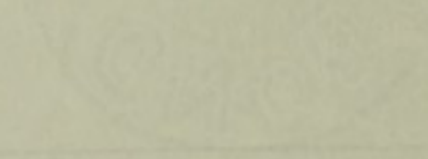

To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors
of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you my Report upon the health of the Borough and the work of the Public Health Department during the year 1948.

The Birth-rate per 1,000 estimated population mid-1948 was 17.8, compared with 20.37 for 1947.

The Death-rate (40 per thousand live births) of Infants under 12 months old is slightly higher than for 1947, but remained well below the rates of 59.9 and 59.2 in 1944 and 1945 respectively.

The Death-rate for the Borough (10.8 per 1,000 estimated population) remained low.

With the exception of 725 cases of Measles and 106 cases of Whooping Cough, the prevalence of infectious diseases during 1948 was comparatively small. Only 2 cases of Diphtheria were notified, which again proves the value of Immunisation against Diphtheria.

This year marks the transfer of the Maternity and Child Welfare Service to the Lancashire County Council, and it has only therefore been possible for me to give details of this work up to the 4th July.

I must once again express my appreciation and thanks to the ladies who voluntarily gave so much of their time in assisting at the Infant Welfare Clinics up to the time the Service was transferred, without whose help it would have been impossible to cope with the large attendances.

In conclusion, may I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the Health Committee and the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee for their help and consideration, to my colleagues of other departments for their co-operation, and to my staff for their loyal support.

HOSPITALS AND AMBULANCE SERVICE

The proximity of this Borough to the cities of Manchester and Salford made it singularly fortunate in regard to the provision of hospital accommodation, in that the excellent services of Manchester and Salford were available to the residents of Swinton and Pendlebury; up to the 4th July when the Hospital Service became part of the National Health Service Scheme.

The Eccles Corporation Ambulance was available for use within this district, and was used for the following types of cases:-

1. Accidents including cases of serious illness in the streets;
2. Conveyance to and from hospital on the certificate of a Medical Practitioner.

Up to 4th July 1948, after which date the Ambulance Service was transferred to the Lancashire County Council, 1301 journeys were made by the ambulance, and Table IV gives particulars of these journeys.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

There is no Maternity Hospital in this District, but the Corporation had an arrangement with the Lancashire County Council which existed up to the 4th July when the whole of the Hospital Service was included in the National Health Service, whereby the majority of the maternity cases in this area were admitted to Park Hospital, Davyhulme. Other Hospitals to which the Borough patients were admitted were St. Mary's Hospital, Manchester, Eccles and Patricroft Hospital, and Hope Hospital, Salford. Cases of Puerperal Pyrexia were admitted to Astley Sanatorium.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

The water supply for the Swinton and Pendlebury areas of the Borough is received from the Manchester Corporation Waterworks and that for the Clifton area from the Bolton Corporation. Both supplies were kept under constant supervision and proved generally satisfactory in both quality and quantity.

A total of 1554 dwellinghouses were inspected by the Sanitary Inspectors under the Public Health and Housing Acts during the year and 5997 visits were made for this purpose. Difficulty is still experienced in obtaining repairs to dwellinghouses and little, if any, progress was made during the year in alleviating the position. The main obstacles in this respect appear to be the scarcity of building materials and increased cost of building repairs.

600 complaints were investigated during the year, resulting in 747 notices being served requiring various works to be carried out. 593 houses in respect of which notices had been served by the Department were rendered fit for habitation during the year.

Progress was made in the provision of new houses, 109 including 29 prefabricated dwellings being erected during 1948. Considerable work, however, remains to be done in order to remedy unsuitable living conditions and overcrowding.

Tables XII to XVII give details of the work of the Sanitary Department during the year.

FOOD SUPPLIES.

The milk and food supplies within the Borough were under constant supervision and all premises connected with the production and/or sale of food were regularly inspected, 806 visits of inspection being made to such premises during the year. Details of inspections are given in Table XV.

Table XIX gives particulars of food surrendered as unfit for human consumption during 1948. It has been gratifying to note the co-operation shown by the local shop-keepers in bringing to the notice of the Department any foods which they suspected as not being wholesome. Regular samples of food and drugs were taken during the year, particulars of which are shown in Table XVIII.

The various milk supplies of the Borough were subjected to bacteriological and biological tests, the results of which are shown in Tables XX and XXI. In addition, samples of milk were submitted to the Public Analyst for chemical analysis and of 60 samples taken only 1 was found to be adulterated. Taken generally, it can be stated that the milk supplies have been maintained at a high standard of quality and cleanliness.

