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SECTION "B"

General Provision of Health Services for the Area.

Laboratory Services. Laboratory facilities are provided at the County Laboratory in Worcester.

Ambulance Services. Ambulance facilities are provided by the Council's Ambulance, lent by the British Red Cross Society, and a rota of volunteer drivers and attendants.

During the year, 171 calls were dealt with.

Hospitals. The Lucy Baldwin Maternity Hospital provides the district with maternity beds, 12 beds in the general wards and 6 private wards beds are available.

Beds for Infectious Diseases are provided at the Hayley Green Isolation Hospital, Halesowen. 4 cases of Infectious Disease from the Stourport Urban District were admitted during the year.

Cases of Tuberculosis requiring treatment are admitted to Knightwick Sanatorium.

Cases of Venereal Disease can be treated at the following Hospitals:

General Hospital, Steelhouse Lane, Birmingham.

Kidderminster and District General Hospital.

- Nursing in the Home. This Service is provided by the Stourport and Wilden District Nursing Association, which employs three Nurses and the Astley and Areley Kings District Nursing Association, which employs one Nurse, all of whom are midwives. In addition to their duties as district nurse midwives, their duties as Health Visitors under the County Council include attendance at School Medical inspections and the treatment of minor ailments in the schools, visits to cases of tuberculosis and mental defectives, regular visits to infants and children under five in their homes and attendance at ante-natal clinics and Infant Welfare Centres.
- Clinics. Stourport—The County Council's Ante-Natal Clinic is held every Tuesday afternoon at the Lucy Baldwin Maternity Home, in charge of Dr.MacArthur and Dr. Mackie.

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held on the first and third Friday in each month at the Lucy Baldwin Home. Children under five are immunised against diphtheria at this Clinic.

Areley Kings—The County Council's Infant Welfare Centre, in charge of Dr. E. M. Winter, is held in the Parish Hall, Areley Kings, on the second and fourth Thursday afternoons in the month.

SECTION "C"

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The majority of dwelling houses in the area are supplied with water from the Council's mains. The source of this supply is situated at Mount Pleasant, Bewdley. Samples were taken frequently for analysis during the year and gave satisfactory results.

A small number of dwelling houses in Wilden and the Titton area derive their water supply from shallow wells.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The disposal of sewage was satisfactorily dealt with at the Sewage Works throughout the year.

A number of pail closets in Wilden and Areley Kings were converted to the water carriage system during the year.

Smoke Abatement.

During the year much attention was given to the problem of atmospheric pollution, particularly in view of the fact that a large extension to the Stourport Electric Power Station was being built.

The nuisance of grit in the vicinity of the Power Station had been complained of on many occasions, and it was thought that sulphur fumes also might be emitted from the Power Station or factory chimneys in sufficient concentration to have a damaging effect on surrounding vegetation.

Several large authorities, who were thought to have similar problems, were consulted, and finally the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research was asked by the Council if it would carry out measurements of atmospheric pollution in the district similar to those being made in other areas. The Department of Scientific and Industrial Research was unable to extend these measurements to the Stourport area, but Dr. A. R. Meetham, Superintendent of Observations at the Department, gave much helpful advice about certain measurements of atmospheric pollution which could be taken in the district by the Health Department. It was decided that these tests and measurements should be taken regularly, and it is hoped that valuable information will thus be made available and that more effective control of atmospheric pollution will be possible in the future.

Housing.

The Council's programme for the erection of new houses was proceeded with during the year.

Building was in progress throughout the year on the Walshes Farm Estate, though no permanent houses were completed by the end of the year.

During the year, twenty temporary prefabricated houses of the Tarran type were erected and occupied on the Council's site in Martley Road, and the preparation of a site in Wilden for the erection of 66 permanent prefabricated houses of the "Orlit" type was proceeded with.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1946.

THE COUNCIL HOUSE, STOURPORT-ON-SEVERN.

To the Chairman and Members of the Stourport-on-Severn Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Annual Report of certain work carried out during the year ended 31st December, 1946.

Inspections and Notices.

During the year, 670 visits of inspection and re-inspection were paid to houses and other premises under the various Acts, Byelaws and Regulations, in connection with housing, abatement of nuisances, infectious diseases, etc. It was not found necessary to resort to legal proceedings, but great difficulty was again experienced in getting work done owing to the very great shortage of labour and materials.

Infectious Diseases and Disinfection.

Details of the various notifiable diseases are given in the report of the Medical Officer of Health. As in previous year's inspections, the supply of disinfectant has been continued and no special matter arose in connection with this matter.

Refuse Scavenging.

This work has been again carried out by the Council's workmen and the details of the work is as follows:

The refuse has been disposed of by tipping. and special attention has been given to the destruction of rats and flies there from time to time as the necessity arose.

Common Lodging Houses.

There are no common lodging houses in the District. Offensive Trades.

No offensive trades were established during the year.

Canal Boats.

All the boats inspected were found to be satisfactory and there were no infringements of the regulations. No infectious diseases were notified, neither was any case of illness met with amongst the occupants. There were no applications for registration received during the year and no other matter arose to which it was necessary to draw the Council's attention.

Drainage and Closet Conversion.

The work was again proceeded with and further improvements in the sanitary conditions in the Areley Kings and Wilden areas were the result. The number of houses drained to cesspools, and the number of pail closets and privy middens are being steadily reduced.

Water Supply.

The consumption of water for all purposes as recorded by the meters at Mount Pleasant during the year was 182,871,000 gallons. This was a decrease of 329,000 gallons as compared with the previous year.

A further 19 houses and other premises were connected to the mains. The supply continued to be of excellent quality and no shortage was experienced neither was it necessary to impose any restrictions.
