ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1973

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN.

It is with great pleasure that I present the Annual report for 1973 detailing the work carried out by the Public Health Department during the year. This pleasure is, however, tinged with regret as by the time this report is printed Swadlincote Urban District Council will have ceased to exist, combined in the much larger South Derbyshire District Council.

The work of the department has continued steadily throughout the year though, of necessity, as the year progressed more and more time had to be devoted to preparing for the advent of re-organisation.

It was pleasing to see the steady, if unspectacular, progress in the field of housing, particularly in improving the existing housing stock. It was particularly pleasing to see the number of applications and enquiries for improvement grants increasing, suggesting that house owners are starting to look further than merely providing bathrooms in the houses. Unfortunately, the condition of some houses within the district is such that improvement is not practical and steady progress has been made to clear these houses, though a considerable problem still exists within the district.

During the year the Swadlincote Smoke Control Areas Numbers 3 & 4, covering all Church Gresley and a large percentage of Swadlincote, became operative which now means that 2,235 houses are now covered by Enoke Control Orders. One of the most important and time consuming duties of any Public Health Department is that of Food Hygiene. The inspection of food premises within the district has been systematically carried out throughout the year and it is worthy of note that it was not found necessary to institute proceedings in respect of any premises, a fact which must speak well for the standard of hygiene within the district.

I must, at this point, thank the members of the Council, and in particular the Chairman and Members of the Public Health and Housing Committees for their help throughout the year. My thanks also go to the Heads of all the Departments of the Council and their staffs for their co-operation. Lastly, but by no means least, I would like to thank the Medical Officer of Health and the rest of the staff of this Department for their assistance and loyalty throughout the year.

WATER SUPPLY

The water supply to the Swadlincote area is derived primarily from the North West Leicestershire Water Board's Milton Waterworks plus additional water as required direct from the Melbourne Works of the River Dove Water Board. The supply from Milton is pumped direct into a service reservoir at Hartshorne. The Board has constructed a reservoir at Smisby from which the supply to Swadlincote could be maintained via a 15" trunk main. The supply from Melbourne to the Swadlincote and Ashby area is via an 18" trunk main direct from the Melbourne works to Smisby Reservoir.

Throughout the year close co-operation has been maintained by the Water Board and its staff, and the assistance of the Chief Engineer, who furnished the following report, is greatly appreciated by the department:

- " (a) 1. The water supply has in general been both satisfactory in quality and quantity.
 - 2. No unsatisfactory reports of bacteriological examination of water samples were received during the year.
 - 3. Examination for fluoride content is not done regularly, but it is expected that it will be similar to previous tests where the results gave a content of around 0.2 p.p.m.
 - (b) 1. For your information the Board took 649 samples of raw and treated water from its various sources and from various points on the distribution system throughout the Board's area of supply for bacteriological examination. All treated water samples were satisfactory excepting 10, and satisfactory results were obtained from subsequent samples. The results of samples taken within your district have already been forwarded to your Medical Officer of Health. 158 samples of water were sent for chemical analysis and all samples of treated water were satisfactory.

Improvement of the supply into the Swadlincote Urban District Council area was continued during the year by careful planning of works so as to ensure the maximum benefit to the area as a whole from all mains extensions and estate mains laid."

The Health Department obtain samples from various parts of the Urban Area and submit them for Bacteriological examination. Samples are also submitted for Chemical Analysis to the County Analyst, for whose help we are most grateful.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The following information has been supplied by Mr. D. Drake, D.L.C., C.Eng., M.I.C.E. the Council's Engineer and Surveyor.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT 1955

Sampling under the Food and Drugs Act 1955 is carried out by the County Analyst acting for the County Council, who are the Food and Drugs Authority. The County Analyst, Mr. J. Markland, has supplied me with the following information:

"Forty-five samples, including four milks, were taken during 1973.

Three samples of Dehydrated Meal Preparations, one Italian Style, one Curry Style and one Chinese Style all carried unsatisfactory labels. The matter was taken up with the manufacturers.

One sample of Tomato Paste carried no list of ingredients. A letter was sent to the importer.

One Sample of Ginger Spread also carried no list of ingredients. A letter was sent to the producer.

The remaining samples were classed as satisfactory.

Two consumer complaints were examined during the year. These were:

A Cream Cake, which contained a foreign body.

A Bread Cob, which contained discoloured dough."

In addition to the above, ten complaints were made to your inspectors concerning food which the purchaser considered to be "not of the substance, nature or quality demanded" In five cases the complaint was found to be justified, and warning letters were sent to the Manufacturer and/or vendor. In one further case, Court proceedings were instituted and the defendant pleaded "Guilty"
