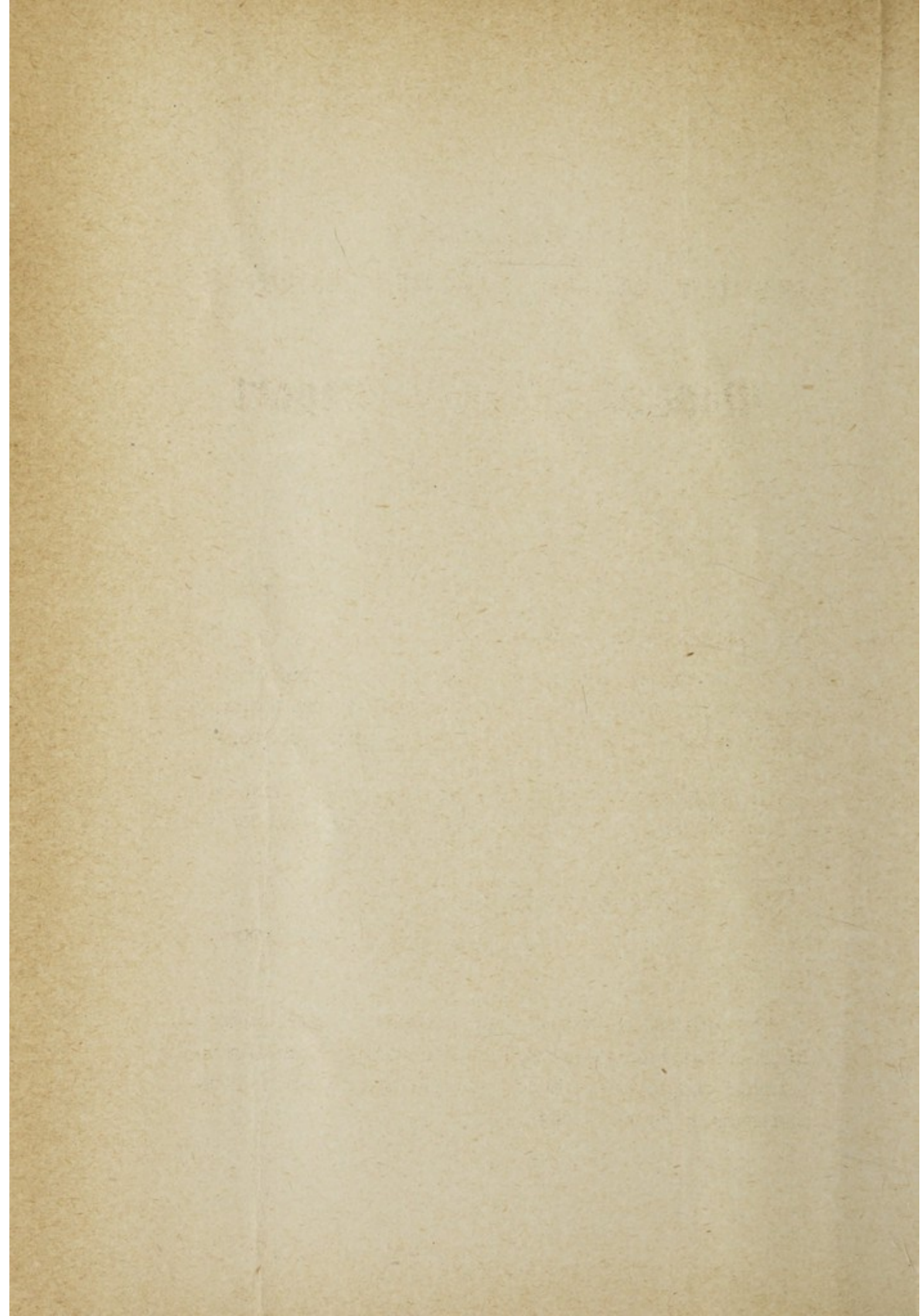

Medical Officer's Report

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

In presenting my Annual Report for 1900, I would commence by saying that I have estimated the population of the District—up to the middle of last year—at 16,106.

