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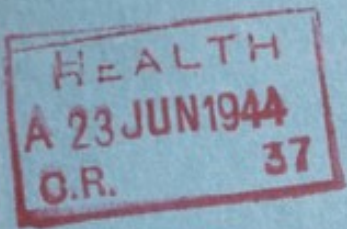

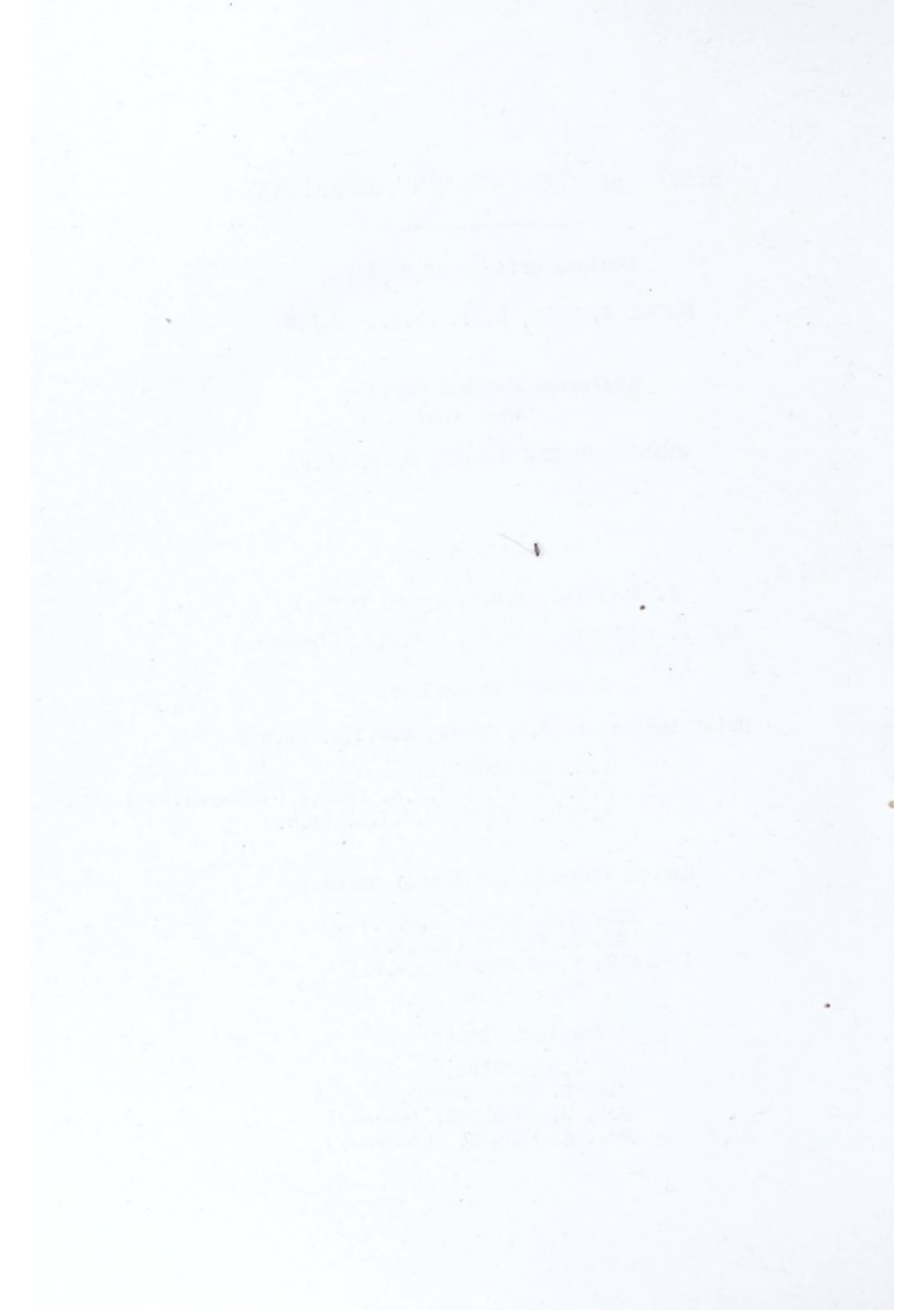

To His Worship The Mayor, Alderman and
Councillors of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my report on the health of the Borough for the year 1943.

