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

# Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1952

TO the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Sudbury:— Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present for your consideration, the Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Borough of Sudbury for the year 1952.

The statistics for the year reviewed show no trend of particular significance but the continued downward trend in the population residing in the borough will be noted.

The number of notifications received considerably increased. This was due almost entirely to an outbreak of infective jaundice.

Serious pollution of the River Stour caused the death of a large number of fish which had to be removed to prevent their becoming a nuisance.

The town was visited by the Mass Miniature Radiography Unit and the response by the townspeople in presenting themselves for examination has not been exceeded since.

I wish to to acknowledge with gratitude the support received from the Chairman and members of the Public Health Committee and to record my thanks to the Town Clerk, Mr. R. Coates, the Borough Surveyor, Mr. C. L. Heyne, and Sanitary Inspector, Mr. E. H. Kerridge for their co-operation during the year reviewed.

#### SECTION B

# A. WATER SUPPLY

An adequate supply of water has been maintained throughout the district. Quarterly bacteriological analyses have been taken, in all cases the results have been excellent. The samples were taken after chlorination, which is carried out as a precautionary measure only.

No chemical analysis was taken during the year. Owing to the extreme hardness of the water there is no danger from dissolved lead.

During the year the obsolete steam standby pump was replaced by new automatic electric turbine pump and new recording meters were installed at the reservoir.

#### B. SEWERAGE AND SEWERAGE DISPOSAL

A reasonably good effluent has been maintained throughout the year. Minor improvements were carried out to sludge drying beds and humus tanks.
