

#### Infantile Deaths.

Total Deaths of Infants under one year, 24 (Males 17, Females 7). Infantile Death Rate per 1000 births: 76.89.

The Infantile Death Rate for the past five years was 71.42
Infantile Death Rate, England and Wales, 69 per 1000 births.
The causes of deaths were as follows:—

Broncho-Pneumonia, 6; Bronchitis, 3; Injury at Birth, 3; Congenital Heart Disease, 2; Influenza 2; Debility, 2; Convulsions, 2; and one each from the following causes: Premature Birth, Measles, Acute Appendicitis, and Tuberculous Meningitis.

The Infantile Death Rate shows a slight increase over the preceding year, being 62.29 in 1926. This increase is mainly due to deaths from Broncho-Pneumonia and Bronchitis, which occurred during the Influenza Epidemic in the first quarter of the year.

# Zymotic Diseases.

There were 28 Deaths. Influenza 23, Diarrhoea 1, Measles 3, Diphtheria 1.

The Zymotic Death Rate is 1.49.

The deaths from Measles were children aged between 9 and 20 months. Two occurred in November and one in December.

The Diphtheria case occurred in January. The death from Diarrhoea was a male 71 years of age, and occurred in December. There were no deaths from Diarrhoea in children under two years of age.

There was a considerable increase in the deaths from Zymotic Diseases, 28 being registered as against 11 in 1926, giving a Death Rate of 1.49 as against .58. This increase was due to the prevalence of Influenza during February and March. 23 deaths were due to this cause as against 4 in 1926.

# GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Hospitals Provided or Subsidised by the Local Authority or by the County Council.

Tuberculosis ... Hayley Green and Knightwick, both situated outside the Borough and under the control of the County Council.

Maternity ... None. Children ... None.

Fever ... Stourbridge and Halesowen Infectious Diseases Hospital, Hayley Green, Pedmore, near Stourbridge.

Smallpox ... Ditto.

Other ... Corbett Hospital, Amblecote, Staffs., supported by this and surrounding districts. Birmingham Queen's, General and Children's Hospitals, and Dudley (Guest) Hospital are easily accessible.

Sanatorium treatment of Tuberculosis is under the control of the County Council.

The Infectious Diseases Hospital at Hayley Green, as well as a Smallpox Hospital, are provided by the Local Authorities of the Borough of Stourbridge, Urban District Council of Lye and Wollescote, and the Urban District Council of Halesowen.

The Smallpox Hospital is kept in readiness for any case which might occur. Arrangements have been made with the South Staffordshire Joint Smallpox Hospital Board for use of ambulance for removal of patients. (Telephone Sedgley 32).

There is no Institutional Provision for unmarried mothers in the district.

The Corbett General Hospital is situated in the Urban District of Amblecote and is supported by this and the adjoining districts. In March 1928, the number of beds was increased from 32 to 40 by the opening of a new ward for female patients.

## Ambulance Facilities:-

- (a) For Infectious Cases a motor ambulance is provided by the Joint Infectious Diseases Hospital.
- (b) For Non-Infectious Cases. A Motor Ambulance, which is kept at the Fire Station, and a Motor Ambulance provided by the British Red Cross and kept at Mr. Weaver's Garage, High Street.

### Clinics and Treatment Centres.

The Maternity and Infant Welfare Centre at No. 40, New Road, is under the control of a Voluntary Committee and a contribution is made by the Town Council to the funds of this Committee. The Town Council own the premises occupied by the Centre.

The Centre is open on Tuesday and Wednesday in each week from 2 till 5 p.m., and every morning from 9 till 10.

Dr. Lloyd Francis attends at the Centre weekly on Tuesday afternoons.

Ladies of the Committee assist at the Welfare Centre in helping to weigh the babies and giving tea to the mothers.

Milk and other foods are given in necessitous cases or supplied at a low cost.

Dental and Orthopaedic Clinics, under the auspices of the Worcestershire County Council, are also held at the Centre. Mr. Naughton Dunn, of Birmingham, attends the Orthopaedic Clinic once every month.

An Ante-natal Clinic was opened in October and is held twice a month. Since its inception it has been well attended and has proved a success.