This Annual Report is again curtailed in view of the war conditions and in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health.

The statistics have been compiled in the Department there being no figures available from the Registrar General.

There were no serious epidemics of infectious diseases, and from a Public Health point of view therefore the year 1943 has been a satisfactory one.

There were 460 deaths during the year giving a death rate of 12.1 as compared with 10.9 last year.

The Birth rate which was 17.2 shewed a large increase, and is the highest rate since 1922, while the Infantile Mortality rate has shown a very appreciable fall to the record low figure of 34 per 1000 births. Twenty years ago the Birth rate was 17.0 while the Infantile Mortality rate was 104.0 per 1000 births.

It must be a source of satisfaction to your Maternity and Child Welfare Committee to learn of this remarkable low infantile mortality rate, for I can confidently say that the work of your Ante-natal and Infant Welfare Clinics has played no small part in reducing the deaths in children under one year of age.

The Ante-natal Clinics shewed an increase in the attendance of expectant mothers, there being over 70% of expectant mothers attending, and it is gratifying to state that there were no maternal deaths.

It is impossible to over estimate the value of regular ante-natal care in the prevention of maternal mortality, and neo-natal mortality.

A certain number of infant deaths is preventable, chiefly those in which the child suffers from developmental abnormality, but a large number of infant deaths are preventable.

The popularity of your Welfare Clinics continues, there being 9070 attendances during the year, and although I am not in a position to produce detailed statistics as regards weights and heights, from careful observations I am of the opinion that the nutrition of these young children has not deteriorated during the war, this being largely due to the efforts of the Ministry of Food for making available the issue of National Cod Liver Oil and Fruit Juices for the children up to the age of five.

I am informed by the Food Executive Officer that 57,000 bottles of orange juice and 8,000 bottles of Cod Liver Oil were issued during the year, or, of the total number of those entitled to these issues, 75% were drawing their supplies.

I would like to take this opportunity to appeal to every mother with children under 5 years of age to take advantage of these issues of vitamins which are most necessary for the well being of the growing child.

The Voluntary Helpers at your Welfare Clinics have continued to serve us faithfully throughout the year and we are most grateful for their services, particularly in these difficult times.

War-time Nurseries.

Your two war-time nurseries, which have a total accommodation for 66 children whose mothers are employed on essential war work, have been well attended during the year. The health of the children has been exceptionally good, and although a few individual children were away with measles and chicken-pox there was no spread of either of these or of other infectious diseases in the nurseries.

A happy relationship exists between the teachers and the nursing staff which no doubt has contributed in making the children attending these nurseries most happy and contented.

Diphtheria.

Approximately 80% of the child population under 5 years of age have been immunised. Immunisation is carried out at all your Welfare Clinics, and your Health Visitors do their utmost to persuade mothers to have their children immunised on or as soon as possible after their first birthday.

Scabies.

Sixty cases of Scabies were notified to the department as compared with 72 last year. Adequate arrangements are provided for treatment of these cases at the School Clinic if they cannot be treated at home.

As far as the Health Department is concerned, I wish to express my appreciation to all members of the staff who have loyally played their parts in a rather difficult year, but the work of Dr. McKane, the Assistant Medical Officer, and Mr. Berry, Chief Sanitary Inspector, to whose untiring energy much of the success of my department is due.

In conclusion I should like to take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the Health and Maternity and Child Welfare Committees for their generous help and consideration, to my colleagues of other departments for their help and co-operation.

