To His Worship The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Report on the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1954. The report has been drawn up according to the directions contained in the Ministry of Health's circular 28/54 dated 15th December, 1954.

The population given by the Registrar General for mid-1954 is 40,470, shewing a slight decrease on the previous year.

The birth-rate per 1,000 population was 12.9 as compared with 12.3 for the previous year.

The infant mortality rate per 1,000 live births was 30, compared with 17 for the previous year, which was one of the lowest figures recorded.

The adjustable death-rate of 11.5 remains low.

The only serious factor in the incidence of infection was a considerable increase in the dysentery figures (see Table XVII). These occurred principally in children in two day nurseries, and a junior mixed school. A separate outbreak in a local hospital for juvenile mental patients was fortunately more easily confined to the hospital premises, although it was necessary to maintain a strict supervision of living-out staff to prevent a more serious outbreak from developing.

In total 224 cases were notified. 1,338 faecal specimens were forwarded to the Public Health Laboratory for examination and report, of which 944 were positive and 394 negative. This you will readily perceive necessitates many times this number of visits by the Sanitary Inspector's Staff.

Emission of grit into the atmosphere continues to give trouble, and no effort is spared to co-operate with the Works Management to find a remedy.

A proposal to erect a large extension to the Agecroft Generating Station of the British Electricity Authority resulted in strong opposition from the Corporation, and an enquiry was fixed to take place in January, 1955. Close co-operation is taking place between the neighbouring City, Boroughs and Urban Districts either to prevent this extension, or to obtain suitable safeguards against grit and sulphur dioxide emissions. Already the industrial area concerned shews a high sulphur pollution and my fellow Medical Officers of Health and myself are concerned that this should not be aggravated.

During the year intensive work was commenced on a detailed examination of houses for inclusion in Clearance Areas, and by the end of the year 203 houses, representing 49% of the number of houses considered in the Survey of last year to be suspect, were inspected in detail ready for the necessary representations to be made as soon as housing allocation for alternative accommodation is known. This involved a great deal of the Sanitary Inspector's time, and it is to the credit of the department that this has been accomplished with so little dislocation of other duties, and notwithstanding the addition of meat inspection in slaughter-houses during the year.

The inspection of meat in slaughter-houses continues, and I am satisfied that the standard of inspection is adequate and the situation under control, although this means extra work at weekends and at peculiar hours.

LIAISON.—Although many of the services originally administered by the Borough Health Department are now controlled by the Divisional Health Office under the Lancashire County Council, my department continues to receive many enquiries for information and assistance in matters of welfare, home helps, care of the aged, etc., and the department continues to work in close co-operation by exchange of information with the Divisional Health Office. This, of course, entails a worthwhile expenditure of time in being able to assist those citizens of our own Borough who find it difficult to make the journey to the Divisional Health Office, or for any other reason have difficulty in making the necessary contact.

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks to the Health Committee for their help and consideration, to my colleagues of other departments for their co-operation, and to my staff for their loyalty and support.

RODENT CONTROL.

In 1948 the Health Committee adopted the provisions of Circular NS.19 of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, and the free treatment of infestations in houses has continued. The cost of treatment of infestations in business premises is charged for on the basis of time spent and materials used on the premises.

In addition to the investigation of complaints received, a systematic search of premises of all types throughout the district is carried out, particular attention being paid to properties adjoining those on which an infestation is found.

During the year the sewer system in the borough received two maintenance treatments, one of which followed a test baiting of 10% of the manholes in the district. The several brook courses were inspected regularly and treated as required.

Co-operation with neighbouring authorities and officials of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries was well maintained during the year.

Altogether 5,529 visits and revisits were made to various premises, and 239 treatments carried out in 141 houses, 35 business premises, 6 farms, 57 local authority premises and installations Good results were obtained.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Table XVII on page 23 gives particulars of the occurrence of Infectious Diseases within the Borough during 1954. Of a total of 425 cases of Infectious Diseases notified, 38 were cases of Scarlet Fever, 42 were cases of Measles, 78 cases of Whooping Cough, and 224 cases of Dysentery.

Diphtheria has become non-existant in the Borough. This can be due to immunisation campaigns of former years. The following figures shew the decrease in this dreaded disease since 1946.

323 children were immunised against Diphtheria during the year, 306 of whom were under 5 years of age. In addition to this, 343 children were given boosting doses.

Two cases of Poliomyelitis were notified during the year, one of which was of a mild form and made a perfect recovery, while the other was a paralytic case, and attends the Eye Hospital for treatment, and is making satisfactory progress.

During the year outbreaks of Dysentery occurred in one Junior School, in the Swinton Hospital, and in two nurseries. 1,338 faecal specimens were sent to the Public Health Laboratory, of which 944 were positive and 394 negative.

Particulars of Tuberculosis notifications and deaths during 1954 are shown in Tables XVIII and XIX. The work in connection with the care and after-care of tuberculous patients is carried out by the Lancashire County Council. I am indebted to Dr. W. Lee, Consultant Chest Physician, for his co-operation and assistance in the grading of the patients on the Corporation's list of applicants for houses.

The incidence of Measles in 1954 shows a marked decrease on the previous year, there being 42 cases, compared with 325. All cases were of a mild type and there were no deaths.

Scarlet Fever continues to decrease in numbers and severity, there being 38 cases as compared with 85 in the previous year and 96 in 1952. The majority of these cases were nursed at home and were of a mild type.

To His Worship The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Swinton and Pendlebury.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report on the Cleansing work in the Borough during the year 1954.

The town's refuse continues to be disposed of at the Nelson Fold Tip, and the City of Salford are tipping on the Rabbit Hills site by agreement with the Borough.

Arrangements have been made to purchase mechanical equipment for use at the Corporation tip.

A report has been considered by the Health Committee on the design of future refuse collection vehicles, and I have been instructed to arrange demonstrations of various types of vehicles in anticipation of replacements in the next few years. It is hoped to provide greater pay-load to the tip, coupled with dustless loading.

1,340 ashbins have been supplied under the Municipal Bin Replacement Scheme.

As the Pig Swill Collection Service showed a trend towards a financial loss, the Committee decided to call in the street bins and to continue collecting canteen swill only. This has, by cutting down unprofitable vehicle time, shewn a small profit so far.

Waste paper has maintained a steady income, but expenses of baling have been high. This situation has eased towards the financial year ending and the situation is now normal.

The amount of all salvage during the year was 512 tons 2 cwts., compared with 494 tons 3 cwts. in the previous year, and the income f_3 , 546 0s. 2d., compared with f_3 , 184 7s. 11d.

£1,021 14s. 7d. bonus was distributed amongst the men during the year.