The Ante-Natal Clinic was opened at the Centre on October 21st, 1927, by Dr. Emily Paterson, Assistant County Medical Officer.

Previous to opening the Clinic, a meeting of local Midwives was held at the Centre, and addresses given by Dr. Paterson and Dr. Geoffrey Dudley.

The Clinic is open, with the Doctor in attendance on the third Friday in each month, and the alternate fortnight with Nurse in attendance.

The number of expectant mothers attending the Clinic at the end of December, was 21.

#### The Public Health Staff.

The Staff consists of a part-time Medical Officer of Health a whole-time Sanitary Inspector, and an Additional Sanitary Inspector. One half of the salaries of these Officers is contributed by Exchequer grants.

The Sanitary Inspector has the certificates of the Royal Sanitary Institute as Sanitary Inspector and Inspector of Meat and other Foods. The Sanitary Inspector also acts as Inspector under the Petroleum Acts and Shops Acts. One Additional Sanitary Inspector resigned on 10th of September and another was appointed who commenced duties on 10th October.

There is also a lady Clerk.

# Professional Nursing in the Home.

The Stourbridge District Nursing Association, which is a voluntary organisation, employs three Nurses, whose services are available for residents, in the whole of the Borough and of Pedmore (in Bromsgrove Rural).

There is no provision for professional nursing of cases of Infectious Diseases treated at home.

#### Midwives.

The Midwives Act is administered by the County Council. At the end of the year there were five Midwives practising in the district.

### Rivers and Streams.

On 2nd June, 1926, a Meeting of representatives of Local Authorities in this locality was held at Stourbridge, and was called by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries for the purpose of considering a report made on the pollution of the River Stour.

# Prevalence of, and Control over, Infectious Diseases.

Diphtheria anti-toxin is supplied free of charge to the Medical Practitioners for the use of patients resident in the Borough.

# Infectious Diseases Generally.

Chickenpox was again prevalent especially in the early part of the year; there were, however, only 64 cases reported against 131 in 1926. There were 5 cases of Diphtheria against 11 in 1926. One patient died. There was a slight increase in Scarlet Fever, the number of cases reported being 21 against 17 in 1926. One case of Enteric Fever occurred, the patient having contracted the disease outside the Borough. There was a considerable increase in the number of Pneumonia cases, viz., 66 against 40 in 1926; 4 cases of Puerperal Pyrexia and 3 of Puerperal Fever, were notified, against one and five respectively in 1926. One patient died from Puerperal Pyrexia. Influenza was very prevalent at the beginning of the year. Measles assumed an epidemic form at the end of the year; as usual, young children were mainly affected. In consequence the Infants Departments of two schools were closed.

# Puerperal Fever and Pyrexia.

New Regulations for notification of these conditions came into force on 1st October 1926. Notification has now to be carried out for both of these conditions. Puerperal Pyrexia means any febrile condition (other than Puerperal Fever) occurring in a woman within 21 days after childbirth or miscarriage in which a temperature of 100.4° F. (38°C.) or more has been sustained during a period of 24 hours or has recurred during that period.

In addition to notification, adequate facilities for examination and treatment of patients suffering from these conditions is provided by the County Council. Patients requiring Hospital treatment are treated at the Women's Hospital, Sparkhill, Birmingham.

These regulations have been introduced with the hope that the mortality among women following childbirth will be reduced.

#### OTHER DISEASES.

#### Influenza.

During the first quarter of the year, Influenza was very prevalent in the Borough, people of all ages were attacked, in many cases whole families being ill at the same time. Children seemed particularly susceptible. All the Elementary Schools in the Borough were closed at some time during the epidemic. Twenty-three deaths occured from the disease. A considerable number of cases of Influenzal Pneumonia were notified. Although the epidemic was very considerable in extent, the disease itself was not so severe as in some former epidemics, for instance as in 1918.

One patient was at Rhyl when she developed Scarlet Fever. She was notified at Rhyl and was brought home in a closed motor car. Her brother developed the disease after they arrived home. The girl is not included in the above list.

