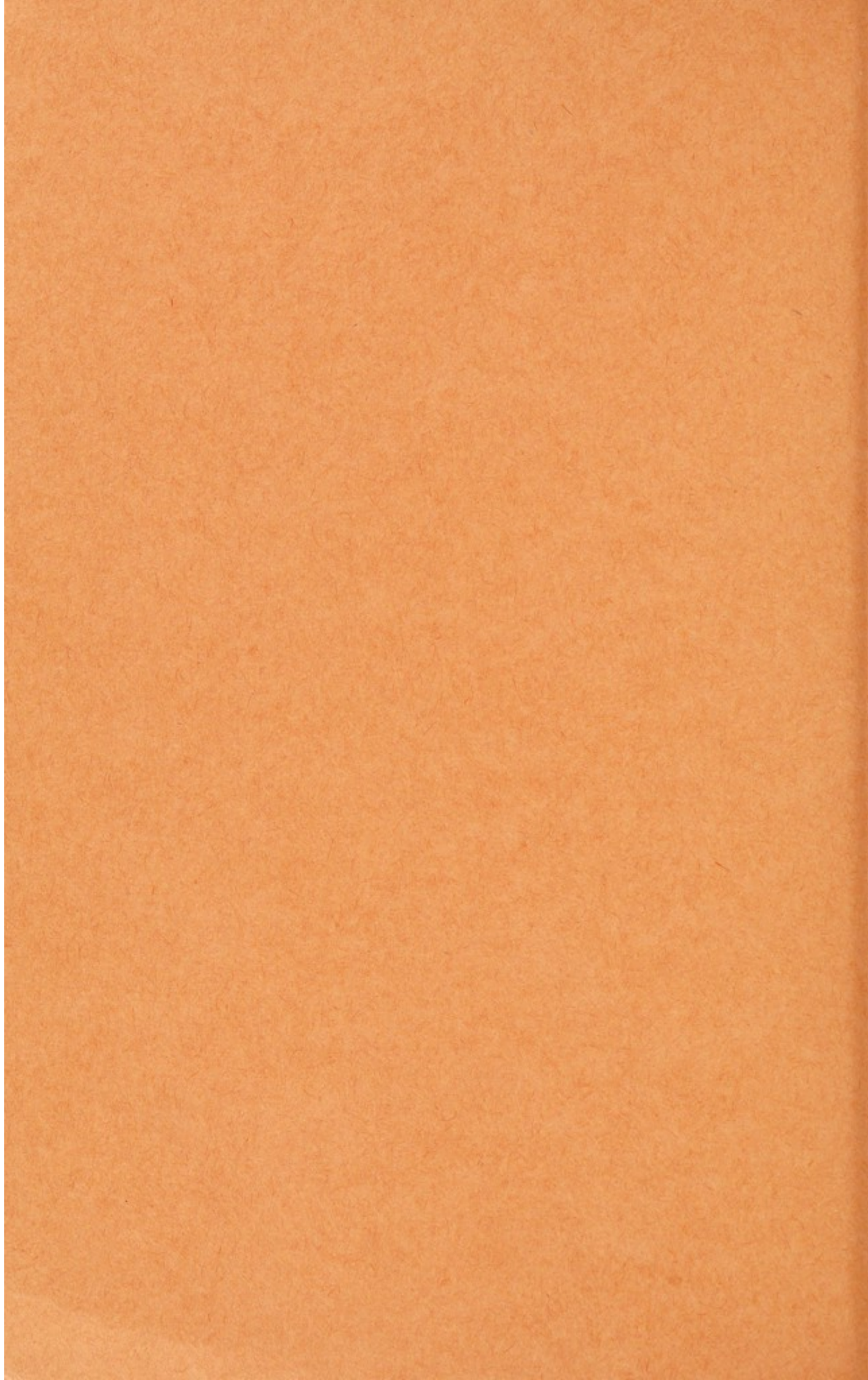

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1965

To the Chairman and Members of the Stourport-on-Severn Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Gazard and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the Urban District for the year 1965.

Main Occupation of the Area

The principal industries of the area comprise the manufacture of carpets, ceramic insulators, chains for many purposes, wire cables, fans, timber products and electrical transformers. There is also a vinegar works and a factory producing concrete slabs of all kinds.

In addition there are:—

- (a) Three large Oil Companies engaged in the storage and distribution of petrol and oil.
- (b) One Company engaged in the bulk storage and distribution of imported timber.