GENERAL PROVISION of HEALTH SERVICES

Hospitals:

Urgent medical and surgical cases are sent to hospitals in adjoining districts, as well as to Abbotsfield Hospital provided by the Lancashire County Council.

Provision for the isolation and nursing of infectious diseases is made at Astley Sanatorium by the Leigh Joint Hospital Board, of which the Swinton and Pendlebury Corporation is a constituent Authority.

Maternity cases requiring inpatient treatment are sent to Hope Hospital, Salford, and St. Mary's Hospital, Manchester.

Laboratory Facilities:

Specimens for Bacteriological Diagnosis are sent to the Public Health Laboratory, Manchester.

Ambulance Facilities:

There has been no marked increase in the number of calls made upon the Ambulance Service. A summary of journeys made by the ambulance to the various Hospitals will be found in Table 111 of this report.

Nursing in the Home:

There have been no changes in the arrangements described in my report for 1938.

Clinics and Treatment Centres:

There have been no changes in the Clinic and Treatment Centres during the year.

Maternity and Child Welfare:

These services were fully described in my report for 1938. The Clifton Infant Welfare Centre which was transferred to the Victoria Wesleyan Chapel at the outbreak of hostilities, owing to the Parish Hall being taken over for Civil Defence purposes, was, at the end of the year transferred back to the Clifton Parish Hall.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

These have been enumerated in detail in previous reports, and there were no outstanding developments during the year 1943.

Particulars of the sanitary accommodation in the district, house inspection, and the general work of the Sanitary Inspectors are given in Table IV - VIII.

HOUSING.

There has been very little accomplished in the Council's Slum Clearance Scheme during the year, owing to War conditions. Details up to the end of December are given in Tables IX and X.

INSPECTION and SUPERVISION of FOOD.

Particulars of the samples taken and of the work of the Sanitary Inspectors in connection with food supplies will be found in Tables XI - XIII.

INFECTIOUS and OTHER DISEASES.

The number of notifications of infectious diseases notified during the year 1943, was 586, as compared with 1049 in 1942. A Statistical Summary of Cases Notified appears in Table XIV.

Notifications of Diphtheria decreased from 82 in 1942 to 55 in 1943, while Scarlet Fever decreased from 158 to 122.

A Statistical Summary of Cases Notified under the Tuberculosis Regulations appears in Tables XV and XVI.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I wish to present my report on the Cleansing work in the Borough during the year 1943.

All refuse has been disposed of by "Controlled Tipping", the Nelson Fold site being used throughout the year.

The labour question has been a very great difficulty and became very acute towards the latter part of the year, so much so that it became impossible to clear the district under one month. Considering the very poor quality of the coal with its resultant large deposits of ash, the householders, with a very few exceptions who are always with us, have been very tolerant and have appeared to recognise my difficulties.

An organised Pig Food Collection by communal bins was commenced on June 8th 1942. During the year 327 tons 18 cwts. have been collected and Receipts have amounted to £573.16.6. This was sold in its raw state to the local Pig-keepers. The Authority has now been served with a Direction to take all raw pig food to a "Processing Plant".

The amount of salvage etc. collected is shown in Table XXIV from which it will be seen the Receipts amounted to £2249.6.10d. which total is £37. less than the previous year. Salvage generally has taken on a downward trend. Tins etc. are no longer required to be collected in this area.

Lancashire Book Drive - September 18th to October 2nd, 1943.

The target fixed was 77400 books - the actual figure reached being 125,100 representing 3.23 per inhabitant. The response of the Public to this Drive was most gratifying. The main reason for its success was the magnificent help given by teachers and school children who formed the County's Book Recovery Brigade. One school boy collected 1288 books alone. The books were despatched as follows:-

15588 direct to the Forces
1489 allocated to the Libraries
108023 for repulping.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee, and all the men of the outdoor staff engaged on cleansing work, for their assistance during the year.