One case of Diphtheria occurred at Old Swinford Hospital, the remaining four occurred in four different houses, one being at a house from where a patient suffering from Scarlet Fever had been removed to Hospital two months previously.

The 21 cases of Scarlet Fever occurred in 16 houses, four of them being in a house with three bedrooms and six occupiers, two cases in each of two houses with two bedrooms and five and six occupiers respectively. The remaining occurred as follows:—In houses with three bed; rooms and three occupiers, 3 cases; 4—1 case; 6—1 case; 7—1 case, 10—1 case, this being a Council House. In houses with two bedroomsthree occupiers, 2 cases; 4—1 case; 5—2 cases; 6—2 cases. One occurred in a house with four bedrooms and four occupiers, the remaining one being a house with 13 bedrooms and 17 occupiers.

For the Year 1927.

To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Members of the Stourbridge Town Council.

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you a Report of the work done in my Department during the year 1927, being my Twenty-seventh Annual Report. The additional Sanitary Inspector (Mr. G. E. Curtis) left on the 10th September, and was succeeded by Mr. W. S. Makin, who commenced duties on 10th October.

## Complaints.

126 Complaints were received relating to various insanitary conditions as compared with 124 in the previous year.

# Inspection of District.

The number of inspections and re-inspections made during the year was 4459. These were as follows:—General inspection of houses and premises, 786; Inspection under the Housing (Inspection of District) Regulations, 52; Infectious Diseases, 32; Tuberculosis Cases 24; re-inspection and re-visits, 1672; Slaughter-houses, 1540; Dairies and Cowsheds, 135; Workshops, 36; Vans, 32; Bakehouses, 34; Premises where Offensive Trades carried on, 33; Food Stores, 50; Houses Let in Lodgings, 1; Common Lodging Houses, 20; Rag Dealers, 12.

In making these inspections, 1468 sanitary defects, nuisances or contraventions of your Bye-laws were found. There were 2154 defects not remedied at the end of 1926, these, together with 1468 defects met during the year 1927, make a total of 3622 insanitary conditions. 1139 defects were remedied during the year, thus leaving 2483 insanitary conditions unabated.

#### Notices.

243 Preliminary intimation Notices were sent during the year, most of them being in the form of a letter. They were as follows:—General Defects of houses, 48 Notices relating to 87 houses. Insufficient and Defective Sanitary Conveniences, 10 Notices, 19 houses. Defective Rain-water Spouting and Cisterns, 11 Notices, 17 houses. Drain Defects, 5 Notices, 9 houses. Obstructed Drains, 17 Notices, 61 houses. Defective

Ashpits and Ashbins, 15 Notices, 51 houses. Cleansing Rooms after Tuberculosis, I Notice. Also the following Notices:—Petroleum Acts, 48; Accumulations and deposits, 8; Public Health (Meat) Regulations, 16; Outworkers Lists, 3; Workshops and Factories, I; Milk and Dairies Order, 2I; Miscellaneous, 4; Reminders of Expirations of Slaughterhouse Licences, 25; Pigkeeping, 5; Dirty House, I; Vans, 2; Tripe Boiler, I; Shops Acts, I.

In addition to the above, 9 matters were referred to the Borough Surveyor and 3 cases of waste of water reported to the Engineer of the Water Board.

220 Preliminary Notices had been complied with at the end of the year, work in connection with 12 was in progress at the end of the year. Nothing has been done in respect of 11 notices.

#### Prosecutions.

Legal proceedings were taken against the owner of No. 2, New Street, for not complying with a Notice requiring the abatement of a Nuisance. The case was taken before the Magistrates and, after several adjournments, was withdrawn on payment of costs, when the work had been completed.

No other case was taken, but in May you decided to take legal proceedings against the Occupier of a house for refusing to permit the Owner to carry out work necessary to comply with a Notice served upon him. The Occupier, when informed of this decision, permitted the Owner to enter the premises and do the work. A summons was not issued.

In May, I gave evidence at the Police Court on the condition of a house occupied by the plaintiff in the case, who was endeavouring to secure possession of a house which he owned.

