The whole of the District possesses Ambulance facilities.

The St. John Ambulance Association (Great Ayton Division) serves the greater part of the District, and the Council now makes an annual contribution to the funds of the Division.

An agreement is made with the Stockton Corporation whereby the Parish of Yarm has the use of the Corporation Ambulance for purposes other than the removal of infectious disease cases.

Cases of infectious disease occurring in the District are removed by the ambulance of the Middlesbrough Corporation to the Corporation Isolation Hospital, Middlesbrough.

(c) NURSING IN THE HOME:

In all Parishes the District Nurse also undertakes midwifery.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

1. (1) WATER:

The Council's Water Schemes, which now supply 19 parishes (as detailed later in this Section), have operated satisfactorily during the year.

Attention has been paid to action on lead, but it has not been found necessary to instal any form of treatment.

Chlorination:- All water is chlorinated. A Wallace and Tiernan Constant Flow Hypochlorinator is connected to the mains on both the Turkey Nab and Scugdale systems below the reservoir and above all connections.

These machines have been maintained and have operated satisfactorily during the year.

A comprehensive water scheme has been prepared to augment and improve the supplies. The scheme is to bring in water from additional springs at Clogger Hall, Ingleby Greenhow, Merebeck, Faceby, Holiday House and Wether Hill, Scugdale; extend and loop in certain mains; build an R.C. Water Tower at Hutton Rudby to balance pressures.

Tenders for the first stages of this scheme have been invited and it is hoped that the contracts will be let and work commenced in the early months of next year.

Attention has been paid to action on lead, but it has not been found necessary to install any form of treatment.

Chlorination: All water is chlorinated. A Wallace and Tiernan Constant Flow Hypochlorinator is connected to the mains on both the Turkey Hill and Boscawen systems below the reservoir and above all connections.

These machines have been maintained and have operated satisfactorily during the year.

A comprehensive water scheme has been prepared to augment and improve the supplies. The scheme is to bring in water from additional springs at Clogger Hill, Ingleby Greenhow, Harbeck, Passy, Holiday House and Wether Hill, Boscawen; extend and top in certain mains; build an N.C. Water Tower at Milton Ruddy to balance pressures.

Tenders for the first stages of this scheme have been invited and it is hoped that the contracts will be let and work commenced in the early months of next year.
