Of the 39 cases notified during 1949, 36 were pulmonary, 1 of the meninges, 1 of the knee, and 1 of the shoulder. Of these cases 17 were admitted to Standish House, 2 attended Standish House for treatment, 4 were admitted to Hospital and 1 admitted to a Convalescent Home. One case was re-housed. The seven deaths comprised seven females, average age 38 years, notified during 1948 and 1949 as suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

Water Supply

The water for this area is supplied by the Stroud District Water Board and 96 per cent of the houses herein are connected to the supply. Thirty-three samples of water from the town supplies were taken and submitted for chemical and bacteriological analysis. Thirty-one samples were satisfactory and the remaining two unsatisfactory. In the case of the unsatisfactory reports, notification of the result was sent to the Engineer of the Stroud District Water Board, who took immediate action to remedy the cause in each case.

Springs and Wells

Eleven samples of water from springs and wells in the district were taken and submitted for chemical and bacteriological analysis. The whole of these samples were unsatisfactory. Where the samples were classified as unfit for human consumption, steps were at once taken to secure the provision of a main water supply.

Swimming Pools

The public swimming pools at Stratford Park were in constant use throughout the season, and it is very satisfactory to record that the samples taken during the year, eight in number, were all satisfactory. The pools contain over 385,000 gallons, and is maintained by a filtration plant designed to filter the whole contents in six hours.

Sewage

The work on the new sewage disposal works has been continued and the new and enlarged trunk sewer is under construction.

All complaints received of unhygienic conditions were duly investigated and the necessary action taken to abate the nuisances found.

Shops Act

Ninety-five Inspections were made during the year and 11 Notices were served under the Shops Act, 1934, also 3 Notices under the Public Health Act, 1936. On all other visits the premises were found to be satisfactory.

Factories

Eighty-five visits were paid to the 68 registered factories in the district. Defects were found on 15 premises, and notices were served accordingly.

Thirty-six inspections were made during the year and notices were served for the limewashing of 12 of the premises. This work was carried out.

COMPOSITIONAL SAMPLES (INFORMAL)

123 informal samples of milk were taken and submitted to the County Analyst for compositional analysis. Of these 90 were above the required standard laid down in the Sale of Milk Regulations, 1939, whilst the remaining 33 were below the 3 per cent fat content. In all cases where samples were found to be below the required standard, the appropriate authorities have been notified with a view to formal samples being taken.

BACTERIOLOGICAL SAMPLES (INFORMAL)

Eighty informal samples were submitted for bacteriological analysis, 77 being designated milks and 3 non-designated milks. Seventy-five proved to be satisfactory and 5 unsatisfactory. The unsatisfactory samples, all of them designated milks, were notified to the authorities concerned with a view to formal samples being taken.

Theatres and Cinemas

Sixty-eight visits to cinemas and public halls were made. Special annual certificates as to the suitability of the sanitary arrangements and other facilities of the cinemas and halls, are required by the magistrates before they license the premises. These certificates were issued.

Common Lodging Houses

Durns Lodging House, at 36 Hill Street, Stroud, was closed by the Council during 1949.

The one remaining common lodging house with accommodation for 53 persons was visited on 46 occasions and the by-laws and regulations have been generally well observed.

Slaughterhouse and Meat Inspection

Only the Council's Abattoir and Messrs. Smith Rogers Bacon Factory were in use for the slaughtering of animals for human consumption during the year.

A total of 988 visits were made to these premises for the purpose of examining the meat, organs, etc.

The total amount of meat condemned, including the organs of carcases condemned during the year was 20 tons 11 cwt. 3 qrs., including the carcases of 44 cows, 10 heifers, 5 steers, 4 bulls, 3 calves, 6 sheep, 17 pigs, and 3 sows: part carcases consisting of 18 forequarters of beef, 13 part forequarters of beef, 8 hindquarters of beef, 54 part hindquarters of beef, 14 portions of beef, 30 portions of mutton, 22 portions of pork and parts of carcases of imported beef. SEWAGE

There are 4 sewage works in the district, two of which are satisfactory. In addition there are small installations which satisfactorily serve groups of council houses.

During the year there have been 13 new connections to the main sewer.

SECTION 47, NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

One case was investigated under this Act, which empowers the Council to obtain an Order for the compulsory removal of aged, infirm or physically incapacitated persons under certain conditions to a suitable home or hospital. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

Water Supplies

The district is supplied with water by the Stroud District Water Board, one of whose sources of supply is situated in the Urban District.

Samples of water were regularly taken, only two proving to be unsatisfactory during the year. In each case the engineer of the Stroud District Water Board took immediate action to remedy the cause.

Springs and Wells

There are several springs in the district and one sample submitted for chemical and bacteriological analysis proved to be unsatisfactory. It was not possible, in this case, to install a main supply.

Sewage

The district is included in the Scheme prepared for the area of the Stroud Urban and Rural District Councils. The work on this scheme is progressing within the Stroud Areas.

Schemes have been prepared within the district to extend internal sewers to Bath Road, Horsley Road, Pinfarthings and Park Road.