# Offensive Trades.

Two new businesses were commenced during the year, one as a Fish Fryer, the other a Tripe Boiler.

In March 1924, you gave permission for a fish-frying business to be commenced, at No. 26, Union Street, on the understanding that the frying would be done in a disused bakehouse. The business changed ownership during the year, and the new Owner, in July, applied for permission to transfer the frying apparatus into the shop. Your Sanitary Committee did not accede to this request.

Applications to establish Fish Frying businesses in Pedmore Road, Grange Road, and High Street, Stourbridge, were not granted.

The trades carried on in the district are: Fish Frying, II; Tripe Boiling, 7; Hide and Skin Dealer and Leather Dresser, one each.

#### Bakehouses.

There are 17 Bakehouses, four being Factories. One notice was received from H.M. Inspector of Factories relating to limewashing. This was attended to.

# Housing (Inspection of District) Regulations.

Number of Houses inspected, 52.

Two Notices, under Section 3 of the Housing Act, 1925, were served, and the Owner gave notice of closing in respect of one. This Notice being received in 1928. Instructions were given to serve similar Notices in respect of six other houses, but these were not served as the work was commenced at three of the houses, and the Owner of the other three asked me to get out a plan and specification with a view of having extensive alterations done.

Nos. 1, 3 and 5, Heath Street, were converted into two houses and the Closing Orders rescinded.

In December, instructions were given to me to proceed with the demolition of Nos. 1 and 2, Unwin Passage. At the end of the year negotiations were in progress for the sale of these houses, the prospective purchaser intending to convert them into one house, and put the premises in a thorough state of repair.

Four houses were demolished, viz.:—An old house next No. 23, Pedmore Road, and three in New Road.

An application for rescission of the Closing Orders made in respect of Nos. 62, 64 and 66, Birmingham Street, was adjourned until certain alterations and repairs had been done. In May 1920, an Inquiry was held in respect of an Appeal against Closing Orders made by the Town Council relating to Nos. 13, 15 and 17, and Nos. 1 and 2, at rear of Nos. 13 and 15, Green Street. In May 1921, the Ministry of Health sent to the Owner an abridged Specification of necessary repairs. On 11th November, 1924, the Ministry was informed that the work had been completed, and were reminded of an undertaking given by the Owner to the effect that upon any one of the back-to-back houses becoming vacant it should be converted into a through house with the house at front or rear as the case may be. Up to the present none of the houses has become vacant.

Further progress has been made in the provision of Sculleries and W.C.'s, to houses in place of jointly used Wash-houses and W.C.'s. Nine were erected during the year, and one washhouse was converted into two, one side being furnished with a W.C. The work in connection with four others was in progress at the end of the year.

# Slaughterhouses.

One new Licence for the joint use of premises as a Slaughterhouse was issued during the year. There are 13 Slaughterhouses, all of which are annually licensed, four being subject to undertakings not to claim for compensation should the renewal of the licences be refused in the event of a Public Abattoir being provided.

1,540 Visits to Slaughterhouses were made during the year, against 1,069 visits in 1926.

Two butchers give three months' notice of slaughtering on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in each week, all the others give the necessary notice as required by the Meat Regulations. There have been no flagrant cases of neglect or evasion.

Notices of Slaughter in respect of 804 Oxen, 1472 Pigs, 3,435 Sheep and 119 Calves, were received. The following were inspected:—733 oxen, 1,463 pigs, 2,454 sheep and 105 calves. 20 of the Pigs were slaughtered on private premises.

The percentage of inspections being: Oxen 91, Pigs 99, Sheep 71, and Calves 88, or a total of 87.

Meat and other Foods seized or surrendered and destroyed:-

The entire carcase including offals of a heifer, (affected with Tuberculosis and Hydraemia) was seized and condemned by a Magistrate and destroyed. The meat surrendered was as follows:-

Tuberculosis. I ox (whole), and 5 whole pigs (and offals in each case); 37 pigs' heads; 15 ox heads; 11 ox lungs; 1 ox liver; 1 ox offal; I pig's fry; 3 pigs' mesenteries.

Distomum Hepaticum. 5 ox livers; 6 sheep livers.

