

Population(census 1901), -0804.

Births, - The births registered during the year numbered 176, of these 91 were males, and 85 females; the average number of births of the preceding ten years was 196.

With the decennial average of 22.0; the same rate for Rural England and Valesbeing 26.3. The Registrar General in his remarks says " with trifling exceptions the fall in the birth-rate has been continous since 1878".

Deaths, - The number of deaths registered from all causes was 101, of these 62 were males and 85 females; the decennial average being 136.

Death-rate, - This is, as far as this district is concerned, the lowest on record being only 11.6 per 1000 persons living, whilst the average for the preceding ten years was 15.1 and that for Rural England and Wales 15.0 for 1906.

Average Age at Beath, - This was 55.4 years, not quite so high as last year when it was 58 years, but still well above the decennial average of about 50 years.

Zymotic death-rate, - This is nil as not a single death was registered as dying from any of the seven zymotic diseases.

Infant Mortality, - The proportion of deaths under one year of age to births registered was 67.0 which is low when compared to the Gecennial average of 94.3. The same rate for rural England and Wales for 1906 was 115.

Prevalence of Infectious Disease, Motification, - During this year as last only 10 cases were notified viz: 2 from Diphtheria both occurring at one farm in the parish of Marnhull, 4 from Scarlet Fever, being isolated cases at Marnhull, Stalbridge, Child Okeford, and Hanford, 3 form Erysipelas, and 1 from Typhoid Fever from Sturminster occurring at Sturminster Common and without dobt due to drinking bad water.

Phthisis, - 6 cases were so registered, 2 being between the ages of 15 and 25, the other 4 being of the ages of 33, 39, 42, and 49. 4 of the 6 cases occurred at Stalbridge, 1 at Stourton Caundle and one at Haselbury Bryan.

Isolation Mospital, - There is none within this district, one of the cases of Scarlet Fever was sent to the Blandford Isolation Hospital, and I have some to the conclusion that in this district there is no special need of such an institution.

Housing of the Working Classes, - No cases of insanitary dwellings were reported and the cottage accommodation remains fairly satisfactory

Systematic inspection of between 30 and 40 Dairies and Cowsheds, I find there has been no Register kept and consequently there has been no registration. The Dairies as a rule were excellently kept, very clean and in most cases well ventilated, only in one case did I find a drain connected with the outside and that has since been diconnected. As regards the Cowsheds in nearly every case they required whitewashing and this was promised to be done in all cases except where the nature of their construction did not admit of it. I found four cowsheds quite unfit for the housing of cows, one of these has already been rebuilt, and I believe the ewners of the other three are to be given notice to rebuild. In many cases the cows remain out in the fields art the year round except when calving or itl. I should advise a register to be kept, that all be registered, and a system of inspection adopted.

Slaughter-Houses, Bakehouses, Common Lodging Houses, - The slaughter houses are satisfactory, several bake-houses have been inspected and improvements suggested. There are no Common lodging-houses in the district.