All timber and some petrol and oil arrives by boat from Avonmouth, Stourport-on-Severn being the head of the portion of the River Severn which is navigable by commercial traffic. The quantity of petrol transported by river has decreased over the years because there has been a steady increase of petrol delivered by pipeline, this now being the main avenue of supply.

There is also in the district one of the largest Power Stations in the Midlands.

SECTION " B "

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Laboratory Services

Producer samples of milk and samples of piped water supplies are examined by the County Laboratory, Worcester, together with food for chemical analysis. The major part of the bacteriological and pathological work is carried out by the Public Health Laboratory Service, Worcester Royal Infirmary.

Ambulance Service

This service is administered by the County Council as Local Health Authority, and there is a system of wireless control with the headquarters in the County Medical Officer's Department at Worcester. The Kidderminster Ambulance Station has been augmented and now provides a fully manned 24 hour service. An ambulance for infectious cases is stationed at Hayley Green Isolation Hospital (under the control of the Regional Hospital Board).

Hospitals

All Hospitals are administered by the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board through their Management Committee. The Kidderminster General Hospital received the majority of hospital patients from this district. The Lucy Baldwin Hospital provides the district and surrounding area with maternity beds.

Infectious Diseases

Beds for infectious diseases are provided at Hayley Green Isolation Hospital, Halesowen, and at Newtown Isolation Hospital, Worcester. There were 4 cases admitted from Stourport-on-Severn during the year.

Tuberculosis

Out patients treatment is provided at the Kidderminster Hospital Dispensary, where Dr. Cronin attends, Wednesday mornings, Thursday and Friday afternoons. Inpatients treatment is arranged at Newtown, Worcester. Prevention and after-care remain the responsibility of the Local Health Authority and the service is administered locally by the After-care Sub-Committee.

Mass Radiography Unit

The mobile unit visited the district for a period of 5 days during May, it being situated at 6 different sites during its stay. The following is a list of attendances at the various sitings:—

Worcester Royal Infirmary
Dudley Guest Hospital
Royal Hospital, Wolverhampton.

Nursing in the Home

The Service is administered by the Local Authority.

There are:

1. Three nurses who deal principally with the Midwifery and General Nursing. A car is provided.
2. Three whole-time Health Visitors and School Nurses who attend school medical inspections, treat minor ailments at the school clinic and visit cases of mental defect. They visit infants and children in the home and are responsible for their welfare from fourteen days until they attend school at five years old, when they continue to supervise under the school scheme. They act as general health advisors to the family in conjunction with the doctors, and give help wherever practicable, particularly with the ageing members of the family. They attend Infant Welfare Clinics in their area, Mothercraft and relaxation classes for expectant mothers and a class for young fathers. For this purpose the Urban District is divided into three areas, one nurse being responsible for the Town Centre, Lower, Heath, and surrounding district, Areley Kings, Astley and part of the

Walshes Estate; another nurse for Wilden and the remainder of the Walshes Estate, whilst the third nurse covers Burlish Park Estate and Newtown.

3. Another Health Visitor also visits cases of Tuberculosis.

Clinics

(a) ANTE-NATAL CLINICS

Ante-Natal Clinics are held every Tuesday and Thursday afternoons at the Lucy Baldwin Maternity Hospital in the charge of Doctors MacArthur, C. Mackie, D. K. Black, Dr. Tibbetts and W. T. Mackie and Matron respectively. A clinic is also held by the district midwives on the second and fourth Monday in each month.

(b) INFANT WELFARE CLINICS

(i) Lucy Baldwin, a weekly clinic with doctor in attendance first and third Friday of each month.

(ii) Wilden, held third Wednesday in month.

(iii) Areley Kings, held in Parish Hall, Areley Kings, on second and fourth Thursday afternoons. (In charge of Dr. J. W. Bywater.)

Children under five are immunised at these clinics and vaccination is carried out as required.

Separate sessions for Poliomyelitis immunisation (oral) are held at the Mitton Street School Clinic, by appointment, for all those age groups who are eligible.

SECTION " C "

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply

The majority of the dwellings in the area are supplied with water from the North West Worcestershire Water Board. The source of the supply is deep bores in the Bewdley Corporation's area and the storage reservoirs are situated at Mount Pleasant.