Cirrhosis. 13 whole ox livers and 4 halves.

Abscess. 5 ox livers; 2 sheep livers; 1 set of ox lungs.

Pneumonia. I pig; 3 sets pigs' lungs.

Echinococcus. 4 sets ox lungs; 2 ox livers. Cyst. Tenuicollis. 2 sheep livers.

Swine Fever. 4 pigs.

Urticaria. I pig.

Angiomatosis. 5 ox livers.

Bacterial Necrosis. 4 ox livers. Swine Erysipelas. 6 whole pigs.

Extensive Inflammation. I pig.

Bruising. I whole sheep; 12 lbs. pork; fore shin of ox.

Congestion (Sturdy). I sheep's head and pluck.

Congestion. I pig's lungs.

The total weight being, approximately, 32 cwts. compared with 21½ cwts. in 1926, and 7½ cwts. in 1925.

The condemned meat, etc., was buried at the Refuse Tip.

#### Dairies and Cowsheds.

At the end of 1927 there were 50 registered retailers of Milk in the Borough, one being a Wholesale and Retail Dealer, and 30 being Retailers of bottled sterilized milk only. Ten retailers are also cowkeepers. One cowkeeper sells by wholesale. In addition to these there are 17 retailers and 2 wholesalers who reside outside the Borough, but are registered here. The two wholesale dealers sell bottled sterilized milk only.

There were 80 milking cows in the Borough at the end of the year.

I made thirteen dirt tests of milk during the year. In each case where the milk showed excessive dirt, I warned the cowkeeper; it was afterwards found that the cows were kept cleaner.

The following samples of milk were submitted to the County Analyst:

2 For Bacteriological Analyses and Bacterial Counts.

I For Bacteriological Analysis and under Food and Drugs Acts.

I Under Food and Drugs Acts.

I For Bacterial Count.

Those subjected to Bacteriological Analyses proved to be free from Tubercule. The two for Bacterial Counts showed Coli-form Bacilli present in 1/100 c.c. In one of these cases the retailer was informed and he took the matter up with his supplier. In the other case I reported to the Sanitary Inspector of the District where the milk was produced.

The other samples proved to be up to the food standard.

The following matters were dealt with at various cowsheds:—3 cases of accumulations of manure; I pig-keeping near cowshed; 2 dirty floors; 3 dirty cows flanks; 2 defective lighting; I insufficient ventilation.

At one dairy a large shed was erected for the milk cooling apparatus.

In January, one firm was licensed to bottle Grade A, Tuberculin Tested Milk. One cowkeeper made all arrangements to commence business on 1st January, 1928, as a Producer of Certified Milk.

In September I attended a "Clean Milk" Course arranged by the Worcestershire County Council in conjunction with Bristol University.

## Disinfection.

56 Houses and approximately 450 articles of bedding and clothing were disinfected. The rooms at three houses, which had been occupied by patients who had suffered from Tuberculosis, were stripped of wall paper, sprayed and thoroughly disinfected.

# Houses Let in Lodgings.

In September 1926, I reported to your Sanitary Committee on a number of houses let in lodgings in the Borough to which your present Byelaws did not apply, and suggested the adoption of Byelaws under Sec. 6 of the Housing Act, 1925. During the year a meeting was held to consider this matter, but at the end of the year nothing further had been done.

#### Smoke Nuisances.

Several observations of emission of black smoke were made, but no case was reported to your Sanitary Committee.

#### Waterclosets.

Twelve additional W.C.'s were provided. Twenty-four slop W.C.'s were converted into fresh water flushing W.C.'s.

The following are the numbers of conversions, additions and alterations since 1901.

Ten houses have use of privies, these being situated in localities not sewered. Two have earth closets. Most houses have separate sanitary conveniences, but there are still many cases where the conveniences are used in common for several houses. There were 450 slop W.C.'s in use at the end of the year.

788 Houses had joint use of 445 W.C.'s. 305 Houses had use of slop W.C.'s only.

103 Houses had joint use of 60 slop W.C.'s.

292 Houses had I slop W.C. per house, and 79 houses each had a slop W.C. and fresh water W.C.