Particulars of samples of milk and other commodities which were found to be adulterated upon examination by the Public Analyst are appended below:-

RODENT CONTROL. During the year, in addition to the house to house search, surface treatments were carried out at 138 premises comprising 93 dwellings, 11 Local Authority premises and installations, and 34 business and industrial premises. The house to house search and visits to treatments necessitated 9,680 primary and 1,181 re-visits.

During 1948 the Health Committee adopted the provision of NS.19 Circular of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, and in September 1948, commenced a free service at dwelling-houses. Treatments at business premises continued to be invoiced.

The work of Sewer treatment, previously handled by the Borough Surveyor's Department, was transferred to this Department, and during the year two complete Sewer Maintenance treatments were operated in March and September, and in addition 10 per cent of the Sewer Manholes were test-baited in August.

The full records of these treatments are transmitted to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, whose Divisional Rodent Inspectors maintain an inspection of the work in progress.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Table XXIII gives particulars of the occurrence of infectious Diseases within the Borough during 1948. Of a total of 967 cases of Infectious Diseases notified, 725 were cases of Measles and 106 cases of Whooping Cough. The decrease in the number of cases of Diphtheria is outstanding, only 2 cases have been notified during the year. This figure is the lowest recorded in the history of the Borough and the steady decrease in the number of cases notified annually since 1944 gives ample evidence of the effectiveness of immunisation.

The incidence of Diphtheria since 1944 is as follows:- 1944 - 115; 1945- 84; 1946 - 30; 1947 - 3; 1948 - 2.

111 children were immunised against Diphtheria during the year, 98 of whom were under 5 years of age. In addition to the above, 121 children were given boosting doses on entering school. In addition, 282 children received a combined course of immunisations against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough. Particulars of immunisation in age groups during the year are shown in Table XXI.

5 cases of Infantile Paralysis were notified during the year, and all cases made a complete recovery.

Particulars of Tuberculosis notifications and deaths during 1948 are shown in Tables XXIII and XXIV. The work in connection with the care and after-care of tuberculous patients is carried out by the Lancashire County Council.

To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors
of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report on the Cleansing work in the Borough during the year 1948.

All refuse has been disposed of by controlled tipping (1) on the Beech Farm Playing Fields from April 12th to May 15th, where 510 loads approximate weight 1130 tons were tipped; and (2) Cheetham Road Housing site where 4045 loads, approximately 8540 tons were tipped up to the end of March 1949. Tipping is still taking place on this site, which, when completed, will I understand be used as a Playing Field and Plantation.

During the year the Pagefield System of Collection was superseded by S and D Freighter type of vehicle, i.e. one 8.9 cuyd. and three 11.3 cuyd. capacity. A further 11.3 cuyd. capacity is on order and when this is delivered a guaranteed weekly collection should be an established fact - eight to ten days now elapse between each emptying.

1060 ashbins were supplied during the year at a cost of £1091 by owners of private houses.

Communal waste food receptacles are emptied twice weekly and the contents are delivered to Bolton Corporation for concentration. During the year 195 tons 16³/₄ cwt. of waste food were collected and a sum of £487. 2. 7. was received in respect thereof.

The volume of salvage collected during the year was satisfactory, and particulars are given in Table XXVIII. The revenue from this source yielded £2871. 3. 4. an increase of £566. 13. 5. over the previous twelve months.

An incentive bonus of £350. 15. 10. was divided amongst the men in the Cleansing Department during the year.

As this will be the last opportunity I shall have of submitting my annual report upon the work of the Cleansing Department by reason of my retirement on superannuation after over fifty years service with this Authority, it is not inappropriate at this juncture to point with considerable satisfaction to the vast strides that have been made since the turn of the century in matters appertaining to Public Cleansing.

The privy midden, fly infested and revolting to sight and smell, has disappeared, and with its passing the high mortality figures for typhoid have dwindled almost to nothing. The night soil carts have given place to a fleet of modern refuse collection vehicles which present upon our streets a very different picture from the former, which were as offensive to the public as they were degrading to the men who had to carry out these necessary tasks.

During the years of my service crude tipping gave place to incineration and this in turn was superseded by the modern method of controlled tipping, reclaiming the low lying land, forming playing fields and developing the space around housing estates for lawns and shrubberies.

It is very satisfying to look back over these years of progress and to feel that as far as this Borough is concerned I can claim no small share in those achievements.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee and all the men engaged on cleansing work for their assistance during the year.
