10 visits have been made and all were found to be satisfactory.

**Infectious Diseases.**

Enquiries in all cases were made and defects and nuisances noted.

During the year 140 visits have been made and 20 rooms fumigated.

**Shops.**

210 visits to shops have been made during the year, no cases of breach of regulations were found and no action was found necessary.

**Smoke Observations at Colliery Tips.**

No observations have been taken during the year, as the works are mostly steel and iron works. Visits have been made to burning colliery tips. The district has suffered from atmospheric impurities from these tips.

**Rag and Flock Acts, 1911 to 1928.**

There are no premises in the district where rag or flock is manufactured or sold.

**Bed Bugs.**

Few complaints have been received, but tenants in six Council houses and three private houses were fumigated during the year with Thermatox Fumigators, and were found satisfactory on re-visits.

All Council houses are now inspected as they become vacated, and fumigation carried out if found necessary.

**Closet Accommodation.**

No conversions from earth closets to W.C.'s have been carried out during the year. 8 new W.C.'s have been erected for use of military personnel during the year.

### **Rats and Mice Destruction Act.**

During the year, two complaints were received, and visits were made. Squils and Liverpool Virus were laid.

During the year the local rat-catchers have regularly visited the Council refuse tips and farm buildings in the area.

The number of rats caught and reported was 360.

### **Salvage Collection and Disposal.**

Collection of waste food by the Council is carried out twice weekly, by means of communal food bins. 360 of these are placed in various parts of the area.
