ANNUAL REPORT.

Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith present the Annual Report on the health of the Urban District for 1945.

The change over from a nation engaged in total war to peace time has not brought the rapid improvement in living conditions which many optimists foretold. The year has been one of preparation and planning.

While the vital statistics are not so good as the previous year in which the death rates and infantile mortality rates showed a very marked decrease from 1943, the figures for 1945 are, I consider, quite satisfactory.

They show an improvement on 1943 and previous years, tending to be more in keeping with the gradual decrease over the last ten years, while 1944 figures showed a sudden drop.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS, ETC.

The housing position at the end of the year showed no change. No census has been taken of cases of overcrowding as the position of many families is so quickly changing, sons being demobbed and arriving with wife and family, daughters leaving to join husbands, etc., present an ever changing picture.

Water Supplies.

There is no change in the position from the previous year of 4,465 premises, all but six have a piped supply from the North East Derbyshire Joint Water Committee.

Samples are taken regularly throughout the district and the suppliers take samples at the source. Copies of the reports of the analysis are exchanged between the two authorities.

TREATMENT CENTRE, POOLSBROOK.

During the year a total of 2,088 cases were treated at the centre. This shows a decrease of 613 cases over the year. The decrease is entirely due to the number of cases coming for scabies treatment, 2.378 being treated in 1944 as against 1.754 in 1945. With regard to the cases sent with verminous heads 334 were sent in 1945 compared with 333 in 1944.

The proportion of persons sent as scables and found to be infested is comparable to the proportions in the previous year.

The figures indicate that while scabies has markedly decreased there is no sign that infestation of heads is decreasing, rather the reverse as the number of cases treated in 1943 (the first complete year of working) was only 185.

During the year several inquiries were undertaken.

D.D.T. which is now very well known to the general public, has been tried for verminous head infestations at the Centre. The results were not satisfactory.

Two inquiries have been conducted for Professor Kenneth Mellanby of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Both of these were concerned with an alternative method of treatment for scabies. In neither case was there any advantage over the present method.

The results of the investigations of louse populations in cases with verminous heads have now been published. An article in the "Medical Officer" for 10th June, 1945, gave full details. The most important findings were that: over 90% of those with nits also have live lice. Over half of those infested have a louse population of more than ten, and 10% have more than 100 lice each. The age-groups showing the heaviest infestation also have the largest number of lice. One interesting conclusion was that the lighter the nit infestation and the greater the ratio between immature stages of lice and adults. It is not to be assumed because there are "only a few nits" that no lice are present; a small infestation is merely the forerunner of a much heavier infestation. The importance is stressed of the earliest treatment once nits are found.

INCIDENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

- **Diphtheria**—Five cases were notified in the year as against four in the previous year. No deaths resulted.
- Diphtheria Immunisation—Age under 5 years, 83. Age 5 years and over but under 15, 87.
- Scarlet Fever—Forty-three cases were notified in the year as against Forty-two in the preceding year. No deaths resulted.
- Measles—Two hundred and ninety-six were notified as compared with three cases in the previous year. There was one death.
- Whooping Cough—Forty-four cases were notified in the year as against forty-nine in the preceding year. There were no deaths.

Erysipclas—Three cases were notified.

Cerebo Spinal Fever—One case was notified.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

(1) Nursing in the Home.

No nursing in the home is undertaken by the Urban District Council.

(2) Midwives.

Are under the supervision of the Derbyshire County Council.

(3) Laboratory Facilities.

All bacteriological work is done at the Bacteriological Department of the County Council at Derby. Chemical analysis is done by the County Analyst at Derby.

(4) Hospitals General.

Chesterfield Royal Hospital: Public Assistance Hospital, Chesterfield.

Ambulance Facilities.

- (a) Infectious Diseases.—Dronfield, Langwith, Mastin Moor, Morton, Penmore and Spital Hospitals have motor ambulances.
- (b) Non-Infectious Diseases.— Motor ambulances are maintained by G. Rimmington, Staveley, and Bolsover Urban District Council.

Clinic and Treatment Centres.

County Clinic, Brimington, Chesterfield.— Tuberculosis School Clinics for minor ailments, and a Dental Clinic are carried on in this building. Infant Welfare and Pre-Natal Clinics are held at Barrow Hill and Staveley.

The County Council provide treatment for venereal disease at the Royal Hospital, Chesterfield.

Dairies and Cowsheds.

During the year some complaints have been received as to the keeping quality of the milk. These were investigated at the producers' premises and advice given as to the keeping clean of utensils and the cooling and storage of milk.

34 persons are registered as Producer Retailers, and 13 persons registered as retailers of milk, only 9 of these have their premises outside the Council area.

47 inspections have been made during the year and defects were found, 5 cases were abated satisfactorily.

Meat Inspection.

There are three registered Slaughterhouses in the area, but these are not being used owing to the meat being supplied by the Ministry of Food, through the Chesterfield abattoir.

Factories and Workshops.

27 visits have been made during the year and Notices have been sent to the Staveley Coal & Iron Company Ltd., for improvement of the existing sanitary arrangements. The necessary alterations have been put in hard.

Bakehouses.

10 visits have been made and all were found to be satisfactory.

Infectious Diseases.

Enquiries in all cases were made and defects and nuisances noted.

During the year 48 visits have been made and 18 rooms fumigated.

Shops.

105 visits have been made during the year, and no cases of breach of regulations were found and no action was found necessary.

Smoke Observations at Colliery Tips.

No observations have been taken during the year, as the works are mostly steel and iron works. Visits have been made to burning colliery tips. The district has suffered from atmospheric impurities from these tips.

Bed Bugs.

Few complaints have been received, but tenants in 2 Council houses and 1 private house were fumigated during the year with Thermatox Fumigators, and were satisfactory on re-visits.

Closet Accommodation.

5 conversions from earth closets to W.C's. have been carried out during the year. New W.C's have been erected.

Tents, Vans and Sheds.

There are 5 Vans in the area, these are in a satisfactory condition and no complaints have been received.

Rats and Mice Destruction Act.

During the year, six complaints were received, and visits were made. Squils and Liverpool Virus were laid.

During the year local rat catchers have regularly visited the Council refuse tips and farm buildings in the area.

The number of rats caught and reported was 540.
