

To His Worship The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my Report upon the health of the Borough, and the work of the Public Health Department during the year 1951. This report has been prepared in accordance with the Ministry of Health's Circular 42/51 of the 10th December, 1951.

The birth-rate per 1,000 estimated population mid-1951 was 13.2 compared with 13.7 for 1950.

The death-rate of infants under one year per 1,000 live births was 23, compared with 17 in the previous year.

The death-rate for the Borough was 14.6 per 1,000 estimated population, compared with 13.5 for last year. The causes of death are much the same as last year.

The health of the community generally has been satisfactory and there was no unusual incidence of any of the notifiable infectious diseases.

The incidence of infectious diseases is in general reduced. Again, it is worthy of note that for the third year in succession there has not been a single case of Diphtheria in the Borough. Diphtheria immunisation has been actively pursued. The Ministry of Health in a recent circular with regard to Diphtheria Prophylaxis states: "As the occurrence of Diphtheria diminishes, fewer and fewer parents have any direct knowledge, let alone first-hand experience of Diphtheria, which is apt to make them dangerously unmindful of the disease or mistakenly to believe that it has been got rid of in this country."

I wish to express my appreciation and thanks to Dr. A. L. Thorburn, Medical Director of the No. 4 Mass Radiography Unit, for the very valuable work done when the Radiography Unit visited the Borough for the purpose of carrying out a survey. The X-ray examination of the chest will often bring to light many conditions, other than tuberculosis, and may enable treatment to be commenced at an early stage, thus ensuring the best chance of complete recovery. A table shewing the number of persons taking advantage of this survey will be found in Table XX on page 25.

A vigorous campaign in connection with hygiene in food premises has been undertaken during the year.

The year 1951 marks the end of waste water closets. As will be seen from Table V there are now no remaining waste water closets in the Borough.

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks to the Health Committee for their help and consideration, to my colleagues of other departments for their co-operation, and to my staff for their loyalty and support.

RODENT CONTROL.

During the year, in addition to the house to house search, surface treatments were carried out at 363 premises comprising 286 dwelling houses, 37 Local Authority premises and installations, and 40 business and industrial premises. The house to house search and visits to treatments necessitated 5,430 primary and 1,452 revisits.

Free services were continued at dwellinghouses following the adoption by the Health Committee in 1948 of the provisions of Circular NS.19 of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. Treatments at business premises continued to be invoiced.

The work of sewer treatment during the year comprised two complete sewer maintenance treatments in February and September, and in addition 10 per cent. of the sewer manholes were test baited.

The several brook courses in the district received regular inspections and treatments as necessary.

Owing to the number of factors governing the hygienic quality of Ice Cream, it is unwise to pay too much attention to the bacteriological results of any single sample. Where a sample was found to fall into Grades III and IV, further samples were taken, and over a six monthly period 50 per cent. of a vendor's samples should fall into Grade I, 80 per cent. into Grades I or II, and not more than 20 per cent. into Grade III, and none into Grade IV.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Table XVII gives particulars of the occurrence of Infectious Diseases within the Borough during 1951. Of a total of 608 cases of Infectious Diseases notified, 119 were cases of Scarlet Fever, 325 were cases of Measles and 44 cases of Whooping Cough.

For the third year in succession, there has not been a single case of Diphtheria notified in the district. This steady diminution of cases notified since 1945 gives ample evidence of the effectiveness of immunisation.

The incidence of Diphtheria since 1945 is as follows:—1945—84; 1946—30; 1947—3; 1948—2; 1949—Nil; 1950—Nil; 1951—Nil.

63 children were immunised against Diphtheria during the year, 26 of whom were under 5 years of age. In addition to this, 440 children were given boosting doses; a further 394 children received a combined course of immunisation against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough.

2 cases of Infantile Paralysis were notified, of which only 1 was belonging to the district, and is making satisfactory progress. The other case occurred in the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, and was resident outside the district. Again, this shews a decrease on the previous year's figure of 6.

Particulars of Tuberculosis notifications and deaths during 1951 are shown in Tables XVIII and XIX. The work in connection with the care and after-care of tuberculous patients is carried out by the Lancashire County Council.

MEASLES.

There were 325 cases of Measles compared with 573 in the previous year. This shews a considerable decrease, and all cases were of a mild type and there were no deaths.

Scarlet Fever shews a decrease on the previous year, and again all cases were of a mild type and the majority were nursed at home.

To His Worship The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report on the Cleansing work in the Borough during the year 1951.

All refuse has been disposed of by Controlled Tipping at Nelson Fold, Pendlebury. A feature of the controlled tip is the increase in requests from private firms for tipping facilities. The Health Committee decided to alter the charges, impose conditions to increase the revenue from the tip, to conserve the tipping space available, and to prevent undue strain on the personnel at the tip.

During the year Salford Corporation initiated negotiations with the Corporation for the use of land at Rabbit Hills, Pendlebury, for controlled tipping, and at the end of the year these negotiations appeared to he proceeding satisfactorily to both parties

1,348 ashbins were supplied under the Municipal Bin Replacement Scheme.

As the incidence of influenza among the workmen during the early months of the year subsided, the frequency of bin emptying improved and throughout the year was satisfactorily maintained.

There appeared to be a slight easing of the labour situation although the type of man available was still often unsuitable on grounds of physique and stature, features which it was possible to consider in the pre-war years. Naturally most men prefer to seek more lucrative employment in the industrial zones around Manchester.

It is noticeable that the downward trend in the collection of pig swill appears to have been at least arrested, and the service continues to shew a profit to the Corporation. During the year it was reported that on many occasions, bins which normally gave a good yield were found to have been emptied when the men came to collect the swill, and the police were asked to assist in discovering the thieves, but without any success. This is a serious loss to the Corporation as it happens sometimes over a large area involving many bins. The police are handicapped often because members of the public fail to give the necessary information, being naturally averse to becoming involved in the legal proceedings which might follow.

Last year 167 tons 18 cwts. of pig swill brought in an income of £461 12s. 0d., whereas this year 171 tons 17 cwts. were collected and sold for £509 0s. 3d.

The tonnage of waste paper fell slightly during the year. Re-acting to the phenomenal rise in prices, many commercial houses sought an outlet on the private market.

The volume of all salvage collected during the year was satisfactory and particulars are given in Table XXIII. 530 tons were collected this year, compared with 534 tons last year. The income was £5580, an increase of £2542 over the previous year.

An incentive bonus of £1471 12s. 0d. was divided amongst the workmen in the Cleansing Department during the year.