33 Bacteriological samples were taken from the Town Supply and all proved the water to be satisfactory.

Sewerage and Drainage

Disposal of sewerage at the Oldington Disposal Works used jointly with the Borough of Kidderminster and Bewdley has continued reasonably satisfactorily, but the works are seriously overloaded.

In view of the delay in the extension to these works which is now under discussion a planning embargo has been placed on schemes of private estate development (not already approved) until April, 1966.

SECTION " D "

There is one small estate of 20 bungalows and two 2 bedroom houses in course of development by the Council. These premises are prefabricated factory built design. At the end of the year 8 bungalows had been erected and occupied. Houses built by private enterprise totalled 145.

During the year the Council purchased a small compact private estate of 111 houses built in the late 1920's. The majority of these houses are of the 3 Bedroom type and will prove to be a useful increase in the number of Council owned houses.

Steady progress was made in dealing with unfit properties. 8 Demolition Orders were made and 2 closing orders.

Number of families rehoused from condemned properties was 3.

BURLISH PARK ESTATE (Private Development)

A further 86 houses have been completed and occupied during the year.

Caravan Sites

WALSHEs FARM SITE (Council owned and controlled)

This site has accommodation for 123 caravans in addition to approximately 123 tenting sites for use during the summer holiday periods.

The First Aid Centre provides a most useful facility at this site but owing to staffing difficulty it was open only during the hours of 9.30—12.30 and 3.30—6.30 daily.

Due to the change in character of the site with holidays being spread over a longer season fewer cases had to be dealt with and no patients had to be referred for further medical attention.

The First Aid Post on the river side continued to be manned satisfactorily during the peak times of the holiday periods.

HAYWOODS MEADOW

This site has approximately 120 caravans, bungalows and similar structures.

Two large cesspools have now been constructed to take drainage from the two existing toilet blocks. Consequently, sanitary accommodation in both these toilet blocks has now been converted to proper flushing toilets.

SECTION " E "

SAMPLES OF FOODS AND DRUGS TAKEN FOR ANALYSIS

Adulteration of Food

Mr. Spencer, Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, Worcestershire County Council has now retired and Mr. Owen has been appointed as his successor and reports as follows:—

During the year 1965, a total of 65 samples of foods and drugs were taken in Stourport-on-Severn Urban District, consisting of 22 milks and 43 foods. This represents a rate of sampling of 5.1 per 1,000 of population based on the 1963 estimate.

All the food samples were satisfactory chemically; there was one minor labelling error. One sample of milk contained about 6% extraneous water, but several repeat samples were genuine. The processing dairy company was warned and all incoming supplies were sampled and found satisfactory.

Sampling at Other than Retail Level

Processing dairies in Kidderminster and Bewdley supplying bottled milk through retail channels in Stourport were visited to sample incoming supplies from producers. 552 samples were taken including 78 from Channel Islands herds. 25 of these samples were low in fat but in the majority of cases the composite fat content of the whole of the consignments containing the low fat samples was satisfactory and in no case was the deficiency thought to be due to abstraction of fat.

One producer of Channel Islands milk was prosecuted for consigning milk containing added water. Over the course of three days, 8 churns were adulterated by amounts ranging from 3.7% to 6.7%. He was convicted and fined £45 with costs of £13. 16s. 0d.

One sample consigned by a producer having a refrigerated farm tank contained 0.3% extraneous water, but further samples from the same producer were satisfactory.

Public Cleansing Refuse Collection

The collection of refuse throughout the district continued to be maintained on a weekly basis. Bonus payments no doubt provide the incentive to ensure that the rounds are completed at the end of each week.

It is pleasing to record that no serious difficulties were experienced during the year to maintain a full establishment in the Cleansing Department. Unfortunately though during the Spring and Summer months it is always difficult to maintain fully staffed collection teams due to holidays and absenteeism through sickness.

Refuse Disposal

All refuse is disposed of at the Bonemill Quarry. One man is employed on a full time basis to control the tip, to ensure that all refuse is disposed of in an organised manner. A limited amount of trade waste from local industries is accepted on to the tip on a payment of 3/- per load.

Salvage Collection and Disposal

Waste paper continues to form the bulk of salvageable materials and it is from this source the greatest income is gained. The refuse collectors collect the paper salvage from private dwellings along with household refuse. A separate independent collection of paper salvage continues to be made from the majority of Shops and Factories in the Town without charge.

Other salvage is sorted at the tip and during the year the income from salvage was as follows:—