The total number of deaths was 233; viz.: 106 males and 127 females, giving a death-rate for the year of 14·46 per 1,000.

The deaths registered from zymotic causes were 44. I have included amongst these, deaths arising from diarrhœa, whooping cough, and enteric. The death-rate from all these causes was 2·731 per 1,000.

The second part of my report on the Table marked B deals with cases of infectious diseases notified during the year. From this table it will be seen that 111 cases were reported as compared with 298 cases in the previous year. They are as follows :

Small Pox. No case of this disease occurred during the year. I am afraid the number of children vaccinated during the year will compare unfavourably with that of the previous year, owing principally to the fact that the guardians have not seen fit to carry out the compulsory clause of the act.

Scarlet Fever. Sixty cases were reported to me, as compared with two hundred and thirty-eight cases in the previous year. At no time did it assume an epidemic character. Every precaution was taken—short of isolating the patients in an infectious diseases' hospital—which we have not got—to prevent its further spread. As will be seen six deaths occurred from this cause.

Typhoid Fever. Six cases were notified during the year, with one death; in this case there is no doubt the disease was contracted abroad. One case arose from contagion, and four of the others from an insanitary condition of the dwellings, which have since been rectified. I am glad to be able to report a continued diminution of cases of this disease. In former years, before the sewerage

of the district and water supply was completed, it was always with us, and formed the principal item in the zymotic death-rate.

- Erysipelas. Thirty-one cases with two deaths were reported during the twelve months.
- Diphtheria and Membranous Croup. In all, nine cases with two deaths occurred during the year. In two instances the disease was contracted outside the district, and in both these cases the diagnosis was confirmed by the finding of the bacilli in the secretion. In two of the other cases it was probably due to an insanitary condition of the dwellings, but in five cases no cause could be traced.
- Measles. Cases of this disease happened in nearly every month of the year, never assuming an epidemic form. Five deaths were registered from this cause.
- Whooping Cough. Was more or less prevalent throughout the year, and thirteen deaths occurred under this head. The difficulty in preventing the sending of children to school whilst suffering from this complaint in its early or later stages is a principal cause of its propagation.
- Bronchitis, Pleurisy and Pneumonia. Thirty-seven deaths were registered from these causes.
- Phthisis. The mortality from this cause has been this year greater than usual. The deaths were thirteen, giving a death-rate per 1,000 of $\cdot 807$.
- Puerperal Fever. Three cases were notified to me during the year with one death. All the cases were attended by a midwife, who was warned to discontinue to attend confinements for a period of six weeks.
- Diarrhoea, Enteritis, and Gastric Catarrh. The mortality from these causes was less than in former years, only four deaths occurring under these heads, and all in children under one year.
- Water Supply. This, I am glad to say, continues to be most satisfactory.

- House Accommodation Throughout the district is satisfactory. During the year a few cases of overcrowding have been rectified, and in two instances owing to their utterly insanitary state, the houses have been closed for habitation.
- Sewerage and Drainage. The system is working satisfactorily, and in those cases in which there has been a nuisance from the street-ventilators, airshafts have been introduced to the abatement of the nuisance.
- Scavenging Has been carried out satisfactorily.
- I would again remind the Council of the desirability of still further compelling the adoption of water-closets throughout the district.
- Disinfecting Chamber. I am glad to be able to congratulate the Council upon having at last procured this very necessary means for disinfection.
- Infectious Diseases' Hospital. The scheme for a combined Hospital for this and one of the other districts as arranged by the County Council, is, as far as I am aware, no nearer a consummation than it was twelve months ago. Of its urgent need there can be no doubt, and in this connection it may be pointed out again that the Notification of Diseases Act is more or less useless unless there is a place for isolating cases in the early stage of an epidemic.
- Inspection. I have made several periodic and systematic inspections of the district including the Cowsheds, Dairies, and Slaughterhouses, and have found them in a satisfactory condition. This also applies to bakehouses and workshops. I have by monthly reports and otherwise, informed you as to the health of the district. No case of diseased meat or fish was offered for sale. No occasion arose to take proceedings under the Adulteration of Foods Act, or in the matter of offensive trades.
