One man, who was living in a residential colony for the mentally-handicapped in Essex, died from diphtheria. Family contacts in Sudbury were tested and were negative for diphtheria.

INFANT WELFARE CENTRES

The West Suffolk County Council provide one centre in the town.

A Clinic is held weekly at the Health Clinic, Acton Lane, on Tuesday at 2p.m. Welfare foods are also distributed from this centre.

Two Health Visitors attend. A Medical Officer also attends on two sessions in the month.

LABORATORY FACILITIES

The Public Health Laboratory, Woodbridge Road, East, Ipswich, under the directorship of Dr.P.K.Fraser, is always generous with advice and services.

Lincolne, Sutton and Wood Limited, Norwich, provide analytical reports on water and foods.

HOSPITALS

St. Leonards

General practitioner staffed hospital, with visiting consultants and Out-Patients clinics, maternity, general medical, minor surgical, some geriatric patients.

Walnuttree

The majority of these beds are geriatric. There is a physiotherapy department with some specialised equipment. Psychiatric and ophthalmic Out-Patients clinics are held. One of the County Welfare Officers for the area is also in attendance when psychiatric clinics are held.

Family Planning Clinics are held in Out-Patients Department of Walnuttree Hospital.

The work carried out during the year has been very similar to that
done in previous years. There has been more emphasis on routine inspection
of food premises, and on dealing with noise nuisances.

Slum clearance has continued with action against individual unfit
houses, and included the declaration of the Inkerman Row Clearance Area.
Simultaneously, there has again been an increase in the number of houses
repaired and improved, with and without grant aid.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Chairman and Members for
the interest they have shown in the work of the Public Health Department
during the year. I would also like to thank Dr.E.Kinnear and the other
Officers of the Council for their continued co-operation and support
and Mrs.A.French who has also helped in every possible way during the
preceeding year.

HOUSING

New Houses - Council

During 1970, 164 dwellings on Springlands Estate were completed and preliminary work was in hand for development at the rear of Cats Lane comprising 41 units in three blocks.

Contracts have been awarded for 386 houses, the first and second phases of the Springlands Estate at Gallows Hill. Roads and sewers for the first and second stages are complete.

New Houses - Private

The progress of private building was higher than the previous year with an extra 26 private houses completed.

REHOUSING

The chart below shows the fairly rapid increase of housing work being undertaken by the Borough.

From 1965 to 1969 the average number of families rehoused per year was 39, and the average number of people rehoused was 106.

The Council have now built 696 dwellings plus 164 on the Springlands Estate which have been taken over during 1970, and own various miscellaneous properties which are used for rehousing. In addition 185 garages have been provided by the Council.

GENERAL

During the year seventeen informal notices were served and all properties were repaired following these informal notices.

Many other minor repairs were attended to after an informal visit or telephone call to the owner.

At the end of 1970 the number of applicants on the Council's Housing List was 220.

Numerous reports and visits were made on the accommodation occupied by applicants.

CERTIFICATES OF DISREPAIR

No certificates were issued during the year.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

Progress continued with housing improvements during 1970. A much larger amount was paid under discretionary grants and standard grant payments continued at the same rate.

Many more applications for discretionary grants were being received particularly towards the end of 1970 and the works being put forward for grant aid were of a wider range than previously. This is no doubt because of the increased assistance available under the Housing Act, 1969.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The weekly collection of domestic refuse continued during the year. The use of plastic refuse disposal bags increased steadily and has assisted in providing greater efficiency of the service.

The refuse disposal tip has not caused any serious nuisances and the daily covering of the waste was executed satisfactorily.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE

The water reclamation works continued to operate satisfactorily and samples taken generally gave satisfactory results, particularly after desludging had taken place.

SWIMMING POOL

The swimming pool was open from May to September.

Routine residual chlorine and ph tests are made at the pool and samples taken and sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Ipswich. No adverse results were obtained and the water was assumed to be of a satisfactory degree of purity.

WATER SUPPLY

The supply of water during the year was adequate. Frequent samples gave uniformly satisfactory results. The water is supplied by the West Suffolk Water Board and the character of the water is still very hard, with a very high figure for both temporary and permanent hardness.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

The Public Conveniences in Burkitts Lane have been in use throughout the year.

A certain amount of vandalism persisted throughout the year and constant effort was needed by the Borough Surveyor's Department to keep clean and usable the facilities provided and to minimise the damage being done.

The Public Conveniences in Gaol Lane were closed but those at the rear of the swimming pool in Belle Vue Gardens are still in use.

DISINFESTATION

Disinfestation by spraying of six premises was carried out during the year.

WASPS NESTS

During the year 142 wasps nests were destroyed by the Rodent Operator.

PRIVATE DWELLINGS - RODENT CONTROL

On receipt of complaint of infestation, premises are visited and treatment given free of charge.

BUSINESS PREMISES - RODENT CONTROL

Business premises are tested under agreement when found to be infested and all treatments are charged to the occupier.

AGRICULTURAL PROPERTIES - RODENT CONTROL

All agricultural properties were surveyed periodically and treatment carried out where necessary; charges on a time and material basis.

There are no Common Lodging Houses within the Borough.

F O O D

FOOD CONTROL

Inspection of food premises continued. Many small improvements were carried out after informal notice. These contribute in time to a general small improvement in standards at all shops. Some improvements were major in character and it is hoped to continue emphasis on few unsatisfactory food premises.

UNSOUND FOOD

A large amount of food was found to be unfit. This is probably due to the increase in large food shops.

ICE CREAM

Thirty-seven premises were registered for the sale of ice cream. Ice cream sold at these premises was one of the nationally-known products,

Nearly all the ice-cream is pre-wrapped.

PRESERVED FOODS

Seventeen premises were registered for the preparation or manufacture of sausages or potted, pressed, pickled or preserved foods.

MILK AND DAIRIES

The licensing of dealers in Sudbury is the responsibility of the West Suffolk County Council.

At present there are five registered distributors and six shop dealers in milk. These hold between them, one licence to deal in untreated milk, eight pasteurised and eleven sterilised licenses.

Sampling of the milk was carried out by the Weights and Measures Department of the County Council on behalf of the Health Department. Copies of sample reports received indicated that these were satisfactory.

RODENT CONTROL

The rat population increased here, as throughout the country. Regular routine surveys are carried out by the Rodent Operator and all complaints are promptly dealt with.
